**Statement by Lewis:** I have looked over this country with a microscope for men of standing willing to debate against Socialism this season, without success so far. So long as I am the Garrick Lecturer, the Garrick meeting will stand first of all for education in the principles of Socialism and the philosophy of Socialism will play a larger part in the debate next Sunday than the statement of the question would indicate. My clever opponent is, like myself, a Socialist. He is a Christian and I am a Freethinker, and the platform of the Workers' University Society is wide enough for the discussion of our differences on this question. I hardly imagine that my opponent will hold that Christianity, much as he believes in it, will solve the social problem and I certainly do not believe that free thought alone is equal to that gigantic task. Here I believe that we shall agree that the only hope of the working class and the world is to be found in that greatest cause that ever throbbed in the brain of man—Socialism.

**MANY METAL WORKERS STRIKE**

Trouble Is Now on With Employers in Many Cities.

More men are out on strike in the metal trades today than at any other time in many years.

**Unfair Cities**  
According to the official journal of the Metal Polishers, Buffers, Platers and Brass Molders, there is trouble on in the following cities: Philadelphia, Greater New York, Toledo, Kenosha, Decatur, Ill., Chicago, Boston and Milwaukee.

In the following cities the grievances are pending with the International Executive Board: Quincy, Ill., San Francisco, and Springfield, Mass.

**Demand Nine-Hour Day**  
At Philadelphia 409 members of the union are out on strike. The rates paid there to chandelier makers was lower than that paid in other cities, so the men went out. In addition to an increase a demand for a nine-hour day has also been made.

The conditions of the shops in Philadelphia was causing manufacturers in other cities to attempt to reduce hours and to lengthen hours, so the men decided to call a halt.

In Greater New York two locals have been out since Oct. 17, for a uniform rate of wages of \$3.25 a day and the nine-hour day for every shop.

**Men Are Firm**  
The men are remaining firm and they have the situation well in hand. The men say that they will fight to a finish. With the exception of two shops, Local Union No. 2 of Toledo, O., has succeeded in obtaining the nine-hour day throughout the city.

The men in these two shops seeing that their remaining would prove a con-

stant menace to the workers in other plants of the city after being refused their demands went out on June 24, and have been out ever since.

**Obnoxious Time System**  
The Badger Brass Manufacturing company of Kenosha, Wis., hearing of the formation of a local union of metal spinners in the town and that their men had joined the new organization, began discriminating and imposed an obnoxious time system.

This the men refused to accept and went out on Aug. 27. Some of the men have left for other cities, but the strike is still on.

The men went on strike in Decatur, Ill., last February. The Mueller Manufacturing company was the firm aimed

at. Many have been compelled to seek elsewhere for work, but the picket line has been kept up nevertheless.

**Safety Razor Company, Too**  
The Gillette Safety Razor company of Boston locked out the members of Local No. 95 on Tuesday, Sept. 20.

They were first told if they wanted to continue to work for that firm they would have to give up their union cards. This they refused to do. Prospects for a settlement in the near future are bright.

The Garage Equipment company of Milwaukee demanded on Sept. 12 that the union men accept a reduction of 25 per cent.

The men desired to work under protest, but the manager of the firm in-

formed them that unless they would be satisfied to work under the reduction he would pay them off. The men positively refused to accept the reduction.

**Feeling of Unrest**  
The article in the journal concludes with the following significant remark: "There is a feeling of unrest throughout the country and there are many other grievances where members of the International Executive Board have been detailed."

**NEW YORK STRIKE IN SYMPATHY WITH TAMPA**

New York, Oct. 11.—One hundred and sixty cigar makers and teachers employed by Garcia & Vega, 97 Houston

street, have laid down their tools and walked out in sympathy with the striking cigar makers of Tampa, Fla., who have been out for several weeks.

Garcia & Vega have a factory in Tampa, which is also tied up by the strike. It is believed by the cigar makers' officials that they have been making their Tampa orders in this city.

**SMALLPOX ATTACKS INMATES**  
(By United Press Association.)  
Lapeer, Mich., Nov. 11.—Smallpox is raging among the inmates, teachers and attendants at the Michigan Home for the Feeble Minded and Epileptic in this city. Ten new cases were reported to day and the strictest quarantine is being maintained.

ELECT WORKERS IN WISCONSIN

Summary of the Socialists Elected to Wisconsin Legislature.

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.) Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 11.—The Socialists will have twelve representatives in the next Wisconsin assembly in addition to two state senators.

Who Socialist Legislators Are Frank B. Metcalfe, the Socialist assemblyman-elect from the Third district, is a glass blower, employed by the Milwaukee-Northern Glass works.

He is a delegate to the Federated Trades Council from the Glass Blowers' union, and represented the union at the International Glass Workers' union convention at Atlantic City last August.

He is a member of the executive board of the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor.

His First Job Although Mr. Metcalfe has been a hard worker for his party for years, this is the first time he ever ran for office. He is 37 years old.

Jacob Hahn, the Socialist who was elected to the assembly from the Fifth district, is a cigar maker. He is employed by his father. He is a delegate to the Federated Trades Council from the cigar makers' union. He is 30 years old and never before ran for office.

Vint a Machinist James H. Vint, elected by the Socialists to the assembly from the Eighth district, is a machinist, employed by the Milwaukee road. He is a member of the local machinists' union. He is 27 years old, and goes into office for the first time.

Edmund J. Berner, the Socialist assemblyman from the Ninth district, goes into office for the fourth time. He is a cigar maker, and for years represented the cigar makers' union in the Federated Trades Council. He is 45 years old.

Newspaper Solicitor Chosen Arthur Kahn, elected to the assembly from the Tenth district by the Socialists, is a baker and was at one time business agent for the bakers' union. Lately, however, he has been employed as a solicitor by the Social Democratic Herald.

He has been prominently connected with trades unions, but this is the first time that he has been elected to a public office.

Mr. Kahn will leave today for Bohemia, where he has been called by the illness of his father. He will return before the assembly convenes.

Fred Brockhausen, whom the Socialists elected to the assembly from the Eleventh district, will enter upon his fourth term. He is one of the most prominent union men in the state, at the present time serving as secretary and treasurer of the Wisconsin Federation of Labor.

M. E. Binner the "Babe" Max E. Binner, elected to the assembly from the Twelfth district by the Socialists, will be the youngest man in the assembly. He is only 24 years old. He was graduated from a Milwaukee high school and has been employed as a cigar clerk ever since.

F. J. Weber Returned Michael Katsban, Socialist assemblyman-elect from the Fourteenth district, is a coremaker and a member of the coremakers' union. He is 35 years old.

Frank J. Weber, who was re-elected for the fourth time by the Socialists to the assembly from the Fourth district, is business agent of the Federated Trades Council and general organizer of the State Federation of Labor.

Zephy Born in Switzerland Gabriel Zephy, the Socialist senator-elect from the Seventh district, is a carpenter contractor, living in West Allis. He was elected trustee of West Allis six years ago on the People's ticket, and served for one term. He was born in Switzerland in 1869, and has resided in Milwaukee county for fifteen years. He is now treasurer of the Socialist party in West Allis.

William J. Gilroy, assemblyman-elect from the Second district, is a machinist. He has been connected with the Socialist party for many years.

ATTEMPT TO REMOVE MYRA DIETZ FRUSTRATED (By United Press Association.) Ashland, Wis., Nov. 11.—Efforts by Milwaukee sympathizers to remove Myra Dietz, the wounded daughter of John Dietz, the "Defender of Cameron Dam," from St. Joseph's hospital were frustrated by officials of the institution and Deputy Sheriff Aronson only after a sensational quarrel.

Claiming to have authority from the girl's parents and from Sheriff Madden, George Schultz of Milwaukee, president of the Dietz defense fund, demanded custody of the girl. Being unable to produce written authority his request was refused, the hospital officials declaring the girl was too dangerously wounded to be removed in any case.

Reports that Dietz sympathizers might remove the girl by force has caused the stationing of the sheriff and under sheriff of Ashland county to take up quarters at the hospital where they will repel any attempt to abduct the girl.

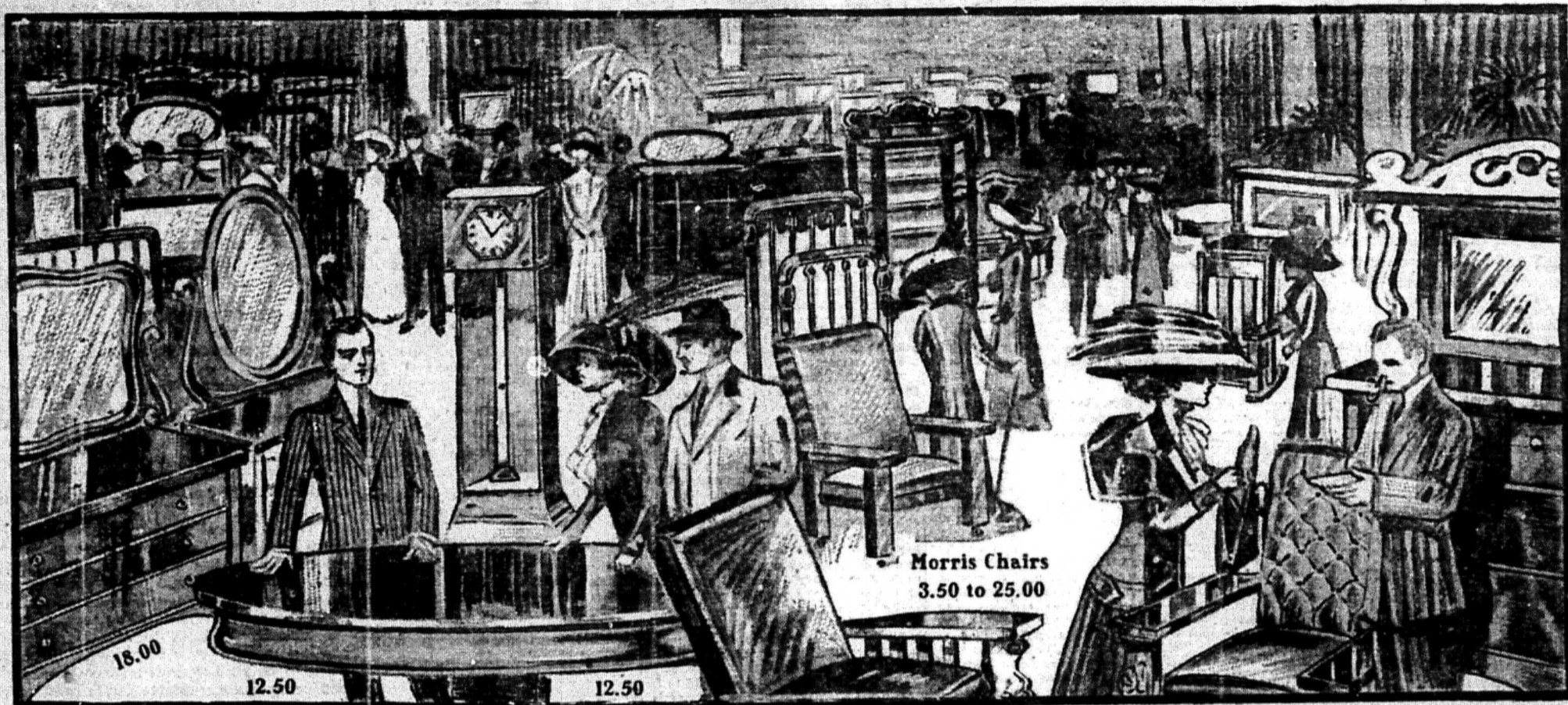
