

DEATH CLAIMS WHO PREPARED OWN OBSEQUIES

Workman Makes Coffin With Own Hands to Prevent a Charity Funeral

(Special to Daily Socialist.) Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 4.—Benjamin F. Berry, who got ready his own coffin, is dead. He was a poor man. For months prior to the end Berry, who was a carpenter, had recognized the inevitable and bowed to it. He felt that disease gripping at his vitals would ere long prove fatal and he prepared. Berry built himself a coffin. And yesterday morning, when a simple funeral procession wended its way over the country roads to Augusta's cemetery, northwest of the city, all that was mortal of "Ben" Berry was laid to rest in the casket that he had built.

Trade His Sole Pride. Berry was a carpenter whose trade was his sole capital as well as his pride. United, too, with this characteristic was a desire that dominated. And when the accumulation of years of hard toil was lost some time ago Berry gave himself by the work of his hands what fate would have snatched away at the last—a decent burial. His reverses took him to the home of distant relatives at 817 West Thirteenth street. It was in his little room, furnished by the kindness of others, that Berry aided his last months with the gruesome work of building his coffin. Also with meager savings, to match the coffin, Berry purchased a handsome black suit of clothing, but this was the last. Dec. 1, 1907, the work was done and Berry died.

Prevents Charity Burial. The end came quickly. Dec. 10, City hospital records say, Berry was admitted, suffering from asthma and heart trouble. Only once did Berry refer to the casket which waited his melancholy office, when he said to a fellow patient at the hospital: "I'm ready, let it come. It won't be charity that lays me in the grave." Wednesday the grim visitor came and found Berry ready. The man who had made his own coffin, slept and talked to himself, yesterday when Calvin Hatfield of Augusta, drove to the hospital to take charge of the body in his wagon was a covered object toward which Hatfield nodded when he reached.

NATION MAY MANUFACTURE DIPHTHERIA ANTITOXIN

Representative De Armond has introduced a measure, providing for the manufacture and sale of diphtheria antitoxin by the federal government at a price not exceeding 10 per centum above the cost of production. The bill has been referred to the House committee on military affairs. De Armond states that he has been induced to present this bill in the House because of information he has received to the effect that commercial diphtheria is unnecessarily costly. An appropriation of \$100,000 is asked to carry the act into effect.

WHOLE TOWN WITHOUT FOOD

Men Found Helpless and Starving When Big Plant Closes. (Special to Daily Socialist.) Buffalo, N. Y., Feb. 4.—A town facing starvation. This is the situation at Seneca, near here, suffering in so grimly real that capitalist papers are bemoaning the awful news to the world. A half dozen able-bodied men were found on the verge of death from lack of food and had to be revived by stimulants before they could be taken to a hospital, while many families are discovered every day without either food or fuel.

SUPREME COURT STRIKES NEW BLOW AT LABOR; \$240,000 BOYCOTT FINE

Uses Sherman Anti-Trust Act to Inflict Sharp Penalty on Hatters' Union for Opposing Non-Union Firm—Third Adverse Decision Within a Month—Next One Will Hit A. F. of L. (Special to Daily Socialist.) Washington, D. C., Feb. 4.—If the Sherman anti-trust act cannot be used effectively to curb the trusts, it can at least be used on the labor unions. The United States Supreme court is still grinding out decisions against organized labor. Soon organized labor will wake some morning to find that it is unconstitutional to wear a union button.

Another Blow Coming. Following the action of Justice Gould in issuing an injunction against the American Federation of Labor and members of its executive committee prohibiting the publication of the name of the Buck Stove and Range company on the Federation's "unfair list," the conviction is entered that the appeal planned in that case will result in the affirming of Justice Gould's ruling.

Why Law Was Violated. The hatters' union violated the Sherman anti-trust law because it would not allow its members to work for a firm that was against the union and because it induced others to keep away from the factory of Loewe & Co. The fact that the firm was against the union was also published. This "restrained" trade, not because the hatters' union had combined to make up all the available hat material and hold the product, selling the hats as it saw fit and at its own prices, but because union labor and people that sympathize with the workers did not care to buy "scab" hats. This was considered a violation of the seventh section of the Sherman law.

Restraint of Trade. The chief justice said: "In our opinion the combination described in the declaration is a combination in restraint of trade or commerce among the several states in the sense in which those words are used in the act and the action can be maintained accordingly." "That conclusion rests on many judgments of this court to the effect that the act prohibits any combination whatever to secure action which essentially obstructs the free flow of commerce between the states, or restricts, in that regard, the liberty of a trade to engage in business."

Won Two Victories. This suit came from the United States Circuit court for the district of Connecticut, and had twice been decided in favor of the hatters' union. Loewe & Co. alleged damages to the extent of \$80,000 on account of the

The resolution provides that the Belgian labor bureau on strikes reports that there were 117 strikers in 1907, involving 43,514 workmen, and only 79 to 81 strikes per year in the three succeeding years, while in 1905 there were 182 strikes, in which 75,672 took part. Strikes were most frequent in the mining and textile industries and took place often in the larger mills than in the smaller ones. The loss in wages in 1905 was \$2,508,270; in 1906, \$4,158; in 1907, \$5,130; in 1904, \$340,270, and in 1905, \$5,583,282.
 —Following similar action in other states the agricultural population of Colorado and the state federation of labor are planning an affiliation.

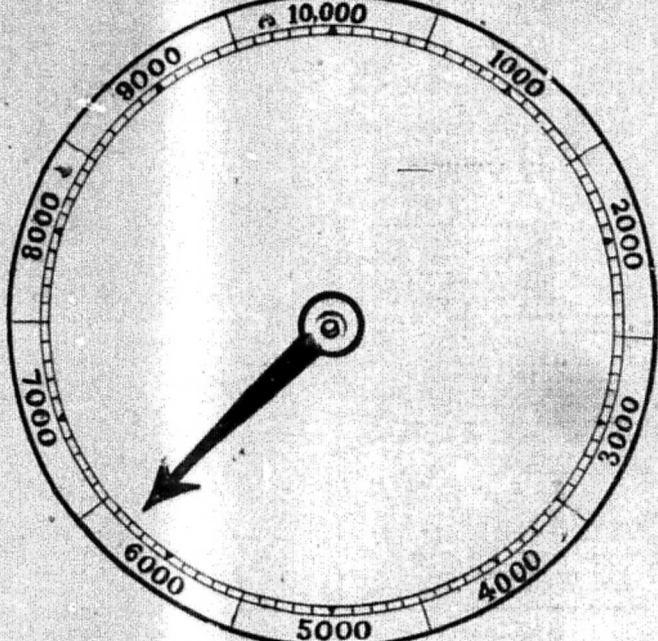
WANT ROOSEVELT TO SIT ON "LID"

Union Would Rent Halls
 The International Freight Handlers and Railway Clerks' union has leased the hall and offices in the Yonkers building, Halsted and Van Buren streets. This organization announces that it has several dates open for halls and offices to rent, as well as deck room. There are four halls in the building, seating from 40 to 500 people.
 Teamsters Seek Advance
 The teamsters are seeking an advance in wages. This matter will soon be taken up by some of the various "teamsters' organizations. One-horse drivers want an advance of \$1.25, making \$14.25 a week. Two, three and four horse drivers may ask for a raise of \$2 a week, making between \$17 and \$18. Team owners are considering preparing to raise prices, making the minimum \$6 a day for a team instead of \$5.
 Printing Pressmen Rejoice
 The victory of the printing pressmen in Judge Thompson's court at Cincinnati, O., was cause for rejoicing around local headquarters. The Typothetae will have to bear all the expenses in connection with this suit.
 The suit was concerning an injunction asked for by the Typothetae to permanently restrain the national body from supporting a strike of the various locals for the eight-hour day.
 The national committee, it seems, had taken it upon themselves to sign an agreement with the Typothetae not to ask for the eight-hour day before Jan. 1, 1909. This agreement was repudiated at the Niagara convention last year.
 Judge Thompson's decision upholds the contention of the pressmen in every respect. It practically makes null and void the five years' agreement.
 In Chicago the pressmen stand organized practically as a unit, very few of the employed pressmen being non-union.
