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OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Executive Committee Acts on Work Among Women

At the last meeting of the National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party some important work was done in the direction of greater effort for interesting women in the Socialist Party. A letter was received by the committee from Mrs. Winnie Branstetter secretary of the National Socialist women's committee. This letter recommended that "the national woman organizer remain for at least two days in each place and that all national organizers make an appeal to women to come into the party; and resolution calling for a mass meeting on one day in all large cities for the purpose of agitating the woman's suffrage question; also asking in behalf of the woman's committee an explanation of the position of the party towards separate Socialist women's societies."

Women in Russia

We hear that the Mohammedans of Moscow (who number about 20,000) have formed an "Association for the Spread of Enlightenment," which has for one of its aims the emancipation of Mohammedan women. In Moscow also there has been started an association in aid of working women, and not only have co-operative workshops been instituted for the benefit of women out of employment, but the association has also organized courses of instruction in rural industries.

Socialist Cook Book

Boiled Rice in Southern Style
Wash a cupful of rice in two waters and put it over the fire in a large saucepan containing at least two quarts of slightly salted water. This must be at a galloping boil. Keep it at this for fifteen minutes. Test a grain of the rice then by pinching it between the thumb and finger. If soft, it is ready to take from the fire. Do not stir the rice. Turn off the water and set the rice at the back of the stove to dry as you would boiled potatoes, or else empty it into a colander and let it drain in this for a few minutes. Every grain should stand apart and the rice should be tender, yet firm.

Self-Transferable Embroidery Designs

Directions for using: Place pattern face downward on the material and press with a hot iron, being careful that the material to be stamped is laid on a smooth surface and is free from all wrinkles.
225. Violet centerpiece design, size 18x21 inches or 22x25 inches. Border in solid embroidery and center in outline embroidery to be worked in wash felle silk.

For Home Dressmakers

LADIES SHIRTWAIST.
Paris Pattern No. 2689
All Seams Allowed.
To wear with the semi-dressy suit of woadcloth or velvet this is a dressy little model which is most attractively developed in messaline or soft silk. Three backward-turning tucks, either side of the front and two forward-turning tucks, either side of the back, stitched to the waist-line, distribute the fullness. The fancy trimming piece is of the same material as the waist, bound with bands of narrow black satin, similar satin binding the points of the tight-fitting sleeves, which are tucked in groups of three narrow tucks each. The round yoke and high collar are of allover Cluny lace in deep cream-color, the plaid ruffle of messaline or chiffon trimming the front and lower edges of the sleeves, and the model closes at the center-back. The pattern is in 7 sizes—32 to 44 inches bust measure. For 36 bust the waist requires 5 1/2 yards of material 19 inches wide, 5 3/4 yards 21 inches wide, 6 yards 23 inches wide, or 2 1/2 yards of allover lace 18 inches wide, 3/4 yard of satin 18 inches wide and 3/4 yard of plaid ruffing. Elephant's Strange Death
