

GOMULKA SAYS MAJORITY MUST BE FOLLOWED IN CP

In his speech to the Central Committee of the Polish United Workers Party, first secretary Wladyslaw Gomulka said that members of the party who do not agree with its policies should leave. Gomulka also said the defense of democratic freedom in Poland required a strong party. "If a member of the party does not agree," Gomulka said, "with the policy of the party, if he does not want to subordinate his opinions on fundamental questions to the will of the majority, if his outlook forbids his acceptance of the party's ideological principles, then he should leave its ranks, should return his party card or the party should cast him out of its ranks."

Concerning the expansion of democracy Gomulka said:

"The party is the most important instrument to solve Poland's problems and, because of this, the party must have a very strong position in the nation. Without this position there will always be danger to Socialist democracy in Poland.

"Without this strength, the only way to combat and paralyze the enemies of socialism is to limit democratic freedoms. The stronger and more united are the forces of socialism, the greater will be the freedoms."

Directing attention to those who argued that the movement started last October be continued much further, Gomulka said: "No party member can accept only one part

of democratic centralism, that is accept democracy and reject centralism."

Gomulka criticized certain journalists who advocated what he termed "bourgeois ideology." Concerning one writer, Leszek Kolakowski, Gomulka said:

"If one were to ask Kolakowski privately whether in our concrete situation the reappearance of a bourgeois political party, as he desires, would not consequently lead to the restitution of capitalism and a civil war, he certainly would reply in the negative. He admits publicly that it would be a calculated risk.

"One can risk a few zlotys in a lottery. One cannot risk the fate of Poland. No responsible Pole will jeopardize the fate of Poland in a lottery."
