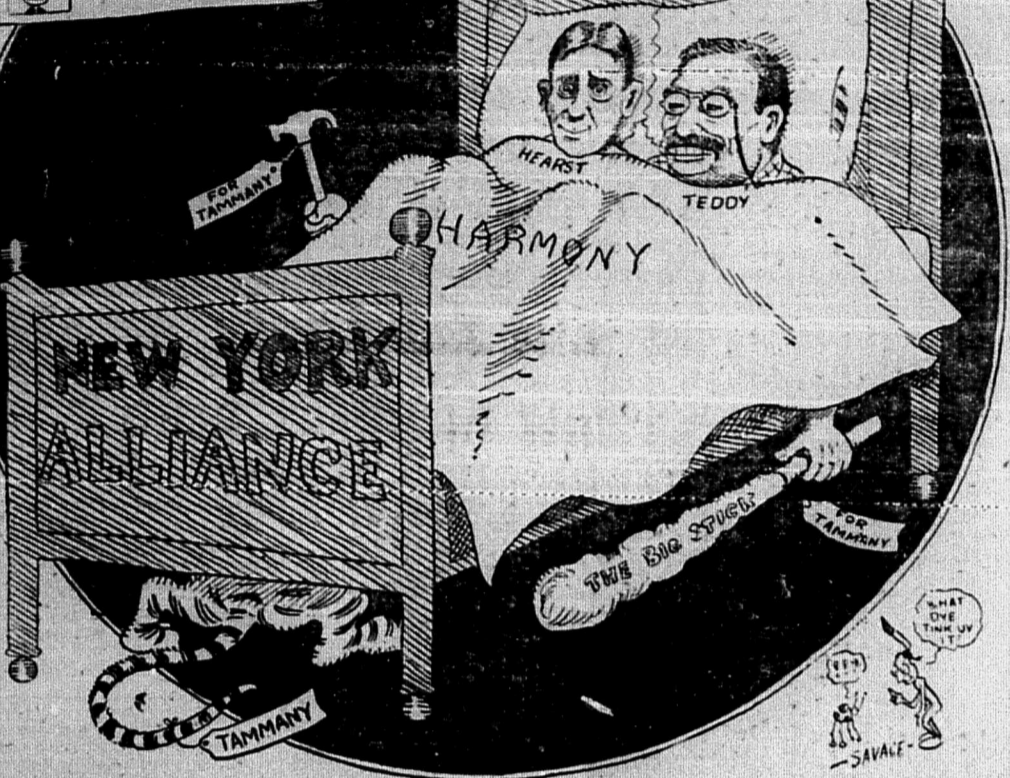

TONS OF DOPE FOR CIGARETS

Startling information has reached Chicago. Consul M. A. Jewett of Trebizond, Asia Minor, states that Turkish tobacco to the aggregate of 600 tons was sent out of that province to penetrate the United States.

The annual exports are 17,000, and the bulk not included in exportation to the United States went to scent European countries. The American tobacco trust, to use a phrase of the street, has the Turkish tobacco game "skinned to death."

CHANCE TO VOTE FOR \$20,000,000 CANAL SOON

Springfield, Ill., Oct. 17.—At the fall election next year the people of the state will vote on the question of issuing \$20,000,000 worth of bonds for the construction of a deep waterway from Lockport to Utica in the Illinois river.

Moline branch of the Rock Island local will have Eugene V. Debs on Oct. 21. The meeting promises to be one of the most interesting ever held by the branch and a large attendance is anticipated.

ALABAMA IS AFTER FARMERS

Fairhope, Ala., Oct. 5.—The Alabama state Socialist committee has issued a campaign for educational purposes among the farmers of the state and is adopting a systematic plan for interesting them.

The local has mailed hundreds of copies of "Studies in Socialism" to prominent members of the farmers' union and looks forward to gratifying results.

The committee has passed the following resolution bearing on the support of a daily Socialist press: "Be resolved, That we, the Fairhope local of the Socialist party of Alabama, consider that the most important work before us at present is the establishment of a first basis of a daily paper in the interest of Socialists and the working class."

"CONTEMPT OF COURT" RESTORES FAMOUS BRITISH DEBTORS' PRISON

Washington, Oct. 17.—Consul F. W. Mahin, in a report from Nottingham, says that imprisonment for debt was nominally abolished in England many years ago, but paradoxically, the actual number of cases of imprisonment has since annually increased—faster than the population.

More judicial option is possible than formerly was the case and is exercised under the existing law. A debtor against whom judgment is rendered may be summarily required to pay before a given date on penalty of imprisonment.

This power of committal resides in the judge of the court. Some judges exercise it much more freely than others.

But it would seem that on the whole the indulgence shown to delinquent debtors is steadily decreasing, for the cases of imprisonment in the country have decennially increased under existing law.

Technically the imprisonment for contempt of court. The judge orders the debtor to pay before a given date, failing which he may be jailed for contempt, not exceeding forty days, unless any case may be released at once if he pays in the meantime.

In Milwaukee, where some experience with Socialism and Socialists has been had, the Milwaukee News is lauded at the recent doing against the Socialists in England.

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St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 17.—St. Louis brewers contemplate making two glasses of beer grow where but one grew before after Nov. 1, as the result of the 20 per cent increase in the price of beer, which will in all probability be made.

Increased cost of labor and materials is said to make the increase necessary. The price of barley has increased during the last three years over 100 per cent.

Labor is also an important item in the increased price. Last spring the new contracts with the brewery workers' unions called for a higher wage scale and this increase, it is said, added to the probable rise in prices.
