REBELS REFUSE TO BOW BEFORE 'PRES.' MADERO

San Diego, June 20.—The anti-Madero insurgents in Lower California stand pat. They refuse to recognize the peace pact and the provisional government of De La Barra.

They await the coming of Gen. Viljoen with his federalized revolutionaries, or his revolutionized federals, and say they will give him "a run for his money."

Haven't Begun to Fight. They declare they haven't begun to fight yet, and that the revolution in the other states of Mexico has only started.

Antonio De P. Araujo, secretary of the junta of which Ricardo Magon is the head, says: "All the revolutionary forces now operating in Mexico are under the supervision of the Mexican Liberal party."

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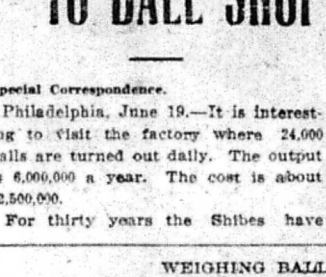
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WEIGHING BALLS BEFORE COVERING

The Stench of Burning Corpses as Plague Victims Were Heaped on Funeral Pyres Filled China's Air

BY WALTER KIRTON. Shanghai, China, via Siberia, May 21.—The Chinese is essentially a fatalist and demurs at any suggestion of interference in the exercise of his prerogative to die if he wants to. He cannot understand why people should trouble themselves about him. Similarly, a family, the Chinese communal unit, resents any sort of interest that outsiders may evince in its private concerns and in many instances the people have resorted to the cleverest methods in hiding their sick from the sanitary patrols. In one instance, after the whole family had perished, a search revealed a corpse lying on the top of one of the big roof-beams. It is presumed that the corpse was that of the father of the family and that his children intended to keep it for burial in the ancestral plot. Fire is the great, if not the only, sure preventative against contagion and wherever possible all infected tenements have been thus destroyed. And this opens up another phase in the fearful difficulties that have confronted those charged with the conduct of operations against the pestilence.

It is more or less well known that China is one huge graveyard. To deprive the corpse of a Chinese of its right of burial in the earth is one of the severest punishments known, not only to the individual, but to all his family and relations. To him the fact of death carries no sense of obliteration provided his mortal remains are conserved and can be located by his descendants. Consequently the authorities, in ordering the burning of the huge number of corpses were up against the most cherished traditions of the people and it was only that in the vast majority of instances the whole family had been wiped out that rendered these wholesale cremations possible. At the outset of this campaign the complicated political status of Manchuria led to confusion worse confounded in determining a plan of action and carrying it into effect. The Russians did something at their end, the Japanese at theirs, and both seized the opportunity to turn a catastrophe to their own advantage. China was, and is, between the upper and the nether millstones. Briefly the facts are as follows: When the plague assumed menacing proportions at Harbin the Russian railway people devised a scheme for palming off their "contracts" on the Japanese. They loaded up a few cars with coolies suspected of contagion and sent them south to Kwangtze—the railway depot which forms the terminal of both systems. On the arrival of this charnel train the Japanese refused to take it over and sent it back on its tracks. How long this game of hide-and-seek continued nobody can say for certain, but the fact remains that the contagion seized both on Kwangtze and spread thence to the city of Chanchun, lying in the immediate vicinity. From thence it found its way southward along the line, the Japanese being reluctant to reduce their passenger returns until public opinion compelled them to suspend all "coolie" traffic.
