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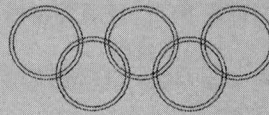
MEXICO '68: THE STUDENTS SPEAK

an illustrated pamphlet featuring the documents of the Mexican student movement.

Political analysts have tried to tell the North American public what the Mexican student movement is all about – what the thoughts and actions were that led to the shocking events of October 2: the massacre of hundreds of people during a student rally at the Plaza of Three Cultures.

The objectives of the students can best be understood by reading their own documents – not someone else's interpretation. Therefore, included in this collection is the political statement of the Strike Committee of the Faculty of Philosophy and Letters of the National University of Mexico; the official document of the National Strike Committee itself; and a generous sampling of the cartoons, graffiti, poems, and posters of the movement. The introduction is by Timothy Harding, noted Latin-American specialist formerly on the staff of the Hispanic America Review, and there are letters to the students from political prisoner Victor Rico Galan and from Bertrand Russell and Jean-Paul Sartre.

There is emphasis in this carefully researched publication on the economic factors behind the recent political events. In the introduction, the NACLA staff comments: "We felt that in order to relate to the repression directed against Mexican students and workers we must first understand our own country's involvement. . ."

Contains a chronology of the events; a statistical and background article on the public and private sectors of the Mexican economy; an analysis of how major U.S. corporations have dealt with the "Mexicanization" legislation; a list of U.S. corporations, non-profit organizations, universities and lobbyists involved in Mexico; plus shorter pieces on the educational system, political parties, and U.S. ambassadors. The 52 p. pamphlet also includes eye-witness reports and interviews with student leaders.

Charts, tables, and photographs handsomely illustrate the facts.

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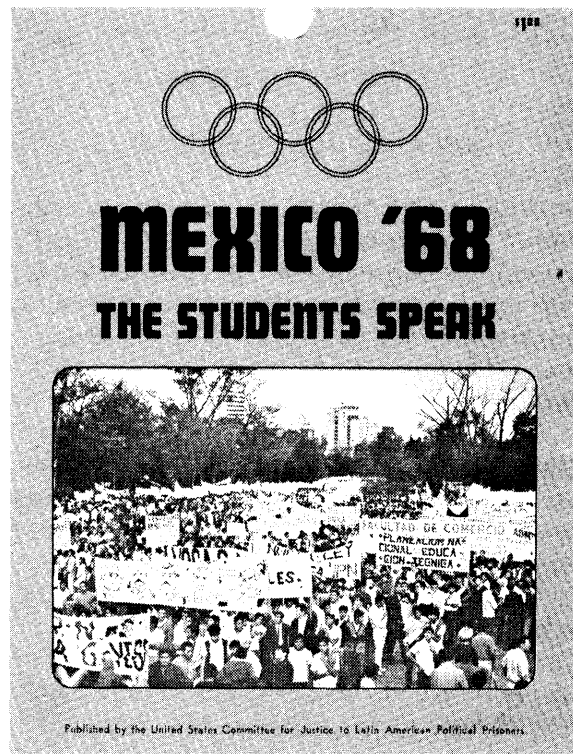
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
