SOME OF THE RECENT INSPIRING MEETINGS

Joshua Wannhope and Gustav Strelbel Give Workers Intellectual Treat—Socialist Candidate for Mayor Mahoney Opens Campaign with Argument that Capitalists Candidates Dare Not Debate.

The Socialist ratification meeting at Elmwood Music Hall on Saturday night drew a tremendous outpouring that taxed the capacity of the huge auditorium. It was a fitting ratification of the ticket recently nominated at a mass meeting of the Socialist Party, not by a committee, as is the practice of the capitalist parties. A display of fireworks and the explosion of aerial bombs preceded the meeting, which was entertained by Scinta's band.

To the man in the street it doubtless appeared the opening of the Socialist campaign. But that campaign had begun years ago. It is on day and night year in and year out and will end only with the overthrow of the capitalist system and the emancipation of the working class from wage slavery.

James J. Kelly opened the proceedings and in a characteristically ringing address appealed for support of the Buffalo Socialist, the only genuine class paper in the city and the only paper that stood by the workers in the labor struggles of the spring. He showed the futility of the dependence of the working class on the "successful" capitalist men put forward by the capitalist parties in the interest of capitalism alone.

His introduction of Stephen J. Mahoney, Socialist candidate for mayor, drew a prolonged and deafening ovation. Mr. Mahoney is a graduate of the Band School of Social Science of New York and versed in economic and political problems of the government. He said he was glad of the opportunity to address the people of Buffalo in bulk. A few years ago he held weekly street meetings here and his audiences were wont to number ten to twenty hundred. There were 30,000 paid in the local here. There were 2,000 now.

ARBITRATION NOT GOOD IN LABOR DISPUTES

"We call such railroad men 'broken down rail'," said Dillon.

UNION OFFICIAL REMOVED FOR BELONGING TO MILITIA

The Seignaw (Mich.) Federation of Labor has removed its president because he was a member of the national guard and did strike duty in the copper country. This is the proper action for a labor body to take, as the "union" man who belongs to the militia deserves nothing but contempt from his fellows.

The only solution of the problem was the socialization of the means of production and exchange.

The old party politicians could not understand their capitalist owners and the working class and it was time the workers stood together and voted for the party of the working class, for themselves, their wives and their children. The Socialist party would have no stone unturned in the education of the workers. A hundred speakers would cover the city during the campaign and a million pieces of literature would be distributed.

Gustav Strelbel of Syracuse in speaking of our candidate for mayor said that the time honored saying that great men made history was a fallacy. History made great men and history was making a great man in Mr. Mahoney. The stock argument that Socialists had no leaders, no great men, had petered out in America. Speakers and orators were not needed and Socialists had the necessary intellect to deal constructively with problems of government when the people gave them the power to do it. The approaching election was not a distraction from the time when the workers had the opportunity to take hold of the great social forces and master them. The ballot was the weapon by which they could change and evolve and that was the reason why the Socialist Party was a political party.

JURY DISAGREES IN THE CALDWELL CASE

Joseph M. Caldwell, Socialist and labor leader, whose trial in Fitchburg on the charge of assault and battery resulting from the strike of employees of the Draper Company in Milford last May resulted in a disagreement recently made the following statement:

"The jury has disagreed in my case. I have not fully decided what I shall do in the immediate future. Am sorry the decision has not been for or against me. Using the law is an expensive business. The actual expenses so far have been over \$300. My attorneys have not yet received any fees for their services."

It is trust that the comrades of the party and the members of organized labor will not lose sight of the personal testimony of the now familiar labor spy, Kozloski, employed by the Boston Callahan Detective Agency.

"I have brought his case to the attention of the judge and the district attorney. It will be interesting to see what action is taken."

"Not to matter what may be the final disposition in my case, whether I am tried again and found guilty and go to jail, or the charges against me are dismissed, I will continue to fight in the ranks of labor on both the industrial and political field for social and industrial justice."

Two of the strikers, Vilanti and Bulva, who were included in the Caldwell indictment, were found guilty.

These are to be blessed and sprinkled and turned loose on the workers whenever the cause of capitalism is suffering.

They further try to hide what they have in mind by talking of a foreign invasion, just as if a foreign invasion would interfere with their nest. All governments at present respect such nests in time of war as everybody knows. They also talk about earth-quake in New York. Why not also talk about blizzards, tidal waves, cyclones, typhoons, tornadoes, prairie fires, potato blight, grasshopper plagues or the sandstorms on the Sahara Desert, or the eruption of Popocatepetl?

Stephen J. Mahoney will speak at Noonday Meetings at Lafayette Square every day beginning Thursday, September 25th.

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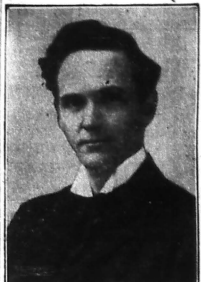
FUSION OF OLD PARTIES AGAINST SOCIALISTS IN ITHACA CAMPAIGN

STRIKERS SUBMIT THEIR CASE

(From the Miners' Bulletin.)

Citizens of Michigan, Workers of America: We have presented a part of the evidence in our case. We set out to prove by undisputed evidence the murder of strikers by the thugs, outrages upon strikers by both soldiers and thugs, outrages and insults to women, and brutality generally on the part of the soldiers in the copper district, the unprovoked shooting of a striker from behind by the militia.

We started out to prove that there had been a regular line of conduct participated in by the thugs and militia that could have but one end in view, either to intimidate men into going back to work without any redress of grievances, or driving them to the commission of acts of violence that would seem to justify the use of thugs and soldiers in this district.

Brutal as their conduct has been, it has neither broken our ranks nor driven us to overt acts. From the outrages and insults, from the brutal attacks that have been made upon us by thugs and the militia, we appeal to the calm thought and deliberate judgment of the citizens of our state, and the workers of the entire country.

We will state briefly for your benefit what our demands are, and believe that you will see that not simply a part of them but all should be conceded.

Again, we believe, the fire department is neglecting its duty in allowing buildings to be housed in such buildings. The old Jewett home is part of the school, and is an old-fashioned wooden building that would go up like paper if it caught fire.

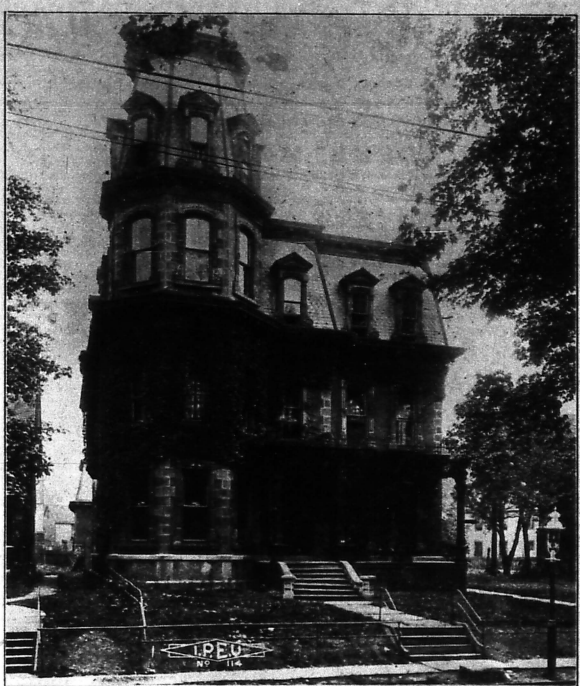

PROLETARIAN CLUB SECURES BEAUTIFUL NEW CLUB HOUSE

Workingmen's Organization Will Promote Interests of Working Class in Large West Side Mansion — Charter Will be Held Open a Few Days Longer for Belated Applications — Membership Growing by Leaps and Bounds — Brilliant Social Season Promised.

At last the Proletarian Club has secured a clubhouse in keeping with the aims and character of the organization. The new popular club for wheelmen during the bicycle craze of a dozen or more years ago.

Since the acquisition of club quarters the organization has taken on a new lease of life and applications for membership are pouring in daily. It is expected that the membership will be fully 500 by October 1, and will doubtless reach the 1,000 mark within a few weeks.

The building to be occupied by the club has 18 large rooms, including an assembly room or dance-hall which will easily seat 300. Arrangements have already been made to have the place completely furnished with pianos—two for each floor—pool tables, a library of 300 to 500 volumes, a buffet, etc., and when the formal opening takes place there will be many surprises in store for those who are fortunate enough to be among the members and invited guests.

Charter is Open. It is expected that the charter will be held open until 500 members have been secured, after which the initiation fee will be advanced so that those who desire to join would do well to lose no time.

For the benefit of those who are not familiar with the details of the organization of the club, which was organized last January, the following facts concerning it are given:

The objects of the club are to promote social fellowship among the members of the various workmen's organizations in Buffalo, and those who are in sympathy with the labor movement; to promote and encourage cooperative buying among its members; to provide pleasant surroundings for social affairs; to encourage the educational development of the workers and improve their conditions wherever possible; to promote the use of the union label, etc.

Everything used at the clubhouse will be the union label. Inasmuch as social entertainments will take care of most of the expense of conducting the club, the regular initiation fee will be low, only \$5 for men and \$2.50 for women. During the time when the charter is being held open even this low initiation fee will be advanced. For the next few days

The tramway workers of Dublin, Ireland, are going through the same school that the street car men of Buffalo received their first diploma from last spring. They are on strike and the companies are calling on the police to beat the workers into submission, but the workers of that city are giving a good account of themselves as far as fighting is concerned.

How much better it would be for the workers if they only knew enough to act with the same class-conscious spirit when they vote. With one of their own class as lord mayor of the city he would order the police to take sides with the workers just as naturally as the present incumbent gives orders to protect the bosses.

When workmen get together with voting capitalist politicians into office and elect men representing themselves on a party ticket owned and controlled by themselves strikers will be won without sending half the strikers to the hospital and half starving the other half. We need Socialism all over the world.

ARRESTING STREET SPEAKERS IN TORONTO, CANADA

Socialists and union officials caught preaching their Socialist theories to many outdoor meetings in Toronto have been annoyed, threatened, and arrested by constables. They will press their fight, however, to the highest court, if necessary.

The Toronto District Labor Council, the central trades union body, is helping in the fight, and has appointed a committee to co-operate with the Socialists in fighting for the right of free speech.

Many of the delegates to the council, Socialists, have been arrested for speaking on the streets, and have been subjected to the insults of the police and the magistrates.

DOORS FOUND LOCKED IN SHIRT WAIST FACTORY

The Triangle fire in which 145 girls lost their lives is fresh in the memory of the working class because of the outrageous looseness of the authorities in acquitting the proprietors who had locked the girls in the factory, thus shutting off the means of exit. What sends the proprietors of that factory can be judged by the fact that after that horrible lesson an inspector of the Bureau of Fire Protection of New York City found the doors of the factory now occupied by the same concern again locked.
