THE MONEY QUESTION III. The Money Trust

The money of the United States established by law of April 5, 1792, is composed of coins of silver, gold and copper, the ratio of silver to gold being 15 to 1. Free coinage was provided for and all coins were made full legal tender by an act in 1834...

This means the starting of a campaign to the hands of individuals and to place them into the hands of society to be used solely in the interests of society, and this means the humanizing of man's work and the humanizing of man himself, the worker.

MAN AND HIS WORK

Why is it that so many men find little or no intellectual and moral satisfaction in their work?

It is, in the first place, because the relation between them and their work is unprofitable due to the fact that most of them are never allowed to make a complete piece of work. Every one is compelled to devote himself entirely to the making of part of a thing, and on a certain length of time, it reacts on the character of the worker and creates within him the feeling of being himself just a part of a machine.

Another reason why men find no real satisfaction in their work is the fact that they are not permitted to do what they could do best. To be sure, no law compels them to follow certain orders. No caste-restriction prevents him from devoting himself to a craft which appeals to his inclinations and desires. But most of us have no real choice in the matter. No power here will allow the worker his child's choice than the stern command of necessity forces us to make our own living. We are not at liberty to choose the trade we like, but we are obliged to accept any position that offers us bread. Instead of looking for

Every crisis illustrates this wonderful order of things. Millions are put out of employment because the exploitation of man by man, and their previous industry counts against them. They suffer from want because they have produced too much. The market cannot absorb all the goods they have produced. Why? Because purchasing power of the masses is restricted by the meager wages they are receiving in payment for an output of much greater value. The unsalable goods which clog the blood-circulation of business is the price labor had to pay for the privilege to work.
