ENTHUSIASTIC MEETINGS OF EXPRESSMEN

Office Employees Join Hands With Drivers, Truckmen and Barn Men.

Peterson's Hall, 237 Spycamore Street was packed at a meeting held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon by the employes of the various express companies who are conducting a strike against the rotten conditions under which the express companies compel them to work.

The meeting was called by the Express Employees Union, 301, which is affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

President Barnes, after calling the meeting to order read the oath of loyalty to the organization which was subscribed to by every man present amid a mighty burst of enthusiasm.

In fact the meeting was the spirit of solidarity which fills the ranks of the picket committee reported that the express business is tied up, that none are acting as traitors to their class by scabbing and that drivers not working for express companies are refusing to act as scabs by handling any of the express companies' business.

The demands as drawn up by the strike committee are: 1st.—That union be recognized and men be privileged to wear Union buttons.

1st.—That all employees discharged on or after April 1st, be reinstated.

2d.—That all employees and chauffeurs shall be paid \$60 per month for first year, \$70 per month for second year and \$80 per month after two years service.

3d.—That eight hours shall constitute a work day and forty-eight hours shall constitute a week.

4th.—That all employees called on to make trips as extra messengers, guards, etc., shall be paid \$1.00 per hour, \$10 per month.

5th.—That all freight trucks be kept in good condition and company to see that man is appointed to oil trucks at least once a week.

6th.—That drivers be not called upon to work more than eight hours shall constitute a work day.

7th.—That two men be employed on all freight trucks and that one of them be a woman.

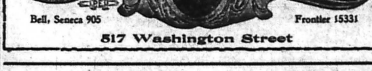

Polish and Italian FRIEGHT HANDLERS ORGANIZE A staggering load has been handed to Mr. William J. Coners, proprietor of the Courier and Enquirer. Mr. Coners, he is the man who has done a leading and unloading practically all the vessels that enter Buffalo.

For some little time settlement for organization has been crystallizing among the Irish and Polish who had done most of the freight for Mr. Coners. They were very poorly paid. About three weeks ago a union of about 2,000 men was organized for the most part as a local of the International Longshoremen's Union.

Demands were immediately made upon Mr. Coners for wage increases. At first he was rather unyielding, but upon presumption of the men in their demands, but after thinking the matter over he thought that perhaps something might be done and when finally the strike was threatened he knew some thing had to be done. Formerly the men have been receiving 22 cents per hour, under the new agreement which will take effect for one year the rate will be 25 cents per hour, an increase of three cents per hour over the old rate.

THE DEPARTMENT STORE STRIKE

The suddenness of the strike of the department store clerks and drivers is proof that conditions demanded immediate action of some kind. While it may be considered by many a hasty step, and that older organizations would have parleyed over for some months, or even years, conditions in the department stores were such that something had to be done, and done quick, and it is to the credit of the clerks and drivers that they lost no time in calling a strike.

The strike had a telling effect on the owners, who have been so accustomed to browbeat their employees that for a surprise party it had everything checked.

The girls took to the picket line like ducks to water and were doing wonderful work until the scare was given them on the second day of the strike by John Coleman of the Trades and Labor Council that the A. F. of L. was not behind them.

We have no doubt that the girls would have succeeded in getting out many of those cold footed, weak-kneed souls that love the boss and think more of a few days pay now than a substantial, lasting increase.

Mr. Coleman did not tell you that for years he belonged to the Amalgamated Carpenters, an out-lawed organization, instead of the regularly constituted union of the A. F. of L., the Brotherhood of Carpenters. He did not tell you that the Trades and Labor Council of Buffalo is not now affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, and that he is responsible for this condition of affairs.

As with the organizing of the Street Car Men's Union and the Express Men's Union, it was the intention of the organizing association to call in the proper representatives of the American Federation of Labor and make it part of that body. But Mr. Coleman became unwell and the excited over the organizing Association and W. P. Cattell and rushed to prevent others from doing work he could not do and did not even though he had all kinds of opportunities.

If Mr. Coleman was really desirous of seeing the clerks win, which would mean another strong union, he would have stepped up to the front like a man and offered his assistance instead of crying himself in the capitalist newspapers that "the United Trades and Labor Council is not back of this strike."

Notwithstanding the injury Mr. Coleman has done this strike the workers are still out and fighting with a determination that commands the admiration of every worker in the city.

The Organizing Association, composed of Socialists, rather than in any way injure the chances for success of the strikers, gracefully turned over the work to the Trades and Labor Council and will do everything possible to carry the strike to success.

We are out for the best that can be obtained for the workers, and are willing to sacrifice everything for their cause.

We will spend our time and money to this end, and if anyone stands in the way let them beware.

All the strikers need to do is to stick to their guns and victory is assured.

Just think of \$2.50 a week and paying for car fare and lunch out of that.

THE RADICALS

Within the last week we note that the capitalist press is taking extreme delight in referring to the Socialists as radicals and at the same time taking comfort with the old fogies of the labor movement as conservatives.

As an old saying in the labor movement that when a labor man meets the approval of the bosses, then look out for him, and it is a true one.

Our exploiters are conservative when it means the paying out of wages, but they are very radical in their methods of handling men. As with the man who does not suit, out he goes immediately. No argument is tolerated. You are fired on the spot. Immediate direct action is brought to bear if you attempt it.

If a worker asks for a raise in pay it often takes months of deliberation, but the answer is informed by the boss that he can afford it, even though it is known that he is spending money lavishly.

If you want something that you are entitled to demand it. Don't be a cringing, crawling serpent and plead and beg and cry for it.

It didn't take long for the stores to abolish the Saturday night work when it suited them to do so.

The most noticeable feature of the strike of the department stores is the lack of news on this subject in the capitalist press.

On the first day of the big strike the Buffalo Times had a head clear across the page telling what was going on in London.

IN THE AIR

We overheard a man say the other day: "Yes, it's a fine day, and strikes are in the air."

In this beautiful city of ours the "business interests" have held complete control of the situation for many years.

The price of commodities have steadily risen from day to day without the least regard to whether the consumer could meet that price or not.

At the same time wages have remained practically stationary. This condition of affairs has existed for many years, and the success of the so-called "business interests" has made them bolder and bolder in their exploitation.

We have been no exception as a cheap labor town, and have been known as such for years. We have been ground down so hard that the dullest mind is stirred to revolt, until now every worker is ready to strike.

He must do something.

When wages do not meet the absolute necessities of life, look out for trouble.

These conditions have long existed in this city, and the wonder is how we have stood it so long.

If we must live, we must change this condition; if we must change this condition, we must organize.

We must organize in such a manner that when we make demands they must be conceded or trouble will ensue.

We must organize to win, not to request and be turned down like beggars.

We must elect men to office that will do OUR bidding instead of obeying the orders of our enemies, our exploiters.

We must teach our young men that capitalist political parties are owned and controlled by and for the interests of those who own them, and by the same token working class parties are owned and controlled for the workers.

We must organize on the political and economic basis. Both are absolutely necessary and we need both to win.

The cockroach capitalist party in this city in their interests loses nothing by letting it fly from them.

Let Buffalo take the lead. We have a good start. Now let us keep it up, and show some of our comrades in other cities that we are not dead ones.

FATHERS AND SONS

WHAT HOME RULE MEANS

Home rule, there is much talk of home rule nowadays, for the people are all too ready to cover a multitude of political conceptions from which every one may select what suits him best. The public spirited citizen understands by it the rule of the people, his people, the well-to-do, respectable people, the people who pay the taxes and whose views make you what is called public opinion. They have delegated their political power to professional politicians, and to the politicians of a given community instead of being their slaves, they are to be controlled of the home market of offices and spoils.

But what difference does it make to the ordinary citizen whether he is elected by a fellow citizen or by a stranger, and whether the law which authorizes his fleeing is home-made or made at some distant state capital?

It is demanded to be elected by him, it is short, the effect will always be the same: the sheep will lose its wool. However, the well-to-do citizens can well afford to let the politicians have their way in regard to all-paying offices and spoils, because in the end it is they who reap the richest harvest from this kind of politics. Modern capitalism is the rule of the few, the rule of the modern capitalist profit-making, and the only losers are the masses of the working people.

It is for the working people to decide how long this sort of politics is to be carried on at their expense. It is for them to decide whether home rule is to be a fact in the true sense of the word or remain a mockery and a sham.

Let them count their votes, and they cannot help realizing that they have the power to determine what our politics is to be a game to hoodwink the people in order the better to exploit them, or a means to promote their interest.

Representing the economic and every other interest of the working people, the Socialist alone stand for home rule for the state and home rule means the control of all social resources and power of society by all of the people for the welfare of all the people, in every single municipality as well as in the state and the whole nation. The working people are at home everywhere, and their interest demands that home rule shall be practiced everywhere, that is, that the people everywhere shall be the dominating factor in politics everywhere.

POLITICAL POWER

A serious charge has been brought against the Socialist Party, namely, that its only object is to gain political power.

Is it true? And if it is true, is it wrong for a political party to struggle for political power?

As far as we can see, and as far as history can teach us anything in this respect, it has always been the legitimate purpose of political parties to acquire political power, to use them for the realization of the principles and interests those parties represent, advocate and strive for. The Socialist Party is no exception to this rule. Its object is political power, not as an end in itself, but as a means to an end, and this end is the establishment of economic, social and political democracy.

But in order to conquer the state, the Socialists must first of all conquer the masses of the working people, that is, they must conquer the hearts and minds of the women whose material and intellectual interests find their most comprehensive expression in Socialism.

The desire of the Socialists to gain political power is identical with the desire of the working people to become the masters of their destinies, to become masters instead of being servants, to own their tools instead of being their slaves, to be the masters of their own social existence instead of being compelled to sell themselves to those who now happen to control the state.

It seems ridiculous to reproach the Socialists for aiming at political power, in a society in which nothing of importance can be achieved without political power.
