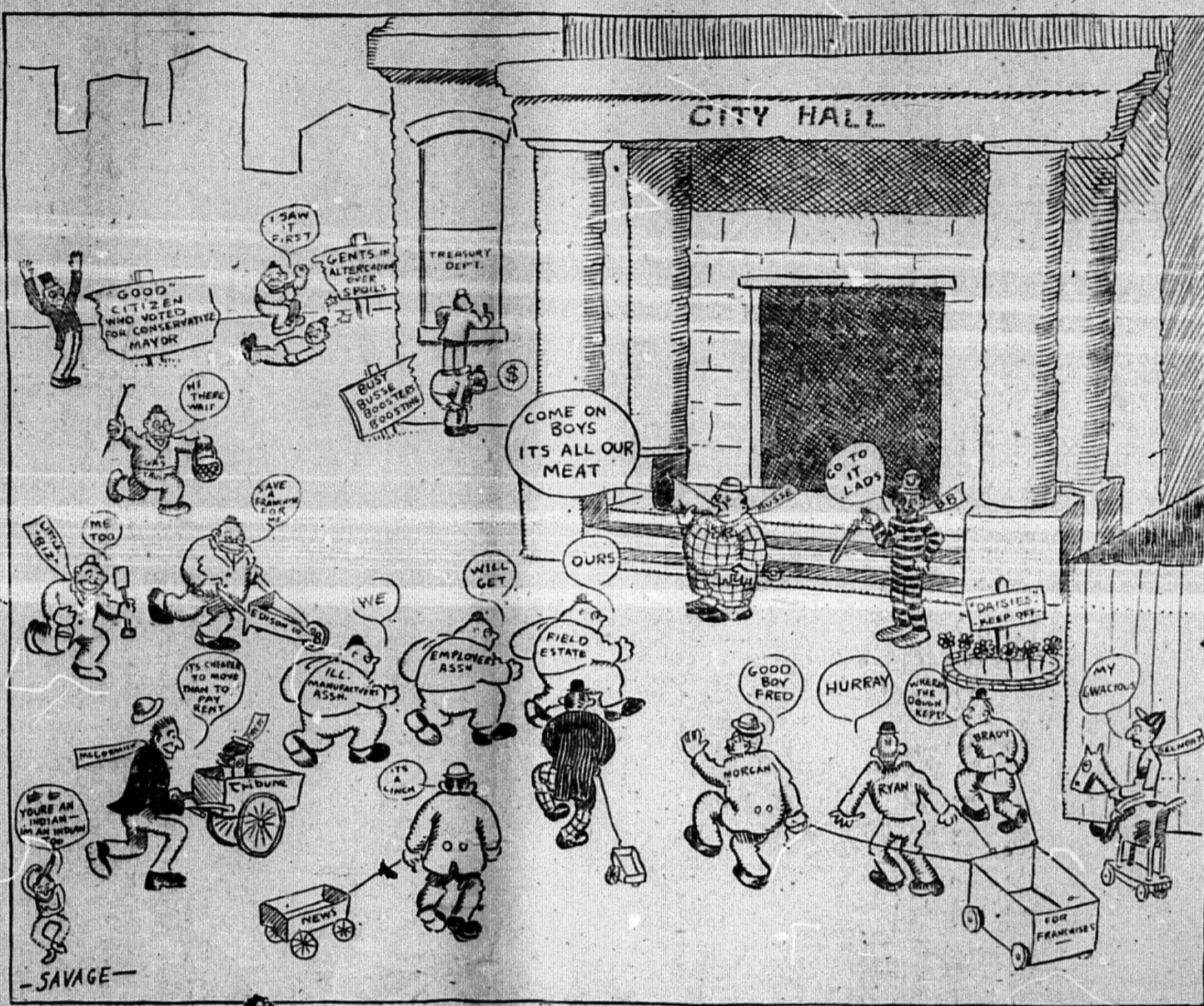
24 NATIONS AT JAP CONFERENCE

UNIONISTS TURN TO SOCIALISTS

End of Dunne--Radical Reform Movement Predicted by Labor Men. CARPENTERS WAIT TO SEE IF BUSSE IS KIND. Newspaper handlers Ready to Vote for Their Own Interests --M. O. Movement Killed

The World Is Ours

The future belongs to the Socialist. Never was this more apparent than in Chicago at this moment.

The one hope of the maintenance of capitalism is the formation of a radical party.

That hope is gone. The radical wing of the Democratic party is whipped, scattered, discredited. Its character as a stool pigeon for plutocracy has been heralded to the world, published in letters so large that even the blindest must see it.

Great capitalism is rampantly, riotously triumphant. Nationally and locally the trusts are in the saddle and will have an opportunity to work out their will. This is not something to regret.

The blundering, wabbling, weak-kneed Democracy, that is neither fish, flesh, fowl, nor good red herring, can neither direct capitalism nor combat it.

Recognizing that fact, the great capitalists have now grasped the machinery of both parties and are directing them as they please. They still try to use the Democracy as a decoy duck for little capitalists and half-baked Socialists, but in its present advanced state of decomposition it sends out an odor that warns all but the most simple.

The increasing fierceness of the class struggle is also tearing off the thin mask of radicalism which the Republican party had smeared over its face and Roosevelt, the "friend of labor," and the great trust-buster, is being exposed as the passive tool and instrument of these same trusts.

These lessons are being hammered into the heads of laborers with every recurring election. Seldom has this been more emphatically shown than at the one just held in Chicago.

Tens of thousands are ready to admit the truth of these facts. Thousands of others will do so if the facts are explained to them. This explaining is the task of Socialists. It is the especial task of the next year.

There is no possible answer to the logic of Socialism. It is as inevitable in its conclusions as the concentration of wealth, the impoverishment of the workers, and their ultimate revolt which it predicts.

There is no relief within capitalism. England is the classic land of capitalism. It is also the shining example of reform and compromise and radicalism.

IT IS ALSO THE HORRIBLE EXAMPLE OF THE DEPTHS TO WHICH THE WORKING CLASS CAN BE DEGRADED. That the workers of England are realizing this is seen by their contempt of radicalism and rapid growth of Socialism.

The same lesson is being learned here. Hundreds of thousands are ready to listen to it now. Never was Chicago so ripe for Socialist propaganda as today. Never was the Socialist organization so strong and determined.

Meet the Crisis

The next few months will be the most critical in many respects of any period in the history of the Socialist movement in this country.

The principal agency in building up that organization, and in doing the work of education, will be, as it always has been in the past, the Socialist press.

During the next few months there will be strikes and lockouts and injunctions, as there always have been, and always will be so long as men must fight with masters over the terms on which muscle and brain must be sold in the labor market.

There will be but one daily paper in the English language that will fight for labor in every contest. There will be but one daily in the city of Chicago whose columns will not be censored by a millionaire.

The campaign which has just ended has been eloquent in its proof of the prostitution of the press to the purposes of plutocracy.

There is not one of the papers of Chicago that did not pay its little part in deceiving and misleading the workers.

The whole affair has shown that the only paper upon which the workers can depend is one which they themselves own and control. In the Daily Socialist they have such a paper. During the period of its existence its most enemy has never accused it of proving false to the interests of labor.

During the months that are to come it will be much more effective in the fight than it has ever been before. Nearly every union in Chicago has taken up the fight for Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone.

THE ONLY DAILY PAPER THAT HAS DARED TO SPEAK IN THEIR DEFENSE HAS BEEN THE DAILY SOCIALIST.

The unions have recognized this fact by appropriating money from their own treasuries to furnish the Daily Socialist with dispatches from the trial. To make this service as effective as possible the services of the Appeal to Reason press bureau with its correspondents has been arranged for and will send full accounts every day.

It is a strong commentary on the character of the daily press when the trade unions are compelled to hire their own correspondents to secure the truth about the greatest legal battle of the last decade.

It should teach those trade unionists that, if the daily papers will lie in their news columns about the labor movement, it is rather foolish to accept their editorial advice during a campaign.

It should teach them that they can only hope to reach even their own membership with the truth when they maintain and patronize a paper that is completely devoted to their interests.

One of the reasons for these remarks is that the Daily Socialist needs the help of its owners and readers just at this time, as much as at any time in its history.

The new plant is now installed and is in working order, and the results of its operation so far show that the expense of production will be reduced to the point where the deficit which has so far burdened the paper will entirely disappear.

It is expected that a full financial report will be published in a few days, giving the exact standing of the paper—something, by the way, that no daily paper in Chicago ever dared to do before.

The fact which must be faced now is that there is a pressing debt of about three thousand dollars that must be met during the next ten days.

THERE MUST BE NO DELAY ABOUT THIS MATTER IF THE PAPER IS NOT GOING TO BE PERMANENTLY CRIPPLED.

It should be raised by stock subscriptions during the coming week. The unions of Chicago have many of them given all that could be expected. There are others that have done nothing.

The same thing is true of the Socialist party locals. Some have given until they have faxed their membership to the limit. Others have done nothing.

The next few days will be those of the greatest need. Whatever anyone, individual or organization, can do should be done at once.

Do not lay this paper down until you have determined to make as strong an effort as you can for yourself by strengthening your paper, your strongest weapon in your fight for better conditions.

This is probably the last urgent call for assistance that need ever be made for the Daily Socialist. If it is met as it should be, the workers will have a firmly established daily organ.
