

SOCIALIST VOTE MAY REACH 650,000 MARK

JUST WHAT THE CITY SOCIALISTS Comperism, Poor Organization and the Panic Helped Disgrace Local Party

A last, faltering hope that Bryan would win and that as a price of voting for him labor could obtain relief from the attacks directed against it by the courts and employers' associations led the Chicago trade unionists to give their votes to Bryan in such numbers that the Socialist vote was far below the expectation.

And under these conditions the Socialist party was handicapped through falling to possess an efficient city machine. The intensive campaigning which is carried on by the old party precinct captain was lacking, and the city campaign till the last few days lagged for that reason.

Labor Men Had Hopes The labor men expected that Taft would be sufficiently unpopular because of his injunction record to give Bryan at least an even chance. For that reason they were determined to "get something new."

And Labor "Got It" Anxious to secure what they knew to be vital, fearing that "Socialism is too far in the future," the labor men rallied to Bryan that they might get "something new."

Panic Did Its Work, Too The panic, too, did its work in thorough fashion. Thousands who felt the pulse and were thus forced to do some hard thinking were also forced in their search for the elusive job to lose their franchise, because they changed their residence. Those whom the panic hit hardest it also eliminated from political life.

GOVERNOR'S SON WRESTLES AND OTHERS JOIN ARMY Forty-five members of an Italian band, a governor's son, a 200-pound wrestler who claims to have once thrown Hackenschmidt, and a woodsman who with his wife and two children, came from Superior, Wis., applied to Lieutenant Kenney at the Army recruiting station, 428 State St., last night, seeking to enlist in the regular service.

It was the first time in the history of the recruiting station that it was open four nights. Malcolm R. Patterson Jr., 22 years old, son of Governor Patterson of Tennessee, enlisted, according to Lieutenant Kenney, and was assigned to Jefferson barracks, Mo. He said it was his intention to work his way from the ranks to a commission.

Frank J. Crestore, a nephew of the bandmaster, and forty-five Italian musicians applied in a body. In this case Lieutenant Kenney will send to Washington for instructions. Fred Knutsen, who came from Superior, was rejected because married men are not wanted. Heinrich Poeschl is the wrestler seeking to enlist.

FRANCE AND GERMANY CLASH OVER A DESERTER'S RELEASE

Berlin, Nov. 5.—The relations between France and Germany are again disturbed through Germany's seeking from the French government the release of the German deserter who deserted from the foreign legion at Casablanca, and additional satisfaction for an alleged assault made upon a subordinate official of the German legation at that place.

The French foreign office wishes to submit the matter to arbitration, and Mr. Jules Cambon, the French ambassador, is endeavoring to reach an agreement with the German foreign office to this end, but so far without success.

Several of the evening papers take up the subject and declare that it is now necessary for Germany to insist upon her rights. The German government made serious representations to France early in October with reference to this affair, which was prior to the controversy which arose through the publication of the emperor's interview, but the raising of the controversy in the newspapers is regarded by some of Chancellor von Bulow's critics as a device to divert public attention from the emperor and the chancellor to a foreign quarrel.

Taft to Change THE TARIFF FIRST Will Call a Special Session of Congress to Consider His Recommendations

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 5.—Revision of the tariff immediately after the inauguration is one of the thoughts now uppermost in the mind of President-elect Taft. That his administration will open with a struggle over the tariff was made manifest today by his declaration that he will call a special session of congress and submit to it a special message urging a speedy revision of the tariff.

Regards Question Important Taft evidently regards the tariff question as one of the most important, for when asked about the pledges he made during his speaking tour, he declared he would do all in his power to keep all of them, but he made special mention of the pledge regarding the tariff.

He would not discuss the tariff in any of the phases at this time, pleading fatigue and asserting that he had dealt with the question during his speaking campaigns.

Reads 5,000 Telegrams Three thousand or more telegrams of congratulation have been delivered to Taft. They include messages from cabinet officers, senators, representatives and congressmen, politicians, residents of the Philippine islands and the far east, and personal friends and admirers.

POUREN OFFENSE NOT CRIMINAL

New York, Nov. 5.—Testimony to show that the offense with which Jan Jenoff Pouden is charged was political and not criminal was given before United States Commissioner Hitchcock yesterday at the hearing on the Russian government's application for the extradition of Pouden, who fled to this country when he was being sought in connection with disturbances in Siago province, Russia, in 1906.

Andre W. Ladin, who claims to have been a member of the same organization, the "Brothers of the Woods," with which Pouden was associated, testified that he met Pouden at a meeting of the "Brothers of the Woods," and that that organization a revolutionary band, was broken up by the Russian authorities, he, with several other members of it, being forced to take refuge in the woods from June, 1906, to June, 1908.

SPECIAL ENVOY SAYS CHINA IS FRIENDLY TOWARD JAPAN Tokyo, Nov. 5.—Tang Shao Yi, special Chinese envoy to the United States from China, will sail for San Francisco on the steamer Mongolia to day, accompanied by a large suite.

During his visit to Japan the envoy has been the recipient of much attention. In a public speech he said the world had been mistaken in thinking China was even slightly unfriendly to Japan. He asserted a perfect understanding existed between the two countries regarding their policies, especially in Manchuria, and that all questions at issue between the two nations would be decided amicably.

RETURNS PROVE BRYANISM DEAD

Reports, Still Incomplete, Present Problem of How Big Is Taft's Majority

The belated returns, while showing the undoubted election of Taft present only the problem of how big is his majority in the electoral college and prove that Bryanism has at last been wiped out effectually.

Missouri and Maryland are still in doubt with both sides claiming both states. If Taft has carried Missouri and Maryland, both his vote in the electoral college will go 227 against Bryan's 154.

From the best information at hand, however, it would seem that Taft really carried Missouri and lost Maryland, in which case the vote stands Taft 318, Bryan 184. If Bryan has carried both Missouri and Maryland and the Democrats claim the vote is Taft 301, Bryan 182. If Bryan has carried Maryland and lost Missouri the vote will stand Taft 309, Bryan 174.

Missouri Shakes Self Loose The indications at this moment, however, point to a vote of 219 for Taft and 194 for Bryan. Missouri seems to have shaken loose from the solid South permanently. Hadley, Republican candidate for governor in that state, is undoubtedly elected. This is the first time in thirty-five years that Missouri has elected a Republican governor.

Knife Densen in Illinois In Illinois Densen was knifed all over the state and ran more than 145,000 behind the head of the ticket. But the immense Taft vote pulled the governor through by a narrow margin.

Stevenson Also Sacrificed by Democratic Exploiters, According to Willis Abbot

As predicted from the time of the Denver convention, and as now admitted by Willis J. Abbot, Bryan's publicity man, the Democratic bosses knifed Bryan. While they merrily double-crossed him from coast to coast, Roger Sullivan was in almost the stellar role as a double-crosser.

Open Secrets Emphasized In explaining the Democratic defeat Willis J. Abbot in this morning's Tribune gives prominence to many open secrets, saying among other things that it was Roger Sullivan who beat Stevenson in Illinois and that the Democratic party has practically dissolved. Abbot says:

The defeat of Mr. Bryan and the apparent dissolution of the Democratic party is a most extraordinary phenomenon in American politics. When I have written in articles for the Chicago Tribune that I believed Mr. Bryan would be triumphantly elected I wrote from a personal conviction to that effect. The result shows how false was my conviction.

Bryan Was Betrayed "We do think that in many ways Mr. Bryan has been seriously injured in the house of those who ought to have been his friends. Speaking personally, I desire to reiterate certain things that I have said before about the way in which Bryan had been betrayed in Illinois by the Democratic boss of Chicago and of the whole state.

South Losing Its Sectionalism Atlanta Constitution Welcomes New Era of Independence Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 5.—In an editorial in the Atlanta Constitution, the election of Clark Howell, who is the Democratic national committee man from Georgia, says:

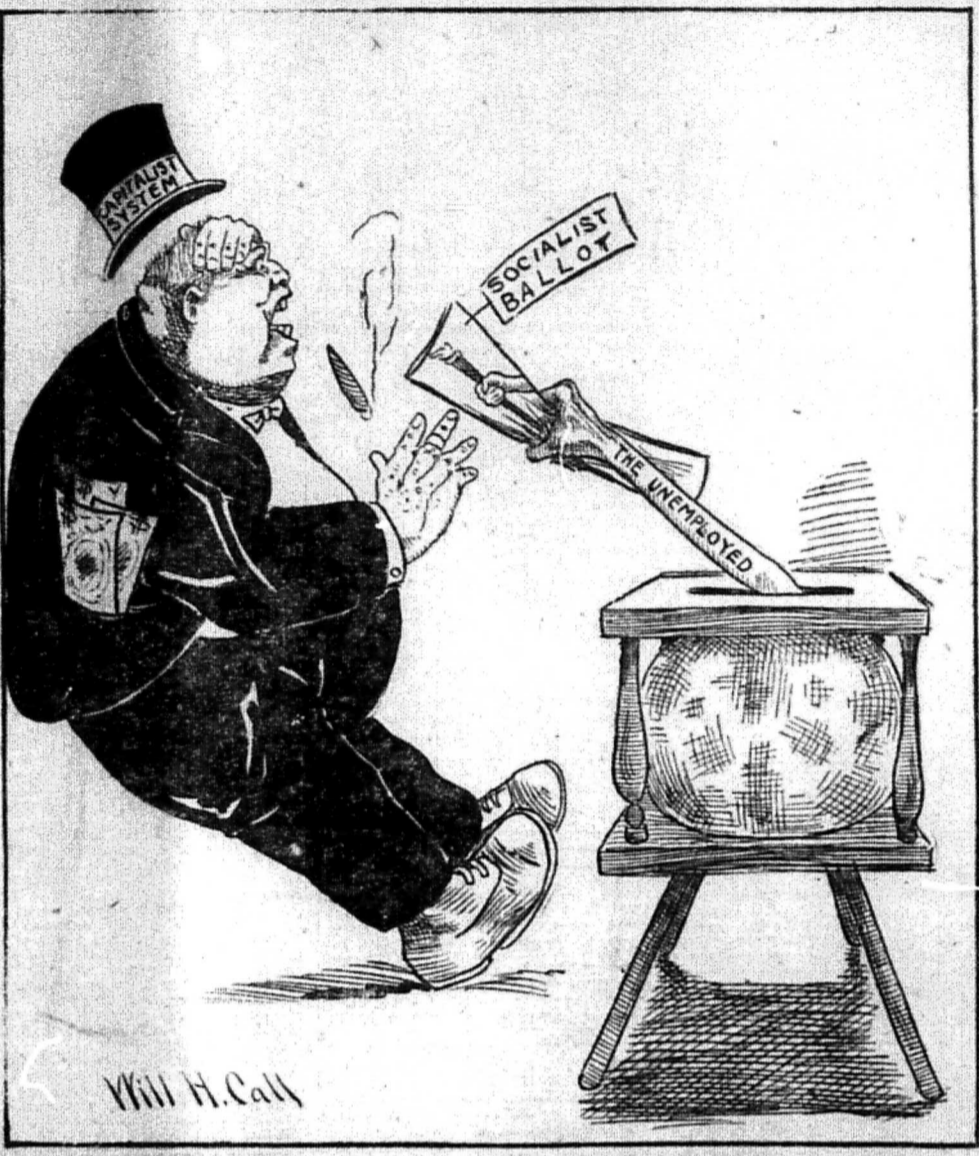

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MILWAUKEE IN SOCIALIST GAIN

Five Members Are Elected to Wisconsin Legislature; There May Be More

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST) Milwaukee, Nov. 5.—The vote in Milwaukee county shows a good Socialist gain. The total vote is 18,338. Debs ran slightly behind the ticket, polling 17,578 votes.

Gaylord, Socialist, has been elected to the state senate of Wisconsin. In the Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh and Sixteenth districts Socialist Democrats have been elected to the legislature, and in three other districts the Socialist Democrats have been beaten by so slender a margin that there is probability of a contest. In one district the Socialists have become frantic because the candidate was counted out by only one vote.

Fraud Is Charged In another district only four votes separate the Socialist candidate from victory. In a third district, where there were frequent charges of fraud, the Socialist candidate was only 38 votes behind the leader of the Republican ticket.

Carl D. Thompson led the Socialist Democratic ticket by about 500 votes, and came within the same margin of being elected.

The explanation of the failure of Welch and Thompson, according to Victor Berger, the veteran Socialist of Milwaukee, lies in the fact that many union labor men, fearing that they would throw away their votes if voting for Debs, voted for Bryan and threw away their votes still more assuredly.

Berger Analyzes Results Berger says: "The result here was due to the fact that union men did not want to throw away their votes. Therefore they voted for Bryan, thus very effectively throwing away their franchise. And in spite of the labor defection, the vote for Debs has been a goodly proportion. I am glad that Samuel Gompers gave such a striking result of his usefulness. The result of this election has been to confirm the Socialist position. It has shown up capitalism. It has driven our enemies into one camp. If the union men had voted for Debs instead of Bryan, they would not have thrown away a golden opportunity to emphasize the fact that their wrongs lie in the capitalist management of society. Without the activity of Gompers the Socialists would have polled a million votes and made the question even straighter than it is. They had the opportunity to register an effective protest; they threw that opportunity away by voting for Bryan at the bidding of Sam Gompers and against their own interest."

Country Makes Good Gain in Spite of Heavy Slump in Chicago Vote

RURAL VOTE IS BIG

Louisville Shows a Gain of 400 Per Cent—Results from Other Points

LATER RETURNS Bulletins received just before going to press indicate the same satisfactory Socialist gains indicated lower down.

(From Yesterday's Last Edition.) Socialism took the great forward step yesterday. The entire nation, with the single exception of the state of Illinois, showed tremendous Socialist gains.

The total vote for Socialism this year shows an increase of at least 24 per cent over the vote of 1904. The national vote has been brought up by the farmers and small villagers to at least 650,000, instead of the 400,000 of the last election, when a number of disgruntled Democrats voted the Socialist ticket for spite.

Good for Louisville From the sold south Louisville, Kentucky, the home of "Marse Henry" of weathercock fame, showed an increase of 400 per cent in the Socialist vote. The frozen north, where the snow flies ten months in the year, was not to be outdone by the land of tobacco and night riders. Duluth, the third city in Minnesota, trebled its Socialist vote.

From the far south, the land of child labor and cotton, entered the field and Augusta, Georgia, came to the front with just twelve times the Socialist vote of four years ago.

Even the actions of aristocracy in Winnetka, the exclusive suburb of Chicago, quadrupled their vote for Debs. From every corner of the land, the small villages, towns and farming communities hailed the Socialist ranks. The farmer shamed the wage slave of the industrial centers yesterday, for the farmer vote for Socialism was the most astounding feature of the national election.

Farmer There to Stay The farmer was there, good, strong and solid, and he demonstrated by the vote for Debs yesterday that he is there to stay.

Wisconsin maintained her great reputation by increasing her vote and sending Gaylord to the state senate from Milwaukee and pushing a number of candidates declared elected by the police returns so close that a contest is possible. Five legislatures were elected.

Even the unorganized districts of Pennsylvania waked up to the great significance of the Socialist movement. Altoona quadrupled its vote, while Pittsburg, the home of the gay and giddy millionaire, surprised the nation by giving Debs three times as many votes this year as it did in 1904.

Kansas' Splendid Showing Kansas, the state which Bryan was going to run away with on his bank guaranty deal, shows Socialist gains so startling as to frighten the old party managers. Crawford county, in which Girard, the home of the Appeal to Reason, is located, has cast six times its Socialist vote of 1904, and Ben Willis, candidate for congress, made a splendid race. The rest of the state reports good gains.

Ohio added its mite to the swelling vote for Socialism. Potosi, the home of an ex-member of a Democratic cabinet, doubled its last vote.

And so the tale runs, up and down the land. Everywhere the small cities, the towns, the villages and the farmers have arisen to the occasion and, according to the Bryan hypocrisy, have voted for a straight, clean issue of the man who works against the man who does not work and will not work and does not want to work.

SOME SOCIALIST BULLETINS Returns from Far and Wide Show Surprising Gains Made (These returns are in addition to those in yesterday's National Edition.)

Girard, Kan., Nov. 5.—That Socialism is polling a heavy vote in Kansas is indicated from 14 precincts of Crawford county, which give Ben Willis, Socialist nominee for congress from the Third district, 628 votes, as against 269 votes in the same precincts two years ago. The same ratio of gain if maintained throughout the county would give Willis 2,900 votes as against 670 in the county two years ago. The same ratio for the congressional district, if kept up, will give Willis a total vote of 9,500, as against 2,900 two years ago. The returns from the state are as yet not in complete enough form to make them the basis for a forecast, but great gains are certain.

The Socialist Vote

It has been a strange characteristic of this campaign that the Socialist vote was estimated much higher by the opponents of Socialism than by the Socialists.

The presence of Bryan in the field meant that thousands of men who had stood with Bryan when they at least thought that he stood for something, and who had since accepted the Socialist position, were drawn back to the old love, even though he no longer stood for even as much of radicalism as had once won their affection.

Another reason that was certain to cause a heavy falling off in the Socialist vote is the vast army of men who have been compelled to move by the panic. Half a million at least have been turned into homeless wanderers and thereby completely disfranchised.

There is no doubt that the principal effect of the Gompers tactics was to decrease the Socialist vote. It was absolutely barren of result elsewhere. Nearly every "enemy" whom he sought to "punish" has been triumphantly elected, with Joe Cannon heading the list.

There were weaknesses in our ranks also. There was lack of organization and education. Whether it could have been avoided is impossible to decide now. IT CAN BE CURED, and that must be the work of the coming months.

In the face of all these obstacles which were pointed out by the Daily Socialist BEFORE election, as well as now, the vote which has been received is almost exactly what was anticipated by those most closely in touch with the Socialist movement.

IT IS A DISTINCTLY SOCIALIST VOTE. It is a vote that promises more than any vote ever cast in this country. It is a vote that is ready for organization and work for Socialism.

It is for us to organize it and bring its strength to bear with such effectiveness that another four years will see labor a power in the legislative halls of America.

They Threw Away Their Votes

If there is one thing that has been proven by this campaign beyond every possibility of a question it is that the laborers of the United States, and especially that portion that followed Samuel Gompers, threw away their votes. It is not that in casting them for Bryan they failed of electing their candidate.

But the trade union votes that were cast for Bryan will not be counted as protest votes. They are not sufficiently differentiated from the others cast for that candidate to be counted at all. They would not be counted as protest votes if they could be so differentiated.

Had they been cast for the Socialist party they would have been a warning and a threat, a warning of growing intelligence, and a threat to use the strength of labor in its own defense.

Will labor learn this lesson before another election?

WATERWORKS AT CANTON

Vice-Consul-General Willard B. Hull reports that with the inauguration of the system of waterworks intended for the service of the bulk of the population of Canton, the capital of South China has made a step forward in its municipal progress the importance of which can scarcely be overrated. He describes the installation as follows:

Although the service will necessarily be of a limited character at the outset, the fact that the people of Canton may now abandon their immemorial custom of obtaining their water supply from the Pearl River is a marked illustration of the influence exerted by advanced ideas on the shrewd and progressive Cantonese.

The Canton waterworks consist of three settling reservoirs of a capacity of 6,000,000 gallons each, six sand filters with a filtering capacity of 1,200,000 gallons each per day, and a covered storage reservoir of 2,000,000 gallons capacity.

The pumping machinery consists of four sets of centrifugal pumps each capable of pumping 2,500,000 gallons per day. These pumps are for pumping water from the river to the reservoirs, and from reservoirs to filters.

The water tower is situated in the center of the city and suburbs, a distance of two and a quarter miles from the pumping station; the tower is 115 feet in height to the base of tank, the latter having a capacity of 180,000 gallons, and is fitted with separate inlet and outlet pipes with connection between the two pipes, and an automatic electrical water-level indicator.

THE RED SPOOK OF SOCIALISM

It has been well said (for that is best said which is best remembered, and often repetition is as helpful to the memory as clever wording) that in a democracy of country such as this there are and can be no class distinctions. One man is just as good as any other man, and even better. Especially if he has a lot of money, and that any man has an equal chance with every man to have a lot of money is a simple arithmetical proposition.

Those needlessly alarm themselves who fear the "stirring up of strife" which the revolutionist (against his wife's most earnest protest) handed him a propagandist pamphlet. With the money jingling in his breeches pocket, the young fellow went right straight to the police and had his benefactor arrested and shot.

The interests of capital and labor are identical, that is, each wants as nearly all of the value of the product as it can get; it is therefore impossible to "wring up strife" among those whose interests are identical.

The poor do not resent what some have called "the ostentatious flaunting of wealth." On the contrary they distinctly approve of it as the reward and badge of that shrewdness and ability by which alone great wealth is to be won. They demand that their leaders be habited as richly and as stylishly as possible, and scorn the demagogue who would dress down to their level.

A PREACHER'S QUERIES

"Capital is a public necessity. So that if it is the private ownership by Morgan of capital, not of wealth, which we want abolished."

"The system of wages and private profit is relatively new in human society as science counts time. There have been many other systems before this one, and there is no reason why there should not be one more, at least."

"Communism, slavery, feudalism, a system for more centuries than the present wage-labor system, and if these could disappear, private capitalism can go likewise."

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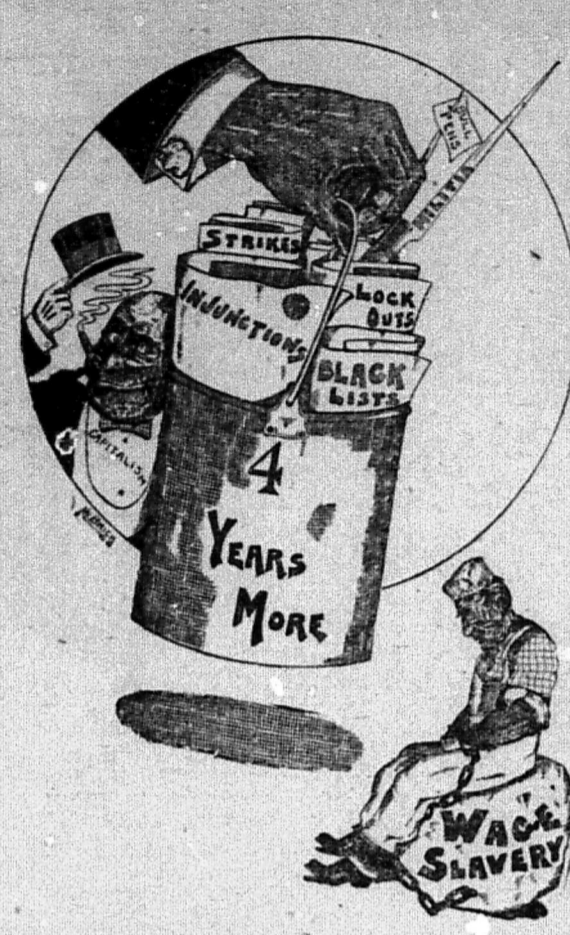

WAS I, UNCONSCIOUSLY, A SOCIALIST?

This question was born after much self questioning and introspection. For a time I had mentally been sidetracked in a morass of social pessimism. Society presented a confusing mass of contradictions. It lauded justice and thrived on injustice; it praised virtue and practiced vice; it forgot in the week days the ethics it had heard in church on Sundays. In brief, its conduct was not in harmony with its professions.

Behind this social degeneration loomed too boldly its cause—the god of capital. This god could be seen with one's eyes shut for the mind seemed it, instinctively, and beheld it through closed eyelids. Besides, had it not become the acknowledged arbiter of a nation's destiny? With its feet this contemptuous "trampling god" tore and soiled the declaration of American independence; in one hand it flourished a mighty whip, with the other pointed at a countless throng of "free" men, women and children, while in a voice of many tongues that could be heard from ocean to ocean—yes, to the ends of the earth—it scornfully proclaimed: "Work for me or starve!"

Who was responsible for this diabolical outrage on a "people" which comparatively a few years before had forebly freed itself from monarchical rule and oppression, which afterwards had spilled the precious blood of thousands to give the southern negro his freedom, which for generations had gloried in its historic distinction of being the "land of the brave and the home of the free?"

Who, I asked myself, has set up this new monstrous, cruel and insatiable god, established this universal system of tyranny under which we had become veritable white slaves in an era boasting of being the grandest and noblest of all the eras of chronicle time? Ah—who, who?

And then came this astounding reply: The people themselves blindly have done this evil thing. Out of their own economic policies they have evolved a gigantic power called organized capital, which is now overpowering and rewarding its real originators with ball and chain; which has neither heart, soul nor conscience; which not only usurps human rights but violates natural laws, which, indeed, defies the God of heaven himself with laughter!

THE CLAIM OF SOCIALISM

BY WILLIAM MORRIS

I have looked at this claim by the light of history and my own conscience, and it seems to me so looked at to be a most just claim, and that resistance to it means nothing short of a denial of the hope of civilization.

This, then, is the claim: It is right and necessary that all men should have work to do which shall be worth doing, and be of itself pleasant to do; and which should be done under such conditions as would make it neither over wearisome nor over anxious.

To feel that we were doing work useful to others and pleasant to ourselves, and that such work and its due reward COULD not fail us! What serious harm could happen to us then? And the price to be paid for so making the world happy is revolution.
