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CAPITALIST PICK UP \$2,000 BUFFALO WORKERS OF VOTE

Levy Election Law which Enables Employers to Find Out Whether Their Slaves are Socialists or Not Prevents Working Class from Registering. Capitalist Papers Give Silly Excuses for Low Registration.

By one of those cunning little tricks which those "friends of the dear people," the capitalist politicians love to indulge in, upwards of 4,000 Buffalo workmen have been practically deprived of the opportunity to register and vote.

The capitalist newspapers, floundering about with their usual need to conceal the truth, have advanced all kinds of silly "reasons" to explain the tremendous falling-off in registration in Buffalo and other cities of New York state.

If they really wanted to find the reason why they would not like to seek registration, they would not be so busy because nearly everybody else in Buffalo knows why the registration is so light.

It is simply because it takes on an average, four minutes for each person to register under the new method now in vogue. That means that the worker who purchases a time-check can't take the time to register.

But under the old system of registration it entails much work for the railroads and their spies. Under the new system, all that is necessary is to go over the registration books and check the names of the "undesirables" to be freed or shifted.

You see, it's a grand little system. The fellow who framed it up at Albany was quite sure that you was'n't blind. Because, you know, they are quite sure that your interests and the interests of the big corporations are "identical."

So that everything done by the corporations is "for your good!" They also like to tell you that your interests are identical with theirs.

If you don't fall for that kind of bunk, and wish to affiliate with the party of your class which is fighting your fight; why, you'd better look out. That's all.

As it takes about four minutes to get down all the information the capitalist wants, thousands of workers who tried to register on their way to and from work were forced to give up their places in the line and go on to the shops. Registration is a waste of time in itself this year, when there's a crowd behind of you.

RUSSELL-ALLEN MEETING

The next big affair of the Socialist Party in Buffalo will be the mass meeting at Convention Hall on Wednesday evening, October 30, when Buffalo will have a chance to hear those two sterling Socialist orators, Charles Edward Russell and Mrs. Carrie W. Allen.

Charles Edward Russell, the famous magazine writer, and candidate for governor on the Socialist ticket, needs no introducing to the public of this or any other city in America—we had almost said, in the world. His splendid, scorching editorials in the Coming Nation and his widely read and commented-upon articles in the leading magazines of the country, have made him one of the most prominent figures, if not the most prominent, among American writers.

His recent exposures of the way in which J. P. Morgan ordered Roosevelt about when Roosevelt was President, in his testimony before the Senate Investigating Committee, have also earned him reputation to grow, and it goes without saying that thousands of Buffalonians will be glad of the opportunity to hear his story from his own lips. In addition to his established reputation as a writer, he is fast gaining a wide renown as a speaker, having a splendid command of the English language and an ability to express himself with most telling effect.

Mrs. Allen, candidate for secretary of state on the Socialist ticket, will be with Russell on this occasion. While she is hardly so well known in Buffalo as Russell, she is by no means unknown through New York State. For some time previous to the campaign she has been an instructor in Syracuse University.

At the beginning of the free speech fight at Little Falls, both Charles Edward Russell and Carrie Allen volunteered to go to Little Falls and suffer imprisonment, if need be, to establish the free speech rights of the employees of the Phoenix Mills, who have been on strike, and for that reason have been deprived of constitutional rights by the bootlickers of the capitalist class who are in control of that town.

The general admission tickets used at the Debs meeting also entitle their holders to admission to the Russell-Allen meeting in Convention Hall Wednesday evening.

A packed house is expected at the Elmwood Avenue Convention Hall to hear these speakers. Those who have had the privilege of hearing either Russell or Mrs. Allen before will be eager to take advantage of this opportunity to hear them again.

They both have the faculty of going straight to the heart of the subject under discussion without a waste of words, and there is no question of their ability to present the Socialist propaganda in its most interesting and convincing manner.

Comrades in the party will remember with some amusement the invitation of one of the local rich men's clubs to Russell to go to their club and address them after a dinner in his honor. Russell very curtly declined, and told the bourgeois committee that all of his arrangements for speaking in Buffalo were being made through Local Buffalo. The rich bourgeois world like to hear over Russell on account of his reputation as a brilliant writer; but they get mighty little encouragement from him.

He hasn't any time to waste on the rich bourgeois world. His only working class needs his services, he has never failed to respond.

FREE SPEECH BUT A MEMORY OF THE PAST IN LITTLE FALLS, N. Y.
Capitalist Politicians, Eager to Show their Loyalty to the Master Class, Break up Strikers' Peaceful Gathering to Listen to a Socialist Political Speech; Socialist Mayor Lunn and Others Arrested for Reading the U. S. Constitution in Public.

Fully realizing the danger to the capitalist class if the strike and drive the victims back and free discussion of politics by their slaves, the capitalist class and their political hired men at Little Falls have declared war upon any one who dares to attempt to establish socialism or unionism publicly in that city.

They have gone further. They have practically declared that any Socialist who talks publicly on ANY question displeasing to the masters, will be railroaded to jail. Odd as it may seem, it has become "a crime" in Little Falls, which is a Russian village in the county of Herkimer, State of New York, populated by American citizens and ruled by the Phoenix Mills, to even read the Bible in the public park "if you're a Socialist."

It began with the arrest of Socialist Mayor George R. Lunn of Schenectady, who attempted the daring feat of trying to read a portion of the Declaration of Independence and Constitution of the United States to a gathering of slaves, who are on strike against the impositions of their bosses. Nobody knows what the end will be—whether the strike will continue or whether it will stick to their right to free speech whether they have the consent of the owners of the Phoenix Mills or not. As some of the plutes have learned to their regret, however, they do not know what it means to quit in a fight of this kind.

Since the arrest of Lunn, his wife has also been arrested and every day sees the number of Socialist agitators crowded into the city jail and county lock-up increased. Socialists from all over the state are pouring into Little Falls, eager to go to jail in defense of the dearest right of the American citizen—the right of free speech and public assemblage for all people.

The illy-livered city officials are completely dominated and cowed by a multi-millionaire owner of the mills.

9,000 THROG TO ARSENAL IN BUFFALO DRIZZLING RAIN TO HEAR DEBS

Largest Political Gathering in the History of Buffalo, Does Honor to Standard Bearer of Socialist Party — Enthusiasm Runs Riot and Meeting is a Splendid Success.

Were it not for the drizzling rain, there is no doubt but that 20,000 people would have stormed the Arsenal. As it was, approximately 9,000 crowded into the building. About 12,000 tickets were sold, but many with tickets stayed at home, on account of the rain.

Comrade Gustav Strebel of Syracuse, candidate for lieutenant-governor, was the first to be introduced by Chairman Mahoney. He discussed state issues chiefly, and described the National Progressive Party as an animal "with the head of a Bull Moose, the forelegs of the elephant and the hindlegs of the jackass, and the tail of the tiger."

At the entrance of Debs, the enthusiasm of the throng knew no bounds. Rising to their feet, they screamed, whistled, hurrahed and yelled their greetings for fully ten minutes.

Chairman Mahoney introduced him as "the man who said, 'I would not lead you out of the land of bondage if I could by the working class and some one else could lead you back.'"

When the cheering had subsided, Debs began one of those earnest, kindly, heart-to-heart talks, which while containing none of the drivell and none of the cunning devices of the spellbinder to win applause, are still marvels of eloquence, and have made him the best loved man in American public life.

All Old Parties Alike
The three capitalist parties, including the Republican, Democrat and Bull Moose parties, are merely subdivisions of the capitalist political power, he said. "They are organized by the capitalists, controlled by the capitalists and owned by the capitalists in the interest of the capitalists. A workman is as much out of place in a capitalist party as J. P. Morgan would be out of place in the Socialist party. The Socialist party is the party of the working class, recruited from the ranks of labor, supported by the working class and controlled by the working class. It is the only party which has a right to appeal to workmen for their support because it represents their class and their class alone."

"The capitalist parties consider the working class as only fit to march in the mud behind the chariots of capitalist leaders, and furnished the votes for them on election day."

Laughter, mingled with shouts and applause, continued long, when he described Taft, Wilson and Roosevelt in the following phrases: "They are the incarnation of the spirit of the capitalist class, which they represent. Not one of them has ever done a day's work for wages; not one of them has ever even one day of a job; not one of them knows how it feels to hear the whistle of the factory or the bell of the shop when he is sick; not one has ever been blacklisted; not one has ever been arrested; not one has ever been locked out; not one has had an injunction issued against him; not one has ever been in jail. All of this is proof that they are members of the ruling class."

"Patriots" in Politics
"Taft has the backing of such eminent patriots as Rockefeller, Carnegie and Morgan. Wilson has the backing of such as eminent humanitarians, Thomas Fortune Ryan; Roosevelt, the backing of such as Perkins, Munsey and the like. It is right that they should have their support because a Republican, Democrat and Bull Moose parties represent them."

Referring briefly to the shooting of Roosevelt, reported recently in the newspapers, Debs pointed out the cowardly party, by trying to make it appear that to saddle this crime upon the Socialist party, by trying to make it appear that Schrank was a Socialist. After expressing regret at the shooting, he went on to assert that every one of the New York gambler gang of murderers were either Republicans or Democrats, but the papers do not mention any criminal's politics unless they have a hope of charging crime against one of the 50,000 Socialist voters.

Socialists Oppose Violence
"This attempt, which I deprecate, could not have happened under a Socialist regime, because Socialists are opposed to violence. The capitalist system is based upon violence, and that is the reason why we are opposed to capitalism."

The captain of police, with a squad of officers, was a bit worried over the safety of Debs, and as soon as the speech was over, Debs was rushed out the side door in a waiting carriage. It was feared that the enthusiastic crowd, in trying to shake his hand, would have injured him in the crush. Happily, his enemies are not of the class which might assassinate him physically, but, rather, of the class which, like the capitalist editors and the puffed Jesuit priests, prefer to stab in the back and assassinate reputations, so there was no fear of murder.

Swarming into Buffalo from all parts of Western New York, a wildly enthusiastic multitude greeted the standard-bearer of the working class political party at the Broadway Arsenal Tuesday night. The meeting was unquestionably the greatest demonstration of the present political campaign.

When Debs went to 3,000 to the Arsenal on Labor Day, Straus spoke to approximately 6,000 last week, and about that number attended the Democratic rally on Monday night. These meetings were, of course, free, and to a great extent those who attended carried largely of the political benches of the capitalist parties, with such others of the particular political faith represented as they might be put in the evening in listening to the good old story of that sovereign patriot, and what horny-handed sons of toil they are. The Arsenal was none too big for the throng, which, however, was not a few solid aloof.

The Supreme Orator
At all times, the orator who the great masses of the human race have ever listened, held his audience to the hollow of his hand. Fortunate, indeed, is it that in him the workers have a leader who cannot be bought with capitalist gold, who will not be intimidated by capitalist cunning, who would rather languish in jail in the cause of the workers than loit in a cage in a palace of the exploiters of humanity.

A product of the working class himself, Debs understands to the full the meaning of the class struggle, and his voice, raised on behalf of the oppressed working class contains no tremor of fear, no hint of timidity, no word of discouragement. His elation call to the workers of Buffalo to unite, to cast from them the chains which bind them to the whole of the capitalist class, to close up the ranks and join with the workers of the world in the tremendous onward rush of the Socialist movement, must always remain in the memory of the whole of the working class here, enshrined as the noblest class of oratory ever uttered in the City of Buffalo.

Even without the irresistible logic of the Socialist position, and even though Debs had a capital of \$100,000 to covince the working class of the sophistries which form the stock in trade of the old parties, Debs would be recognized as the foremost master of oratory in America today. He who can combine with his mastery of poetic rhetoric the tremendous enthusiasm which goes with absolute certainty of the logic of philosophy, and a capacity to give this message to the world, is not surprising that Debs should tower, head and shoulders, above the best that the capitalist parties can produce.

Simmons, John Leach and Fred Hirsch, city officials of the Socialist administration in Seneca County; Louis Lesnicke, a Little Falls union man.

This is the situation as to the title and use of Clinton Park in Little Falls. LABOR NEWS

PRICE OF COAL RAISED
A number of anthracite coal operators in the section of Pottsville, Pa., have made a big raise in the price of coal, advancing pea and chestnut coal 75 cents a ton. At this rate chestnut coal at the mines is now more than \$5 a ton.

STREET CARMEN ORGANIZED
The street railway employes of Buffalo, Wyo., have organized a union and attached themselves to the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, and amongst all the trainmen employed by the local company. The general manager met with the men shortly after organization and announced that he was opposed to the formation of a union and expected that the relations between the management and the employees would be harmonious and difficulties arising amicably adjusted.

PUSH LIVING STILL HIGHER
And now word comes from New York that soon hotels and restaurants are to label bread and butter 10 cents extra. The interesting innovation of the bread and butter factor is a sequel to the recently instituted project in New York of charging 3 time for a program in some of the leading theaters.

And butter raise in price will not be applied in all hotels and eating houses but it indicates the union trend throughout the country.

TO RAISE TEACHERS' PAY
There is a strong movement on foot in Providence, R. I., to increase the pay of the public school teachers. The present salary scale of wages was adopted in 1905 and has since then been the subject of much discussion. The cost of living having gone up immeasurably and the school teachers not having received an increase in their work at the present. In all likelihood a substantial advance in salaries will soon be ordered.

THE CAMPAIGN IN WISCONSIN

It is therefore to be regretted that such errors are bound to occur, and are due to the blunders of some of its employees.
