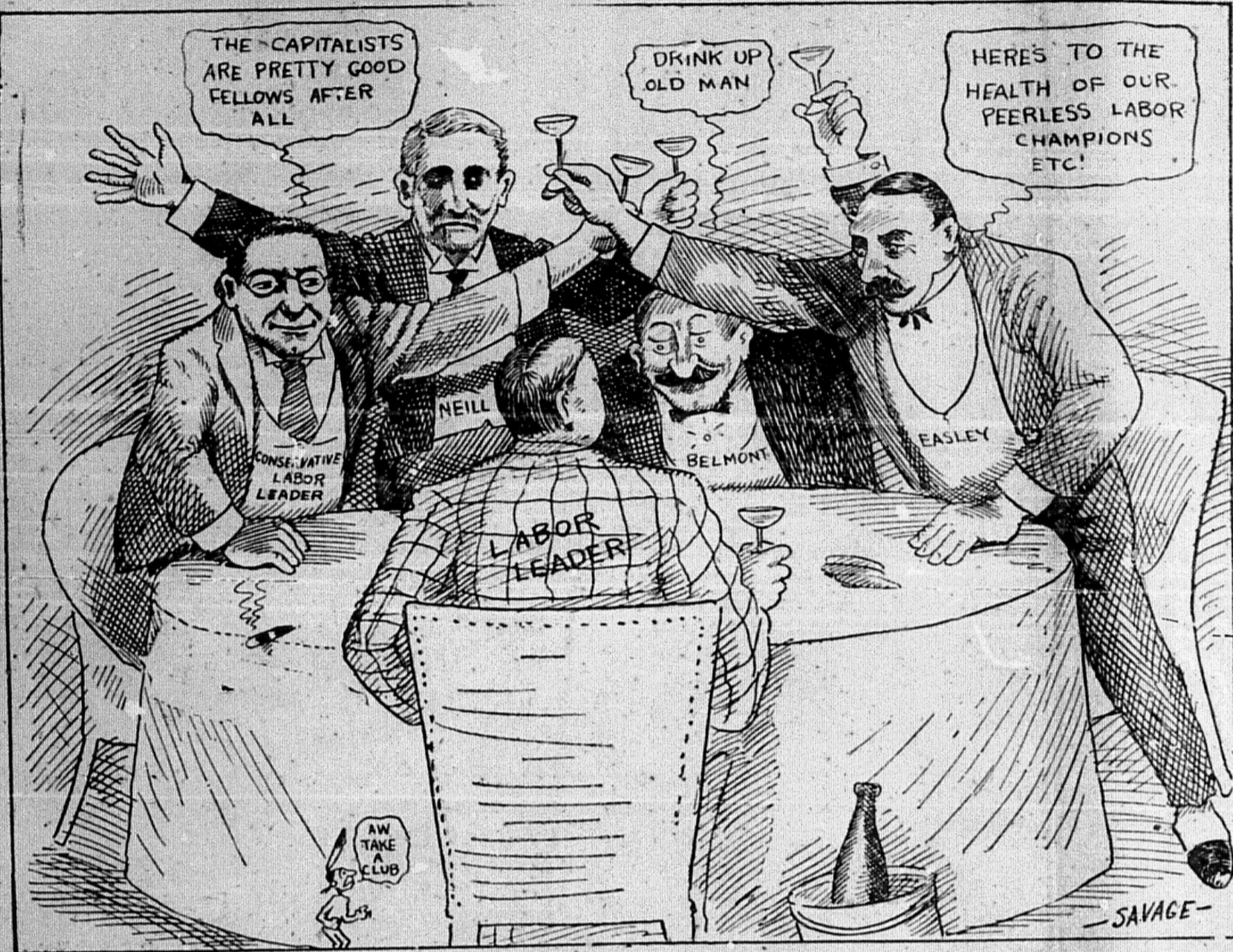


One Way Not to Win a Strike
