

CHECK GROWTH OF UNCLE SAM

Race Suicide and Immigration Loss to Play Havoc With 1910 Census

Washington, D. C., Nov. 30.—Race suicide, increase in the divorce rate and curtailment of foreign immigration are the causes given by Director S. N. D. North for the drop from the usual rate of increase in population which will be shown by the 1910 census.

SEEK GRIP ON NEW YORK CITY

Director North further estimates that when Uncle Sam gets through counting he will find that he has about 35,000,000 relatives in the continental United States.

It will be the thirteenth census taken by the government. In addition to the continental United States, which includes Alaska, the enumerators in 1910 will count up the inhabitants of Porto Rico, Hawaii, Guam, Samoa and the Philippine canal zone.

Two causes are given for this saving. One is that the census bureau has reached the highest perfection and the other is the fact that the bureau will build and own the necessary tabulating apparatus instead of renting it, as heretofore.

The cost to be \$14,117,000. The director of the census, in his annual report, estimates \$14,117,000 will be needed to defray the cost of the next census in 1910.
