

Their dead bodies were removed from the building yesterday. The rescuers took out the beef cattle with the no less helpless wage-cattle, who are of no more account to Armour than the hoofed animals.

The reporter of the Daily Socialist and his friend moved through the building yesterday in the guise of laborers seeking employment. After finding where the two bodies had been discovered on the first floor, only four hours before, they made for the passage-way. They started from the spot on the second floor where the ammonia pipe had burst and followed in the exact tracks of the men who tried, to no svall, Thursday to gain the air. They descended a narrow stairway and made for a narrow passage-way alongside of which lay many empty burrels.

They entered the passage-way ten to fitteen feet. The gas fumes which assailed them were still strong, but they pushed on and with smarting, streaming eyes and with lungs gasping for air passed through a door and descended a slight incline into another room in which lay a vat.

At the end of the room there was a

chanical engineer, and P. Stewart, manager for Hibbard, Spencer, Bartlett & Co., 'a union-busting concern. Coroner Hoffman assigned Deputy Coroner M. Hartney to take the family history of each man killed.

Boiler Inspector William Lump and Inspectors Robert Knight and Patrick Mahoney attempted an inspection of the broken pipe yesterday morning, but were unable to do so because of the dense fumes still in the building and which three big electric fans had failed to remove.

One theory of the cause of the accident is the intense cold in the chill room, which caused the snapping of the pipe. Another is that the pipe had rusted thin and burst under pressure. The coroner's jury was unable to investigate the chill room in the morning. Capt. Clancy of the stockyards police station left instructions to have officers stationed at the door of the room and to permit no one to enter until proper authorities had investigated. Washington, D. #### 700 RULES IN MIND OF N. Y. C. ENGINEERS

Appalling Tax on Human Mind Is Presumed to Conserve Human Life

The extreme limit of rules has been ached in the operation of passenge trains on the New York Central. For

and New York, for instance, has called for about 700 rules for each 125 miles between the two cities, for the safety of the public, but the public may well look askance when it learns that one man must remember 700 of them, and that a slip of any one rule may mean a shocking loss of human life.

These 700 rules are the average for each division of the chief railroad lines running west from New York. Each set covers the work of one engineer, who drives his train until another engineer, with a fresh set of rules, and presumably a fresh memory, relieves him.

In other words, eight men, the aver-age number of locomotive engineers who drive a fast train between New York

drive a fast train between New York and Chicago, must keep constantly in mind nyarly 6,000 different rules, in order that patrons of these trains may travel without risking their lives.

Paris, May 27.—That the year which is just closing in France upder socalled radical regime has been a year not of radicalism but of reaction, is asserted by the Socialist party of France. In a manifesto issued and signed by everyone of the fifty Socialist representatives in Parliament, the reactionary acts of the government are pointed out one by one.

Domestic affairs, colonial, labor questions, militarism, the manifesto reads, all these questions have been treated by the government in exactly the opposite manner in which it promised to treat them.

Hundreds of people are under arrest for no offense, merely because the military powers thought it to their interests to throw these men in prisons.

Pleads That City Employes Given Enough to Keep Soul and Body Together

Cincinnati O., May 27.—Mayor Dempsey recommended to the board of public service to raise the wages of laborers employed by the city from \$1.60 a day to \$2 a day and upward. He says that while the increased cost of living is affecting these workers like all others, the laborers have shared hardly at all in the increase in wages resulting from the changed conditions.

He urges the board to include them in the plan of wage increase which has been applied to the other tepartments of the city government. His suggestion is that \$2 a day be made the lowest pay and that the men be granted from that up to \$2.50 a day.




