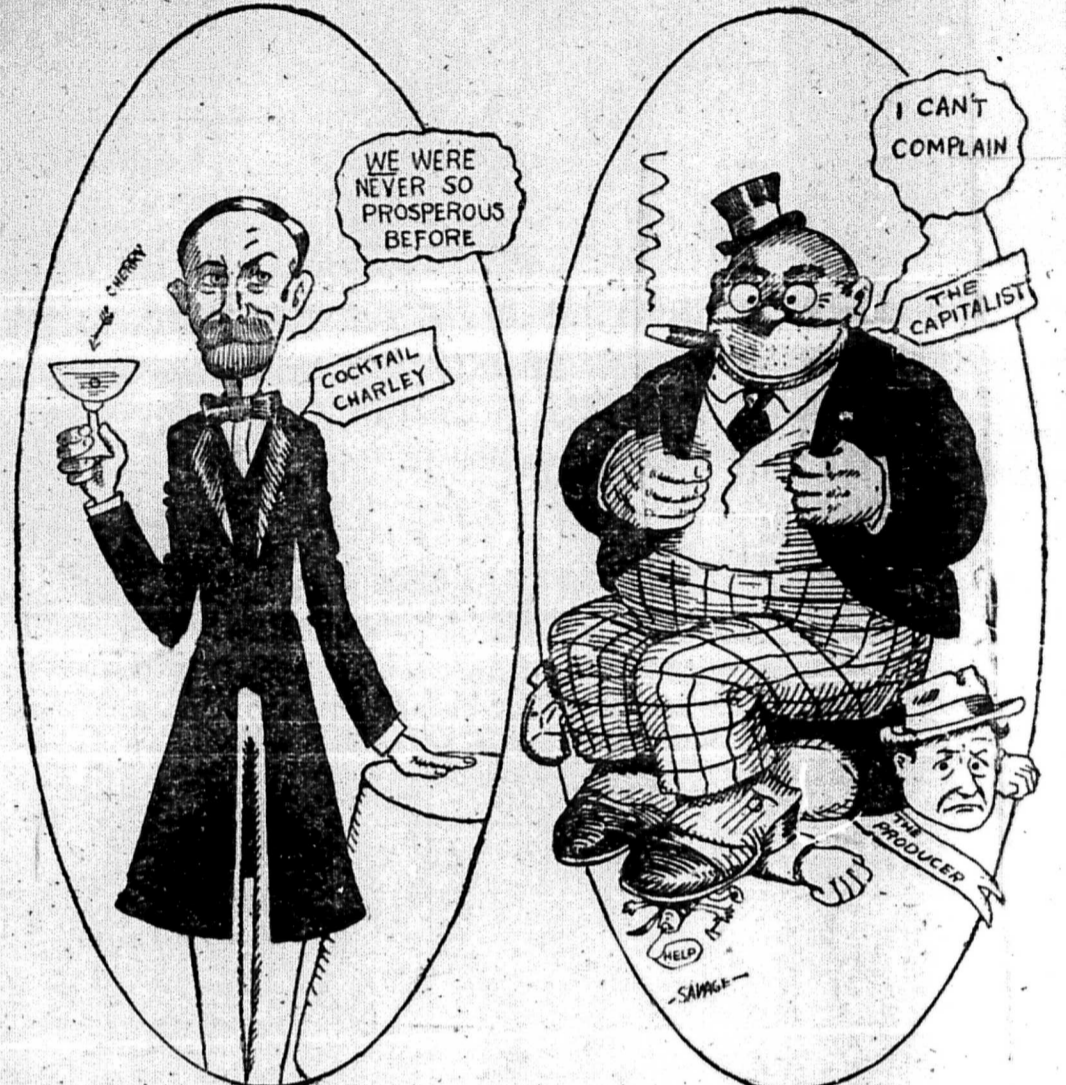

IRISH FEINS PLANS REVOLT; SILENCE FEINS WILL MEET

(United Press Associations Cable.)
 Dublin, Aug. 30.—Having for its avowed purpose the unroaring of John Redmond as leader of the Irish movement and the establishment of an entirely new program to gain the great desire of Irishmen—home rule, the convention of the national council of the Sinn Fein since the society has grown into national importance began today.

By many persons it is regarded as the most significant political gathering Ireland has witnessed in years.

The four cardinal principles of the Sinn Fein are under consideration. They are:

First—Withdrawing Irish representatives from the parliament.

Second—Establishing an Irish parliament in Dublin without British consent.

Third—Revival of Irish industries.

Fourth—Boycotting everything English.

Another purpose which will be discussed will be how to affect agriculture and raise prices to put Sinn Fein candidates in parliament in the field against the Nationalists, headed by Redmond.

By withdrawing Irish members of parliament, the Sinn Fein believes it separates Irish parliament from England, as Hungary did, by refusing to participate in the Austrian legislature.

While an Irish parliament in Dublin would lack legal authority, it is proposed to direct concerted action of local government boards through patriotic and moral suasion.

By reviving Irish industries, the Sinn Fein believes it can materially strengthen the Irish cause. It is proposed to establish an independent Irish consular service on the principle of the proposed Dublin parliament.

By boycotting English goods, the Sinn Fein believes it can drive out English capitalists and would effect factories in Ireland if convinced Irishmen will stand by the purpose.

DITCH DATA IN CANAL REPORT

Washington, Aug. 29.—The Panama canal commission has issued a report, the chief features of which are:

Total amount to be excavated by the United States, 111,230,000 cubic yards. Excavated up to Aug. 1 of this year, 9,250,000 cubic yards.

Eight per cent one-half percent of the total necessary excavation done after three years steady work.

Largest month's work, 1,126,748 cubic yards, July, 1907.

First ship may go through canal in 1915, but may be delayed 2 or years later.

Total money appropriated by congress, \$125,905,568.55.

Estimated cost of excavation, \$4.21 per cubic yard, including administration, sanitation, machinery, materials, etc.

At same rate, cost of finishing canal, \$211,000,000, approximately.

POSTAL CHEATS A GRAM MAN

The Lipscomb Grain and Seed Company, Liberal, Mo., sent to the Chicago Daily Socialist a Postal Telegraph envelope with a stamp upon it and a lot of postmarks.

The company also sends the following letter:

"We have read in the Daily Socialist that it has been a practice of the telegraph companies to receive messages of their customers and then send them by mail. We enclose you an envelope that came to us through the regular United States mail with a Postal Telegraph message from Chattanooga, Tenn."

"Our customer at the other end paid from 75 cents to \$1 for this message and it reached us on train later than if it had not been held by the telegraph company and had been mailed promptly at Chattanooga to us at Liberal."

"We haven't sent a message since the strike was declared and this is the second one we have received and the first one that has been mailed to us."

Local Option and Temperate Ideas Threaten Profits of Froth Makers

 Cincinnati, O., Aug. 29.—An important movement is pending among the brewers of the United States.

A meeting was held yesterday at the Sinton hotel which will result in a definite plan to stop the spread of the local option idea, especially in the south, which was the prime object of the meeting.

Representatives of the big brewery industry of the country were present, including the brewers of Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Louis and Cincinnati. The broads that local option is making, especially in the south, were thoroughly discussed, and it was decided that some action would have to be taken. A committee was appointed to study the means for accomplishing the purposes of the meeting will be decided upon.

ANARCHISTS FOR INDIVIDUALITY

(United Press Associations Cable.)
 Amsterdam, Holland, Aug. 30.—American laws were made the subject of bitter criticism by Emma Goldman, the American anarchist, in an address to the international anarchist congress now in session here.

She declared that the statutes of the United States are so strict and severe that it is practically impossible to carry on the anarchistic propaganda. Anarchy, however, is growing in America, she declared.

It is especially gaining adherents among the Jewish working people. "Many anarchists have gone from the United States to help remove the despotism of Russia," she exclaimed.

Max Maginski, a Russian delegate, criticized the anarchists of America, as well as the working classes of that country generally. "Laborers of European countries all want a revolution," he said, "but in the United States working people do not want an uprising because they live in a free country."

An interesting discussion was called out on the proposition of pushing anarchistic propaganda. Many delegates declared against organizations and voting on different questions. In such cases, they said, the majority suppresses the minority, and this is contrary to the principle of anarchy.

A motion declaring that the anarchists' federation is an association "for the interests of individuals or groups of individuals which can never get executive power" was adopted. Emma Goldman was one of the most enthusiastic supporters of the measure.

WHEN BUDDY CREEK CLEAN?

The refuse and rubbish which covers Buddy Creek impedes navigation, so the creek is to be cleaned and the rubbish swept away by a stream of fresh water from the Thirty-ninth street pumping station.

Filled with refuse and filth from the stockyard, Buddy Creek has long been a foul, stagnant, disease infected water hole and a menace to the poor people who had to live near it. No other country in the world could equal it.

Past attempts to drain or improve it have failed. Now it is believed that the creek can be made to serve business interests to a better advantage and the sanitary board has authorized \$100,000 to start the pumps.

NEGRO DESPERADO KILLS THREE PEACE OFFICERS

 Thomasville, Ga., Aug. 30.—Lying behind him three dead officers, whom he shot to escape, being captured, Charles Williams, a negro outlaw, is fleeing toward Florida with a posse in pursuit.

The negro began his career of murder in Grady county Monday night, when, resisting arrest at the hands of Sheriff Tyler, he shot the officer dead. A posse headed by Marshal Cardell pursued the negro and surrounded him in a cabin. The posse prepared to close in on him, headed by Marshal Cardell, when the negro fired and Cardell fell dead. Firing as he ran, Williams escaped.

Another posse, headed by Deputy Sheriff Hunicutt, took up the pursuit and came up with the negro Wednesday afternoon. He immediately fired, killing Deputy Hunicutt. The desecration of the peace and negro again escaped.

VACCINATE CHILDREN? 600 MOTHERS SAY NO; JEER DOCTOR

Six hundred women of Aurora last night jeered a vaccine expert, Dr. Herman Sperring, chief of the contagious disease department of the Chicago health bureau, when he attempted to address them after they had called a general indignation meeting to protest against a blanket vaccination order of the town to inoculate everything and everybody in sight.

The women declare that the order is merely a scheme of the doctors to get fees for vaccinating the 6,000 school children of Aurora.

The women held a mass meeting following the declaration of Attorney John M. Randolph, a former mayor of the town, that no legal order for a general vaccination could be issued except in case of an epidemic.

Therefore, when the doctor from Chicago rose to address them on the beauties of vaccination and the sacrificing of a large number of dollars to the medical profession he was greeted with cat calls and jeers. Then the doctor stood upon his dignity and said unless the order were complied with Chicago would quarantine against Aurora.

"Let 'er quarantine," shouted the women. "Go back to Chicago and let Aurora take care of herself."

The meeting proceeded with the appointment of a committee which will see counsel and have the objectionable clause taken out of the books, and falling in that will go to the courts to determine whether the doctors have the right to compel such a move as is contemplated. All Aurora is up in arms, declaring it will never succumb to a sweeping vaccination order.

MAKE NEW EFFORT TO CAPTURE TAYLOR

 Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 30.—Ex-Governor William S. Taylor today received the letter from Commonwealth Attorney Robert Watt, of Frankfort, Kentucky, enclosing a letter from Governor Beckham, in which the latter promises a military guard for Taylor if he will return to Kentucky to testify in the Caleb Powers case. Taylor said: "I received Franklin's letter this morning. Such an important matter as my accepting or refusing the invitation cannot be decided on the instant. However, I will know what I will do within twenty-four hours."

Friends of Taylor expect him to make a short statement, but none of them expect him to return to Kentucky.

NEVER TOOK VACATION; NOW HE'S A DEFAULTER

 New York, Aug. 30.—Charged with having robbed his employers, G. B. Salisbury & Co., stock brokers, of \$9,000, which it is claimed he lost in playing the races, speculation and fast living, Edward F. Phillips, aged 37, of Hoboken, was arrested today. He was taken to the Tombs police court for a hearing. Otto Sternfeld, attorney for the firm, declared that Phillips had been employed by Salisbury & Co. for about six years as a clerk and had charge of the check, bank and cash books. An examination of these shows his alleged stealings amount to at least \$9,000.

Phillips had been noted in the office for never having taken a vacation. Yesterday he surprised his employers by taking the day off. In his absence a clerk who had become suspicious sent for the bank books and started an examination.

SOMERSAULT BY AUTOMOBILE

(By United Press Associations.)
 New York, Aug. 29.—The sudden terrible death of Mrs. Robert C. Kelsey, killed when the automobile in which she was riding suddenly leaped into the air and turned a somersault, hurling her out to instant death, has put a sudden check upon the speed mania of automobile enthusiasts. The most shocking accident known to automobilism, a burst tire, caused the accident.

Stewart Elliott, with whom Mrs. Kelsey was riding, is in a serious condition today from the shock of the accident, as well as his injuries. A dislocated kneecap, several broken ribs, three fingers broken and numerous bruises and cuts. He saved his life by clinging to the steering wheel when the machine made its leap into the air. Kelsey and chauffeur were trampled by Elliott and Mrs. Kelsey at the Morris Park track when the fatal accident happened. The cars were going fifty miles an hour and Elliott had gained a short lead when the tire was broken.

Then the giant car made its sudden leap. Mrs. Kelsey was thrown out. Kelsey had just time to evert his car to avoid running over his wife's body. Mrs. Kelsey's neck was broken.

Elliott, who was arrested on a charge of manslaughter, was finally paroled in Kelsey's custody on the representation of the husband that he was blameless. Mrs. Kelsey was Miss Emily Lewis of Toledo, 32 years old, a handsome and accomplished woman and an expert automobile driver. She had no children. Kelsey is a wealthy real estate operator.

JOHN D. JUST WANTS WHAT'S COMIN' TO HIM
