

FLYERS NOT IN TRUST COMPETE

Indianapolis, Ind., June 17.—Independent aviators will have their inning at the Wright brothers' meet here this afternoon. Until today the Wright team of six-man birds has occupied the field daily until dusk. The ambitious aspirant who has assembled a machine of his own will fly this afternoon—or break it.

Has Only Monoplane

Lincoln Beachey of Toledo, who has entered the only monoplane at the meet, will attempt a lap flight today. He flew a short distance late yesterday, but fire trouble caused him to quit. Melvin Marquette is prepared to fly in a Marquette biplane, equipped with a Fisher engine. A third aviator to try out his machine today will be Russell Shaw, an Indianapolis youth.

An excursion of almost a thousand persons arrived this morning from Dayton, the home of the Wrights and of Walter Brookins, holder of the world's altitude record. Today's programme offers midair stunts, such as have been tried successfully several days this week by the Wright team.

Sheephead Bay Gloomy

The weather was bad and the track heavy agents of the Society for the Prevention of Crime were on hand with orders to secure, if possible, evidence which would be strong enough to warrant the arrest of the directors of the Coney Island Jockey club under the new anti-gambling law; and horsemen generally were in mourning over the belief that today marked the last running of the stakes. He is en route west to attend the Jeffries-Johnson fight, and was very angry when asked about the rumor that his matrimonial ship had been wrecked. He explained that Mrs. Goodwin wanted him to stay in Paris until next fall, but finally gave him permission to come home and see the fight to "keep him from worrying himself sick." He said that immediately after the big fight he would go back to Paris.
