More Rough Work by Police Toughs—Cattell Manhandled and Punched by Capitalist Cop—Sherover Takes Stand and is Dragged Off.

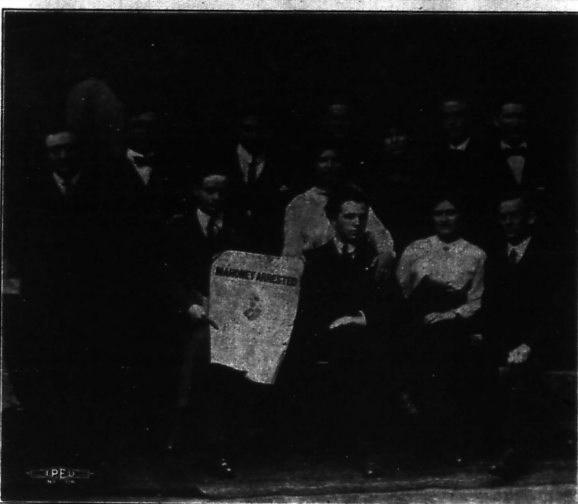

Socialists Arrested Friday Noon in Fight for Free Speech

ELEVEN ARRESTED FRIDAY NOON IN FIGHT FOR FREE SPEECH

Thousands of People on the Scene to Cheer Socialists—Police Beat Up Lawyer and Swear He is a Socialist Orator—Trouble Ahead for Tough Cops.

On Friday noon Lafayette Square was the scene of police rule of the City of Buffalo. Eleven people who had determined to take advantage of their constitutional rights were dragged off to the police station in the patrol wagon by a picked set of policemen noted for their brutal methods in handling the people of the waterfront.

When W. F. Cattell of the Buffalo Socialist mounted the stand to introduce the first speaker, he was taken from the position and arrested. Stephen J. Mahoney, Socialist candidate for Mayor, who was arrested the day before, was the next to take the stand and received the same treatment. Max Sherover was the next, followed by Daniel O'Brien, of No. 91 West Mohawk street; Samuel Leary, of No. 798 Seneca street; Daniel A. Niel, of James-town; W. F. Barnard, candidate for Congress on the Socialist ticket in the First district of Illinois; Marie Gross and Caroline Welty, of No. 141 Riverside avenue; Frank W. Saunders, lawyer, of No. 302 Brisbane Building.

Innocent bystanders were treated like cattle by the police, who were led by the Socialist candidate for Mayor, who was arrested the day before, was the next to take the stand and received the same treatment. Max Sherover was the next, followed by Daniel O'Brien, of No. 91 West Mohawk street; Samuel Leary, of No. 798 Seneca street; Daniel A. Niel, of James-town; W. F. 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Socialist Candidate Arrested for Speaking at Lafayette Square

Stephen J. Mahoney Pulled in Last Thursday Under the Guise of Violating a Park Law—Attempt to Discredit Socialist Candidate for Mayor.

Stephen J. Mahoney, Socialist candidate for Mayor of the City of Buffalo, was arrested last Thursday noon at Lafayette Square, on the excuse that the Square was park property.

When Mahoney, accompanied by Joseph Pelon, organizer of the Socialist Party, and Samuel Leary arrived at the Square they were informed that they would not be allowed to speak at that place, by orders which were supposed to emanate from the Superintendent of Parks.

Mahoney fully understood that it was within his rights to speak at that place and knew that the scheme had been contemplated for some time in order to stop the tirades of the Socialists on the campaign for Mayor. The fact that the affair was well planned is assured when one of our daily papers is known to have put an article in type on that subject, but for some reason did not publish it.

have thought they were forced to buy that
four such sites in the same locality.
