

Gompers and Bryan

Samuel Gompers has announced that he will take the stump for Bryan. As a private individual, as a trade unionist even, no one has a right to criticise him for so doing, except in so far as to dispute his good judgment.

But he is not going to speak simply as an individual and as an officer of the American Federation of Labor. He presumes to speak FOR THE MEMBERSHIP OF THAT ORGANIZATION. He speaks for Bryan, under the pretense that Bryan and the Democratic party embody the interests of organized labor.

He is asking that the trade unionists vote for Bryan and the Democratic party as a means of defending their interests.

There are some places where the Democratic party is supreme where it has for years had an opportunity to carry out its policies.

In the states of Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Texas, Louisiana, South Carolina, North Carolina and Florida there is none to dispute the power of the Democratic party. Governors, legislatures, courts, all are in the hands of this party for which Gompers is pre-

From these states will come a majority of the Democratic congressmen who must be depended upon to carry out any legislation in favor of labor. From these states will come the overwhelming mass of the electoral votes upon which Bryan must depend for elec-

In these states, then, if the Democratic party is the friend of labor, we should be able to discover the most favorable legislation, of failure the best organized trades, the greatest favors shown to trade union-

Will Gompers "point with pride" to the Democratic record in these states? Will he tell his audiences of favored laws granted in the legislatures of these states? Private ownership of these things that are limited in quantity has another injurious outcome. When they are exploited only for profit no heed is paid to the duty which the present generation always owes to the coming ones.

Already we are beginning to hear of the exhaustion of the coal, oil, iron ore and the products of the forests, and this in a country more richly endowed with natural wealth than any other land on

Unless this is stopped, the working class, when it comes into power, will gain possession of an earth ALREADY LOOTED OF MUCH OF ITS WEALTH.

For these, and a host of other reasons, the Socialist party de-

The extension of the public domain to include mines, quarries, oil wells, forests and water power.

application. The great extension of the irrigation work in the west is developing water power sufficient to operate all the manufactories of the nation. This water power, created by the common effort, is being turned over to private profit. Roosevelt, the great "trust buster," is thereby creating new and more power

"trust buster," is thereby creating new and more powerful trusts than those he is pretending to fight. Make these water powers the than those he is pretending to fight. Make these water powers the property of the collectivity, and it will give the nation the power to control the entire industrial situation.

Control of these natural resources would give a source of income sufficient to provide for the entire army of the unemployed, to erect a system of socialized industry that would expropriate the trusts, and place the working class in possession of the entire industrial life of the nation.

It would do these things provided this measure was used as one "calculated to strengthen the working class in its fight" and to "incorease its power of resistance against capitalist oppression."
