QUARRY STRIKE AT JOLIET; STRIKE BREAKERS RIOT

Police Appeal to Sheriff: Many Shots Fired and Several Men Wounded: Bullet Shatters Window of a Dwelling

Joliet, Ill., Nov. 22.—Early today there was a riot near the quarry of the Western Stone company here, in which three striking quarrymen are believed to have been shot.

About 2,500 of these men struck last Monday, refusing to accept a reduction in wages of 2½ cents an hour. They had been paid 20 cents, and the company proposed to reduce wages to 17½ cents.

This moraling the company brought a crowd of strikebreakers from Lemont to appu up its works. They were methy some of the strikers, who altomated to explain matters to them and ask them to refuse to take their olaces.

Sheriff Called Upon

From accurate accounts, the strikes breakers became warlike and attacked some of the strikers, which immediately started a fight. The police were mable to cope with the situation and eslied upon the sheriff for aid.

'A number of these were at once sworn in as deputy sacriffs and rushed to the assistance of the police, who were paridly becoming oyerpowered.

It is believed that the police and sheriffs did all the shooting. More than 1900 shots are said to have been fired knives and other weapons were also freely used.

BROKER WIREMEN HAYWOOD SAYS: MAY BE REDUCED REFUSE SCRIP

The Commercial Telegraphers' union is having its experience with contracts. Such brokerage firms as have a right to do so under the agreements made during the recent telegraph strike have notified the union that sixty days sence the wages will be restored to what they were before the strike.

These agreements are not uniform with all the brokers and leased wire firms. Some cannot break the contract until a year has expired, and then only in certain months. Others may give sixty days' notice at any-time.

The agreements were the subject of much discussion during the strike. Certain strikers wanted the agreements broken and the operators called out, believing that the companies alled out, believing that the companies would than sout's with its employes.
