WOMEN'S COLUMN

Not the least among the disgusting phases of our commercializing modern life, is the habit of our petty bourgeois of the ostentatious display of a hollow gallantry toward women. Of course this does not mean gallantry toward all women; but it does mean gallantry toward women of the capitalist class.

No better example of this mockery of gallantry could be found than was shown on an Elmwood car on Sunday. A young man of the working class, who boarded the car at a west end car.

He was a bit worse for the consumption of capitalist whisky, made for profit and sold to him for profit. He was not abusive, nor was he conspicuous, until the petty shop-keepers who were so thickly in that section, made him so.

After smoking a cigarette on the front platform of the car, he came into the assembly, and unbalanced by the swaying of the car, lurched into the end seats.

Horror!

A lady was sitting in the very next seat! She was gawking at him with a look of horror. Her hand, which held a diamond sparkled on her finger. Smiled over her wrinkled expanse of countenance, was the precious scowl of a woman who has been used by her kind, and the rustle of silks and satins made sweet music as she wobbled to her feet and lurched into another seat; and when she smiled off at the corner of her church.

Her immaculate gown had not so much as been touched by the unfortunate working boy. He had not spoken a word to her. He had not so much as glanced at her. Yet, his whole attitude and bearing were those of the class which produces all women of her kind. She was honest and she had a sense of intelligence and were it not for the whiskey which had been pumped into him in order to wheedle away the few nickels he had received for hours of toil, any mother would have been proud to compare him with the youthful product of Delaware Avenue.

The bourgeois woman, snorted in distaste. She jumped to her feet and wobbled to another seat, afar from the lateral vicinity of the working boy, who had dared to get into habitual condition of the Fourth Street hotel.

That was the signal. A labor exploiter, gorgeous in a silk hat and a frock coat nearly went insane in his frenzy to be "gallant" to the fat "Conductor." He yelled. "Throw this drunk off the car."

"Motorman," he yelled. "Throw this drunk off the car."

If there had been anyone else who thought he could have ordered about, he would doubtless have applied to them to join in abusing the young victim of their policy.

The conductor, bluffed by their good clothes, and doubtless knowing well that it means to have complaints come into the office of some rich people, hurried into the car.

The conductor had not heard a word of the discussion. He didn't bother with explanations. He didn't give an explanation of a poor working boy of his own class amount to, anyway, compared with the imperious orders of any member of the slave driving class! The boy did not wear a plug hat and a frock coat.

The conductor threw him off the car, the working boy, NOT the people who abuse it. The people who abuse it, were the man with the plug hat. Throw him off head long. He landed on his face, and the blood of every intelligent person on the car boiled at the outrage. Biting and hissing he lay in the street, and we watched until the car was out of sight.

For once, I longed to be a man, a big, strong man, just like the man who returned to this cowardly brute in the frock coat, and the pin-headed conductor.

The conductor then came about distributing cards, and asking for our names, in order that they might defend him! Such nerve! The company will get the truth of the matter; but will they act upon it? Not in a thousand years. It might offend some of the slave drivers who fatten upon the working class, or some of the distillers who are so busy with their own private business that they are distasteful to distillers' dainty wives.
