Rockefeller on Stand Says It is Product of Natural Economic Progress

New York, Nov. 19.—Testifying yesterday before Referee Franklin Ferris in the preliminary investigation which precedes the government's suit for the dissolution of the Standard Oil company, John D. Rockefeller said that the Standard Oil company has been the product of natural economic development rather than of aggressive and greedy elimination of competitors.

Rockefeller on Stand Says It is Product of Natural Economic Progress

Speaking of the \$1,000,000 Ohio company which was the first large stride in the growth of the Standard Oil company, Rockefeller said: "It seemed very strange to us who began with only \$4,000 in 1862."

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Thus, throwing aside his former mask of modestness, Rockefeller told his story; Rockefeller, "knowing most powerfully that 1860 no later than 1852, I was quite a young man, much younger than I am now."

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Rockefeller said that the refinery was a small one, and his copartnership with Andrews, Clark & Co. continued until 1865, when it dissolved.

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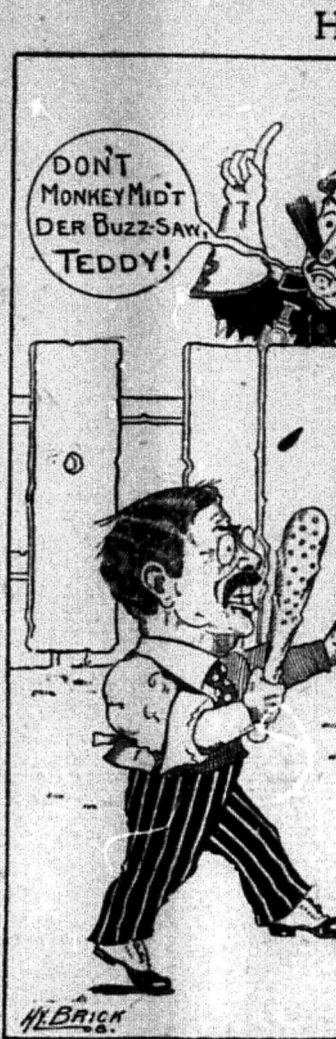

### IRISH 'SOCIETY' IS DECAYING?

Writer Analyzes Social Conditions in Emerald Isle; Socialism Growing

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)  
Dublin, Nov. 19.—An article appearing in interest of the famous "What's the Matter with Kansas" of Will Allen White, dealing with the problem of "What's the Matter with Ireland" has just appeared in the "Irish Homestead."

**Social Life in Decay**  
This article declares that the social life of Ireland is in decay, and that the only cure for the present situation is in its co-operative commonwealth.

Here are a few extracts from the article which appeal to American Socialists:  
"Wherever there is mutual aid, wherever there is give and take, wherever the prosperity of the individual depends on the prosperity of the whole, there the social order tends to produce a finer type of man, altruistic, with a devotion to public ideals. There is the co-operative system as we find it in Germany, with associations based on unlimited liability and good character, where mutual trust is engendered. The forms which rural life may take are numerous; the best is that which produces the finest crop of human beings with the social and kindly instincts most strongly developed. The worst thing which can happen to a rural community is to have no social order at all, an organism where every man is for himself and the devil is supposed to take the hindmost. Generally in such a community he takes the foremost as well as the hindmost. The very phrase, 'every man for himself' is one of the axioms written in the gospel according to Boelslob. The devil's game with man is to divide and conquer him. Isolate four men from one another, and a social order, and in most cases his soul drops into the pit like a rotten apple from the tree of life."

**Absence of Order**  
"Half the troubles in modern Ireland can be traced to the absence of any social order. Over three-fourths of the Irish farmers are leading an isolated kind of life. Out of this feeling that society was made for man and not man for society, springs jobbery and corruption. People have been forced into self-seeking by their isolation, and they were about nothing else but their own interests. They often do not even care

about the welfare of their own children. We doubt if one parent in ten in Ireland has the faintest idea of what his children is being taught in school or takes the slightest interest in the nature of the education they get. When a man is isolated from his neighbor's interests, he too often has the same aloofness toward his own family's interests as he has toward the interests of his country."

**Irish Society Needs**  
In conclusion this spirited article says: "It cannot be too often insisted that fine character in a race is evolved, and is to a great extent due more to the structure of society than to copy book headings or moral axioms. Life is really the great teacher, the great modeler, and all who are anxious about the future of Ireland ought to think seriously about the building up of some kind of social order, with reference not only to the material interests of all concerned, but to the creation of public spirit, mutual trust, altruism, and other things which are essential before we can have a humanity which is really worth the name. The feudal system is doomed, the clan or communal ownership of land is impossible now or for many ages, and the only system which remains is the co-operative system."

**Co-operative Associations**  
We have over and over again expressed our conviction that it is not only economically best for us, but also ideal, and socially the highest course we could adopt, to try to develop the co-operative associations in Ireland so that instead of dealing with one thing only, having only one purpose, the societies should gradually absorb all the business of purchase, manufacture, and marketing in the district, and combine for every purpose where combination will affect an economy, increase production, or enable marketing to be carried on more efficiently. The thing is economically sound. The few societies which are extending their business in this way are the most prosperous in Ireland.

**Some Economic Results**  
But we are not so much concerned with the economic results here as with the effect inevitably to be produced on character by the turning of people's thoughts from themselves and their individual interests to the interests of the community of which they are part. A spirit evolved in this way in a society will permeate beyond the society. It will overflow from the societies into the local boards and the rural and county councils. Men will bring to the discussion of public affairs a habit of mind naturally habituated to think of the interests of the community as paramount. There is no use preaching public spirit and honesty, or railing at jobs. If by the structure of society we are perpetually forcing people to think and act in an opposite spirit. In our opinion this problem is the most important which can occupy the mind of any Irishman at the present day."

**Laid Off; Takes Opium**

Hanover, Nov. 19.—Krich Kussmann, an interne at the Kaiser Wilhelm Academy, who was laid off on the 17th of October, has just committed suicide by taking an overdose of opium. The suicide was the direct result of the present industrial depression. Kussmann had tried to get work of any sort, even cleaning streets, but had failed to get any kind of a job.

**Three Miners Commit Suicide**  
(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)  
Saarbrücken, Lorraine, Nov. 19.—Three suicides have been reported here as a result of the coal miners' strike. The men, Peter Kessler, Albrecht and Udermann, had been on strike for some weeks. They were all men of family and left children.

**Ex-Hungarian Official Ends Life**  
(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)  
Budapest, Nov. 19.—M. Latorcsky, formerly secretary of state for Hungary, has just committed suicide. The former secretary of state was destitute and had been unable to find work for some time.

### MORE MISSIONARIES IN CONGO STATE THAN WHITES

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)  
Brussels, Nov. 19.—A violent newspaper war is raging here on the question of how many missionaries there are in the Congo.

La Patrie declares that there are 2,574 missionaries in the Free State and the People declare that there are only 2,672 Europeans in the entire country, and that it is impossible for King Leopold to get as much rubber and ivory out of the non-missionary population of less than a thousand as the bank records of this city show that he is getting.

**TANK BLOWS UP; KILLS MAN IN ARMOUR'S REPAIR SHOP**  
One man was instantly killed and five others seriously injured by an explosion in the plant of the Armour boiler repair shop at Fort Myer, Va., and Packers avenue at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.  
The dead:  
William Brown, 26 years old, married, 4871 Winchester avenue.  
The explosion came while the men were testing a tank with air. The end of the tank blew out, and Somers, who was standing directly in front of it, was hurled against the wall with terrific force, fracturing nearly every bone in his body. He was instantly killed, and his body was taken to the county morgue.  
The injured men were thrown in every direction by the force of the explosion.

**USED GASOLINE AS RUEDOWN FOR BABIES; IS DIVORCED**  
Los Angeles, Calif., Nov. 19.—Bernice M. T. Sanford used gasoline to wash her two children, her husband, Optus, obtained a divorce yesterday on the ground of insanity. Sanford said his wife fed the children rice around without adding any of the lime and kept the house in a stenchy condition.  
"I begged her to take better care of the children," Sanford told the court, "but she refused. When I presented warning her three the water out of the window, took a gasoline bottle and ran and rubbed them down. She finished each in two minutes. She said it was the quickest way to clean them."  
The judge agreed it was a cruel way to treat children and granted the divorce.

### SAME OLD 'EVIL' WORRIES KAISER

Reports From All Over Empire Show Tremendous Growth of Socialism

Berlin, Nov. 19.—Reports from all over the empire show the steady growth of the Socialist movement. From Frankfurt-am-Main comes the cheering news that the Socialist membership has increased from 6,665 in 1906 to 14,196 during the present year.

**Fighting Section Gains**  
In Nuremberg the membership has increased over 300 per cent during the last two years. From all over Germany comes the same tale. At Koenigsberg the membership reports a gain of more than two thousand members of the "fighting section," the Socialists who are out for Socialism. Aside from a good many other places Socialism is now worrying the Kaiser.

**Out Centrist Members**  
At Duisburg the Socialists have gained two seats in the special elections from the centrists. The great party of solidarity and giving right made a real, but fight for these seats, which they have held for years, but the Social Democrats ousted both of the centrist members.

MORE NEWS OF SOCIALIST VOTE

Cashport, Wis.—A Socialist voter here said: "I called on the clerk to ascertain the number of votes received by each of the Socialist candidates and found that according to the report of the election committee our candidate for congress had received one vote, although Debs received twelve votes in the town."

Vote of White County, Ark.

Little Rock, Ark.—The vote in White county, Arkansas, follows: Democrats, 1,712; Republicans, 856; Socialist, 176; Populist, 89; Prohibition, 75; Independent, 4. The Socialist vote is slightly more than that of four years ago.

Vote of a Washington County

Bellingham, Wash.—The Socialists of Whatcom county polled 11 per cent of the total vote. Debs received 940 votes. In the city of Bellingham the vote was 499, 12 per cent of the total.

Indiana Vote 11,948

Indianapolis, Ind.—Indications seem to point to the fact that the Socialist vote in Indiana will be slightly more than that of four years ago.

Champaign County 45

Urbana, Ill.—Champaign county gave the Socialist ticket 42 straight votes and 3 Socialist Labor votes.

Mississippi Vote Large

Meridian, Miss.—The Mississippi state vote four years ago was 392. Returns from all counties now indicate that this year the vote has been 1,048, an increase of more than 167 per cent.

Big Socialist Vote

Nottingham, O.—The vote in Nottingham this year is as follows: Debs, 64; Bryan, 97; Taft, 244. The formation of a party section in the town is talked of.

Ohio County Gains

Zanesville, O.—Muskingum county gave Debs 290 votes, affiliated with the Socialist Labor party, 23.

A Michigan Gain

Lansing, Mich.—Debs' vote in Ingham county, Mich., was 157. In 1904 it was 149. The Socialist Labor party polled 25 votes.

Carroll Penn Precinct

Sharon, Pa.—The vote in Southwest precinct, Hickory township, or Patagonia, was as follows: Debs, 54; Bryan, 53; Taft, 49.

Wayne County's Increase

Greenville, Mo.—Debs this year polled 73 votes in Wayne county. In 1904 it was 47.

A California Increase

Riverside, Cal.—The total Socialist vote for Riverside was 574, against 523 in 1904.
