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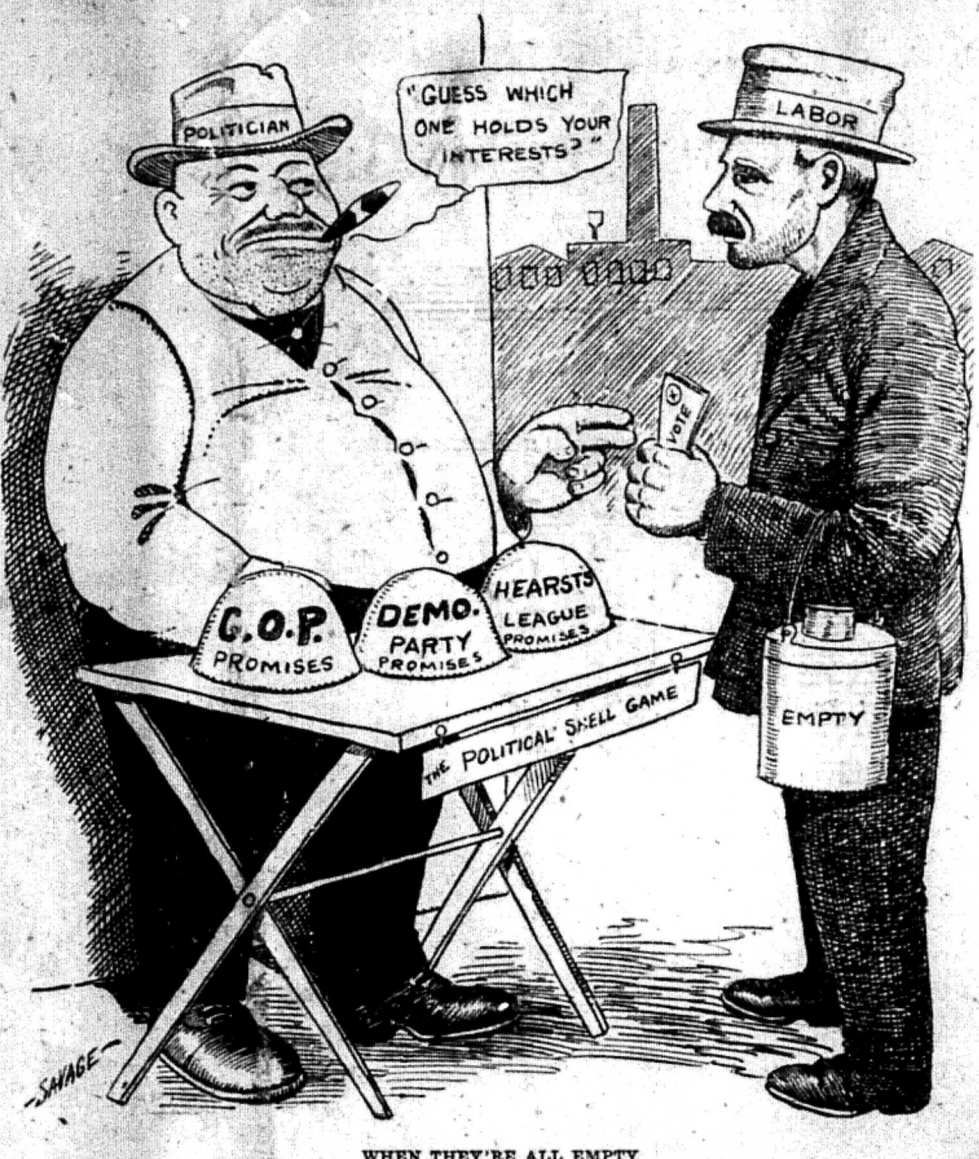

Y., and former Governor Stone of Pennsylvania, filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States court here.

BISHOPS ARE TO AID SOCIALISM English Church Prelates Called to Act by Lambeth Conference.

London, Aug. 8.—An encyclical embodying the results of the Lambeth conference was issued from the Lambeth palace last night. It shows that the discussions of the 243 bishops composing the conference were based upon the reports of committees appointed to consider the various subjects. The conference lasted from July 27 to August 5. Except in a few instances no intimation is given as to whether the eighty-six resolutions adopted by the conference were on subjects of wide difference or not.

Sympathy for Socialism Socialism took up much of the bishops' attention. The conference recognized the ideals of brotherhood, which underlie this democratic movement, and it called upon the church to show sympathy for the movement in so far as it strives to procure for all just treatment and a real opportunity to live true human lives.

The congress resolved that the social mission and the social principles of Christianity should be given more prominence in the teachings of the church, and it impressed upon churchmen that property is a trust held for the benefit of the community, for which they have a moral responsibility, first, for the character and general and social effect of any business in which their money is invested; second, the treatment of employees; third, the observance of laws relating thereto; and fourth, the payment of just wages.

Must Weld Peoples Interesting to the United States is the following resolution: "All races and peoples, whatever their language and conditions, must be welded into one body, and the organization of different races living side by side into separate or independent churches on the basis of race or color is inconsistent with the vital and essential principles of the unity of Christ's church."

COOLER BUT NO RAIN PROMISED

FIGHT TO SAVE LIFE OF GIRL BITTEN PROTECTING SISTER

FORCED TO KEEP HIS BLIND WIFE Husband Told to Black Boots to Support Her if It Is Necessary

At the Harrison-st police court this morning John Roberts was brought before Judge Gemmill for not having supported his sixty-year-old blind wife for the last ten years.

The judge looked at the man, a curly headed, grim-visaged man, and then at the weasened, gray-haired, quavering man before him, and his face grew stern.

"Well, Roberts, what have you to say about this?" he inquired. "Nothing much, judge, what she says is in every respect true. But I did not desert her, we left by mutual consent."

"That doesn't make any difference whatever. How much are you paying her for her support?" inquired the judge, sternly.

"I offered her \$2.50 per week when we met last."

"Tell your story, madam," said the judge.

"The woman passed her shaking hand across her sightless eyes and began to sob in a voice that I will never forget."

"It was twenty years ago, judge, your honor, when this man, my husband, left me. At that time I was in very good health and I didn't care very much, although it pained me to have him leave. We were then living in Indiana. I worked hard and earned enough to live on."

"All at once I went blind and then my troubles began. I lived without friends or relatives. I lived on the very little I had saved, and when that disappeared I was left to live on charity."

"Finally I earned enough money to come to Chicago, for I heard my husband was in business here. I came and met my niece, who led me past his barber shop. He happened to see me and offered me \$2.50 per week, for he only offered me \$1.50 per week."

JUS WHAT TO DO AT PRIMARY Complete Instructions for the Guidance of Socialist Voters

Socialists should do the following at the primary poll: Tell, when you are asked, your party affiliations.

Mark an "X" in the square before each candidate's name.

Fill in the names of candidates where space for them is left blank.

Thomas J. Morgan for United States senator; Harry Whittemore for state central committee; Morris Seal for state central committee; and the name of the person chosen for precinct committeeman in your district, the space for which is left blank in the bottom right-hand corner of the ballot.

Vote for as many men as are marked on the ballot. The number for which you are to vote will be marked "vote for one."

Don't fail to vote, if you have lived in your precinct thirty days, in the county ninety days, and in the state one year. If you have not lived in another precinct since the last registration of electors had March 17, 1908, and have lived in your precinct the required number of days, you can vote by making an affidavit of a voter and householder in your precinct.

When you write in the name of a candidate in a blank space do not put a cross in the square before his name.

LABOR LOCKOUT ON GREAT LAKES Carriers Make Employees Waive Right of Joining a Union

A lockout against all organized labor on the great lakes has been declared by the Lake Carriers' association, which employs the greater portion of lake transportation employees, and the workers are forced to sign affidavits that they are not members of any labor union and must surrender their union books.

At present the affidavit is being used on the vessels of the Pittsburg steamship company, a subsidiary organization of the steel trust, and on most of the vessels carrying iron ore from the steel trust's mines.

Cleveland Starts Move This latest move in the "open shop" policy of the association is said to have originated in Cleveland, Ohio, in the office of one of the largest steamship companies on the lakes, where the affidavit was made up.

Hundreds of copies of it were made on a copying machine and given to shipping masters in various ports through the office of A. R. Rumsey, the Lake Carriers' chief shipping master.

WASHER DOWN IN PARK; DRIVES DUCK FROM LAKE

New York, Aug. 8.—The swans, ducks and Canada geese have been moved from the large lake which surrounds Swan Island in Central park. This change was made necessary because of the effect on the water of the oil spread over the drives to keep down the dust.

Eight swans died, according to a keeper, before it was discovered that the oil was slowly poisoning the flock.
