

FORGOTTEN; THE RAILROADS; OFFERS OF BREAD; OFFERS OF BREAD

Victory Perches On the Banners Of the Workers

Last Hope of International Rests on Trained Lawyers Who Are Relied Upon to Film-Fiam-Men and Satisfy Them With "Recognition" Only.

THE STRIKE OF THE STREET CAR MEN HAS BEEN PRACTICALLY SETTLED. At a conference yesterday afternoon at the Mayor's office an agreement was reached which puts the men back on the cars at 5 o'clock this morning.

The company has practically conceded the recognition of the union, and in case any differences should arise a board of arbitration is provided for in the agreement, the board to consist of one man from the union, one from the company and a third to be selected by the two.

The arbitration board has no function unless the union and the company cannot agree.

THE RESULT OBTAINED IS THE GREATEST VICTORY FOR ORGANIZED LABOR EVER WON IN THE CITY OF BUFFALO. The company consented to "arbitrate" only after all of the big capitalist organizations had brought pressure to bear upon it to force a settlement.

These forces had previously been used against the strikers; but finding that it did not work, and that the men were "game" to resist every effort to break down their organization, they have now turned to arbitration.

It is quite clear that idle men can not produce surplus value to buy mansions, pay servants, provide yachts and dukers and other "essentials" of capitalist happiness.

The threat of a general strike first proposed by the Buffalo Socialist and enthusiastically taken up by thousands of union men had its effect upon the capitalists. That is what turned the tide, so far as continued pressure to crush the strike was concerned and caused the masters to bend their efforts toward forcing the International to arbitrate.

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BOY SCOUTS ARE QUIETLY CALLED OFF TO "SHOW UP"

Have Been Used Before in Breaking Strikes To Be Used as Scavengers.

The Boy Scouts have been called out to assist the International and to go on picket lines in cleaning up the tracks of the company in preparation for operating cars. In order to effect their connection with the soldiers, the boys have been instructed not to wear their uniforms.

It is entirely in harmony with the purpose for which the Boy Scouts are organized. The strike has provided them with a splendid chance of learning how to shoot women and children in the interests of the master class and they are quick to learn such things.

It will be remembered that the Boy Scouts, early in the history of the organization, succeeded in breaking several strikes. One of these was a strike of messenger boys in St. Louis. The Boy Scouts were "ordered to the colors" and set to work scabbing on the St. Louis messenger boys who were trying to better the few pitiful pennies which they were able to earn.

The other case was in Des Moines, where the Boy Scouts scabbed on the boot blacks, at the orders of their scoutmaster.

As a matter of fact, many of the soldiers in the 74th appear to be but lately graduated from the ranks of the Boy Scouts. Nowadays it is necessary to "catch 'em young" in order to make killers of the boys and all sorts of devices are resorted to, in order to trap them into the militia. The armies are fitted up with rich men's clubs and athletic games are frequently put on in order to attract them to the places and show them "how nice it is to be here and defend the national honor."

The experience of the International with the International Railway, which are only too eager to get their fingers on the hoarded dollars squeezed from the sweat and blood and tears of the struggling street railway workers, has evidently convinced them that every newspaper is WILLING TO SELL ITS COLUMNS TO THE GREASY PLUTOCRATS.

We trust that the International Street Railway Company has learned its lesson by this time. The following affidavit by W. F. Cattell, Business Manager of The Buffalo Socialist, explains itself:

STATE OF N. Y., County of Erie, I, William F. Cattell, being duly sworn, depose and say:

On April 10th, at about 11 P. M. I was in the office of The Buffalo Socialist, when Mr. J. J. Moore, who is the International Street Railway Company, called upon me and offered me a copy of the International Street Railway Company, and he asked me to sell him a page of advertising space in the Buffalo Socialist for one week, and I told him I would consider it if he would pay me \$100.00. 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Text of the Agreement

Buffalo, N. Y., April 11, 1913. It is hereby agreed as a basis of settlement...

All employees who were in the employment prior to Saturday, April 5th, 1913, to be returned to the service in the positions and with the seniority held by them at that time, with a leave of forty-eight hours for the purpose of flight as they may not be within calling or notifying distance to return and take their positions.

When the employees have returned to work and within three days after signing this agreement, the Company to make up with the seniority of the employees all complaints, grievances, and notices of discharge given in the future. Included in these complaints shall be the cases of the men discharged within thirty days prior to April 5, 1913. If they cannot reach a satisfactory agreement through these conferences all questions in dispute between them shall be submitted to a Board of Arbitration.

Either party upon being notified in writing by the other party that Arbitration is desired shall name its Arbitrator within forty-eight hours after having received such written notice.

The Board of Arbitration to be composed of three persons. The employees to select whichever they desire as Arbitrator, the employees to select likewise. These two Arbitrators thus selected shall select within five days from the date of their appointment the third Arbitrator. In case of failure to select the third Arbitrator within five days as specified the Mayor of the City of Buffalo shall become the third Arbitrator. Within three days after the appointment of the third Arbitrator, the Board of Arbitrators shall meet and continue in session until all disputes have been heard and decided.

At the hearing before the Board of Arbitration, either side may be represented by any one whom they desire, and after all evidence and arguments have been heard by the Board of Arbitration they shall within fifteen days formulate their award in writing and submit the same to both parties. The findings of a majority of the Board of Arbitration shall be final and binding on both parties.

The expense of the Board of Arbitration shall be borne as follows: Each party shall pay the Arbitrator's fee by the expense of the third Arbitrator, while Buffalo has a set of city officials who have felt the lash of public opinion, while Buffalo has a set of city officials who have felt the lash of the street car company to thwart the ends of justice for the strikers. Do you get this distinction? If you do, well, there's another election here this fall and it would be well for you to get it.

YOU VOTED FOR IT The workers of Buffalo have long been voting into power a system of basic principle of which is a large armed force, ready at the command of large business men to force the workers to accept the lash of public opinion. Almost everywhere a substantial percentage of the company's receipts goes into the coffers of the city.

But the spineless, lickspittle policy of Buffalo's city officials has exacted not a single concession from the International. They have allowed the public to be used, humiliated and the company's profits mount ever higher and higher. Not until the people take over and operate the road themselves will the public be decently served and the workers treated as human beings.

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THE DIFFERENCE 'TWEEN BUFFALO AND CLEVELAND

"Why should Buffalo be forced to put up with rotten service to patrons, who have, and virtual slavery for its employees, when the neighboring city of Cleveland has 3-cent fare, sanitary cars, rapid service and pays its men 32 a week?"

This is a question which will occupy the attention of the working class of Buffalo. The reason is because Cleveland has a set of city officials who have felt the lash of public opinion, while Buffalo has a set of city officials who have felt the lash of the street car company.

On a recent fare basis, the Cleveland trolley company is paying 7 per cent dividend. Rochester is also now receiving 3-cent fare. Let us wake up.

Branch One Sunday School



The above is a picture of the children who attend the Sunday School of Branch One. In writing this picture the following questions, no doubt, will arise in the minds of many readers: What is the object in having Sunday Schools, and what are the children taught that are attending them? We could answer this in a very abrupt way, and that is in this way: We need the Sunday Schools in our movement, that is why we have them. We, however, realize that the answer is without logic, and, therefore, we will endeavor to answer it in a way that everyone will be able to understand. Some of the fundamental things every human being that belongs to the lower strata of civilized society should know are: (the upper strata know it already), and so we get possession of the means to sustain our life. Under what condition do we get our livelihood? What are the causes of wars, political and industrial? Why are some people poor and others rich? What relation is there between labor and capital? Are the interests of the laborer and the capitalist identical, etc. I have been teaching the essentials of economics to amateur minds for a good many years, gaining new recruits right along. We had many obstacles to overcome such as prejudice, indifference, ignorance, etc.

Through past experience one of the members from Branch One rediscovered that the most receptive period of the human brain is between the ages of 4 to 21 years. After having made this discovery we immediately began to look about for means whereby we could impart our knowledge of economics to the children. At first we thought of the public school. Could we get that institute of learning to adopt a study of economics? Our answer was no. Would the present day Sunday Schools expound economics? Our answer was again, no. There was only one alternative left and that was to organize a Sunday School under our own through the persistent effort of Comrade Mrs. Klein, comrades Heide, Wolf and a few others that were accomplished, and we now have a growing Sunday School attended by enthusiastic children, eager to learn economics. In addition to the study of economics, they are also taught to sing songs which are in harmony with the subject, and now in the words of the Scripture we say to all the branches in this city: "Go thou, and do likewise, for you will reap benefit therewith." The following comrades are now taking care of the Sunday Schools: Mrs. Klein, Chas. Brauer, H. Becker, P. Lester and H. Schikaner.

Now why do I mention this play? It was Socialism, you might be tempted to say. No, it was not. It was, after all, the best brand of Socialism. We gave seventy-five of our members a good opportunity to express themselves. We all cooperated in a big thing, and cooperation is a big Socialistic principle. We all got plentifully acquainted. That made for solidarity. We discovered a lot of talent among our members of whose existence we had hitherto been unconscious. This means a great deal. Now it stands to reason that all these voices of discovery cannot be assembled in a week. It will all take time. But, keep everlastingly at it. The membership must be studied, and some of some sort must be found. Our young people are asked to help in the Local work. For example, during the course of Lyceum lectures, just passed, we sang on the platform before each lecture. We took tickets, we asked, distributed cards and circulars, sold tickets, took up the collections, and made ourselves generally useful. That all helped. UNDER THE AUSPICES OF LOCAL BUFFALO SOCIALIST PARTY

The Socialist movement is the greatest force making for international peace in the world. Ever since the formation of a Socialist organization it has been an opponent of militarism and a foe of war. A few weeks ago, because of the war in the Balkans, it was thought that all the European nations would be thrown into a conflict. To prevent the legalized murder of thousands of men a special International Socialist Anti-War Congress was held at Basel, Switzerland. Over five hundred delegates representing the working class of every European country were present and resolutions were unanimously adopted calling upon the workers the world over to protest against war, and in the event of war being declared, to stay at home and refuse to fill their fellow workers in other countries.

SOCIALIST ALDERMAN ELECTED AT JAMESTOWN

Jamestown, N. Y., had a city election last week Tuesday, in which the Socialists fared very well. Charles J. Larson, Socialist, was elected alderman from the fourth ward and with one Socialist alderman elected last year, and one holds over until 1914, the Socialist Party has now two representatives in the city council. The next Common Council will consist of eight Republicans, two Progressive-Prohibitionists and two Socialists. The total city votes were as follows: Republican, 1,620; Progressive, 825; Socialist, 430; Democrat, 450 and Prohibitionist, 417.
