LOCAL

A COMMISSION appointed by the mayor to investigate all phases of the street-cleaning problem will be asked for by Alderman Murray at the next meeting of the city council, May 1. A resolution to create such a commission will be offered.

FOUR suits against the sanitary district were filed in the Superior court by Attorney Warren Pesse, representing property owners in the Illinois river valley, for alleged damages, because of the overflow of the Illinois river, attributed to turning water into the river. More than a dozen similar suits are pending.

AFTER a chase of two blocks, in which fifteen agents were fired by six detectives, Armoda Abbino, 26 years old, 825 Milton avenue, was arrested and booked at the Chicago avenue station on a charge of stealing hair from working girls. It is said that he has been operating for three months among women employees of Montgomery Ward & Co.

THIRTY-TWO girls after one job-teaching operator for the board of education at \$6 a month—is a record established by the civil service commission. The first three on the list from among whom the telephone operator will be picked are: Mary E. Boyce, 508 Millard avenue; Emma L. Messenger, 4346 Kenmore avenue; Marie Long, 1429 South Central Park avenue.

"VOTES for women" will save the nation, if nothing else does, according to former Governor James Brady of Idaho, who is in Chicago for a few days before going East to make a series of speeches in behalf of the suffragettes. "The ballot has not degraded the women in the five western states which have franchised them," he said. Mr. Brady will address the legislature at Albany.

ALDERMAN MURRAY'S ordinance to abolish common drinking cups in public places was recommended for passage by the council committee on health. The measure will be ordered deferred and published at the next council session, May 1, and a vote will be taken on it, probably at the session of May 8. The measure becomes effective ninety days after its passage and forces the substitution of other means of drinking than the common cup.

Law Has Been Violated, Says Attorney, in Reviewing Kidnaping of J. J. M'Namara.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 26.—Stating that the law had been clearly violated and that the McNamara case here was an exact parallel of the famous Moyer-Haywood-Pettibone case with which he was connected, Clarence S. Darrow, the noted Chicago attorney, today prepared the following statement for the United Press:

BY CLARENCE S. DARROW The law is well settled everywhere that a fugitive from justice means one who is present in the state at the time and place of the commission of the crime, and then fled to another state. If John J. McNamara was not in California at the time of the commission of the crime of which he is charged, then there was no legal way of getting him to California except by his consent. Not in California

It is not claimed that McNamara was in California at the time of the commission of this crime or for a long time previous. The governor of California made a requisition on the governor of Indiana for McNamara without knowing the facts, or considering that there was anything unusual in the case, the governor issued this requisition.

Under the statute it was then the duty of the officer having charge of McNamara to take him before a Circuit, Superior or Criminal court or a judge thereof to inquire two things:

First, whether he was the man mentioned in the requisition, and secondly, whether he was in California and not in Indiana at the time of the commission of the crime. McNamara was taken before a police judge who had no authority to hear the case.

He asked for counsel and was refused. The judge asked him simply whether he was McNamara. Without any opportunity for defense he was taken to an automobile and rushed out of the state. He never had a chance to invoke the aid of the law, or to consult counsel. He was clearly kidnaped.

Law Notoriously Violated The case is exactly parallel with the Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone cases, where these three men were arrested at night upon requisition of the governor of Idaho, held secretly, denied counsel or access to court, and then taken on a special train to Idaho.

In both cases the law was notoriously and plainly violated and the constitutional and legal rights of the citizens were denied.

By United Press. Cincinnati, C., April 26.—Demanding a federal investigation of the methods employed in the arrest of John J. McNamara, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, the Central Labor Council has adopted resolutions pledging the faith of that body in his cause and promising moral and financial support to his defense.

The resolutions declare the kidnaping was the work of alleged "private" detectives and hired thugs to turn the sentiment of the American people against the aims and objects of the trade union movement.

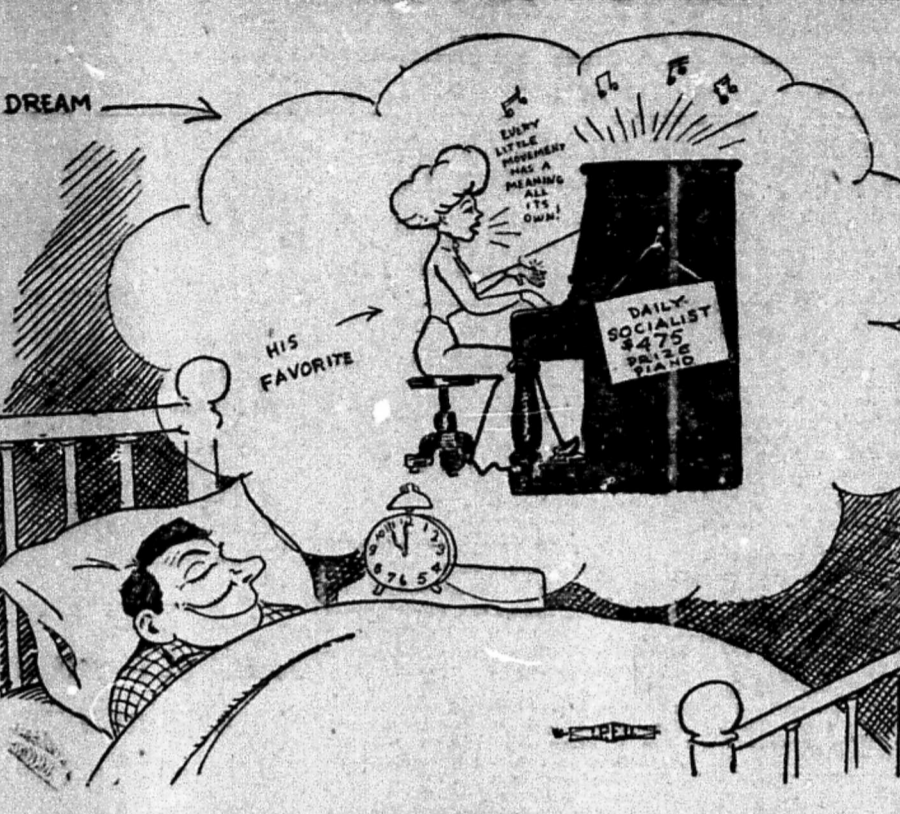
To Avoid Los Angeles By United Press. Los Angeles, Cal., April 26.—The trials of John J. and James W. McNamara and Orlie E. McManigal on charges of participation in the Los Angeles dynamiters, will not take place in this city if the attorneys for the defense can help it.

Judge O. M. Hilton, of Denver, who has been retained as associate counsel for the defense, announced today that his first work in the legal battle following the Indianapolis and Detroit arrests will be to demand a change of venue from Los Angeles, on the ground that this city is a hotbed of prejudice against the accused.

"I ask the people to withhold judgment until all the facts are in," Hilton said. "This is going to be the most titanic struggle between labor and capital in our history."

The huge rewards made it impossible for the detectives to quit until someone had been blamed for the crimes. The same thing happened in the Moyer-Haywood and Adams cases in Colorado.

IMMIGRATION INCREASES

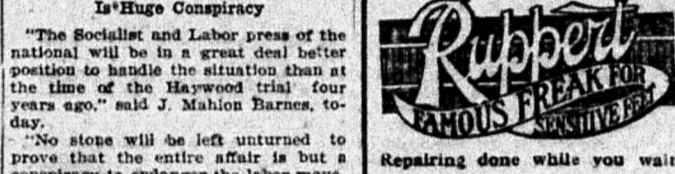

Hints for Housekeepers

To clean velvet scrape a little pipe clay on it, then brush it off lightly with a stiff brush.

Comforts and quilts should be dried in a good stiff breeze so that they may be as light and fluffy as when new.

Let the People Vote

About a year ago the legislature of New York passed the workmen's compulsory compensation law. The labor press was jubilant over the graciousness of the statesmen at Albany. It was so good in them to pass a law that would compel the employer to stand the loss of a broken arm or leg of one of his "hired hands" just as when a wheel broke in his factory.

The right of property rests not upon philosophical or scientific speculations, nor upon the commendable impulses of benevolence or charity, nor yet upon the dictates of natural justice. The right has its foundation in the fundamental law. That can be changed by the people but not by legislatures.

The judge reasons well. His logic is faultless. Society, based upon the sacred rights of private property, must not be permitted to violate its organic law at the behest of a group of politicians influenced by popular clamor.

The Function of Government

Ancient government was robbery. The king and his co-robbers, the aristocracy, ruled and robbed by divine right. The lower classes were made to serve. That was their function in society. The gods had decreed it and that settled it.

Later, as capitalism displaced feudalism and the lower classes became uncontrollable, government became a conservator of the peace, a protector of rights; in short, a policeman. That is what government is today—a policeman with a big stick.

Berger Understands. Congressman Berger is a class-conscious Socialist. That means that he knows a class struggle at first sight. When the three Union Labor men were seized by private detectives, illegally detained and carried out of their state; railroaded across the continent, to be tried for their lives in a city dominated by notorious labor baiters, Berger acted.

The Coming Transformation

No revolution ever rises above the intellectual level of those who made it, and little is gained where one false notion supplants another. But we must some day, at last and forever, cross the line between Nonsense and Common Sense. And on that day we shall pass from Class Paternalism, originally derived from fetish fiction in times of universal ignorance, to Human Brotherhood in accordance with the nature of things and our growing knowledge of it.

Economic independence is the basis of the normal development of the higher faculties of man. The needs of the body must be satisfied before the mind can effectively apply itself to science or art.
