

"PILE SOCIALISTS TEN DEEP IN PRISON": SEATTLE BOSS

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 20.—The wholesale arrest of Socialists may mean that Mayor Moore is trying to square himself with Councilman Hiram C. Gill and the support of Gill and Gill's supporters.

Payrolls Reduced \$2,250,000 a Week "In this one line of business alone the payrolls have been reduced to the extent of approximately \$2,250,000 a week. Including the percentage retrenchment in other branches of business, the amount of money required for payroll purposes is millions of dollars less than a short time ago."

Retrenchment is the order of the day. The Tennessee and Republic companies have shut down two furnaces at Oxmoor, two at Bessemer and one at Thomas. The Sloss-Sheffield has shut down a furnace at North Birmingham.

Lay Off Men to Improve Conditions "Manufacturers point out that while gold imports, increased circulation, etc., will go a long way toward bringing about normal money conditions, the retrenchment policy of the manufacturing companies will do more toward relieving the situation than anything else."
