COLLINS TELLS ABOUT THE REAL LABOR PARTY

John M. Collins has just returned to Chicago from Peoria, Ill., where he spoke at a picnic of the street carmen's union. Collins delivered some hot shot into the supporters of the proposed new labor party.

The scheduled speakers were to point out the necessity of starting a new labor party. That being so the few Socialist union carmen got John M. Collins from Chicago to represent the Socialist party.

The first speaker was the president of the union, Daniel Gorman. He did not mention politics. The other speaker was one of the national officers of the union, who also did not mention politics.

Collins was the last speaker and showed the men that it was not enough for them to be in their union, but they ought to federate themselves with other unions under the industrial form of organization.

He asked them to study the question of Socialism, as there was a movement on foot by some labor men to start a new party, just what the capitalist class were looking for so as to keep the working men divided on politics.

'We now have a labor party,' said Collins, 'in Peoria, in the state, in the nation and around the world that the capitalist class are very much afraid of, and that party is the Socialist party.'

His remarks were well received by the crowd. Socialist union men everywhere should take a lesson from these men in Peoria and get busy in their unions, then there would be no attempt made to launch a new party.

Hearst's policy is to get in on all the things that have a popular sound, pretend admiration for those who support such measures, and then, after getting in a position to claim credit for himself, to knife all others likely to benefit by the popular approval.

The Debs Criticism

That great interest should have been aroused by the article of Comrade Debs on the Chicago Socialist movement and our reply was to have been expected. The discussion is by no means ended and every reader who feels that he has something to add on the subject is invited to write to The Daily Socialist. Plenty of space will be given in the Open Forum. We may as well arrive at a general clear understanding of the subject as soon as possible.

There is one argument in favor of putting Socialist judges on the bench which is more powerful than all others and which should convince any workingman that he ought to vote the Socialist ticket. It is the well-known and indisputable fact that Socialist judges would not declare picketing illegal. Picketing, or talking to one's fellow workmen about common interests of the workers, is a right of free speech guaranteed by the Constitution, and any Socialist judge would promptly so rule.

The Chicago Produce Bulletin, which looks at things from the standpoint of commission men, lets out this gem: "Nearly every one in the trade had hoped that by the middle of August the receipts of butter and eggs would be very much below the same period one year ago and BELOW THE POINT OF CONSUMPTIVE REQUIREMENTS."

It is a nice, orderly, divinely-ordained system of production and distribution we have when one class of men is hoping that there won't be enough eggs to go around, just so that they can charge extra profits on some old ones they have been saving, many of which, by the way, are bad, according to the Produce Bulletin.

"Extra! Extra! Prominent non-Socialist seeks divorce from his wife. Names two Democrats and three Republicans in bill. Plaintiff is the nine-hundred-and-ninety-nine-thousandth man of anti-Socialist views to break marriage ties. His reactionary views held to be responsible for his course. Friends say that it is impossible for Democrats and Republicans to lead happy wedded lives." The above is NOT from the headlines of capitalist newspapers.

Lawyers in the Socialist party can now make themselves very useful. The Daily Socialist will issue special editions during the judicial campaign in Chicago. These will contain records of cases in which judges have decided against labor or made remarks showing prejudice against workingmen and in favor of capital.

However they may restrict the wards in Chicago next spring we will have a chance of electing two aldermen, instead of one, in what is now the Twenty-seventh ward. Socialists of that territory should redouble their present excellent efforts.

The banking question is up to President Taft. Shall the money of the country be controlled by a few big financiers of the Rockefeller-Morgan type or by a few hundred little fellows? Very important to the working people. They are very particular about who skins them.

There are precincts in Chicago where the Socialists are in the majority, and in no case is it an accident. Steady distribution of literature by some enthusiastic but patient Socialist has accomplished the result. YOU can do it in your precinct and victory will not be gained there until someone undertakes the work.

Taft says that he is in the middle of the road, resisting the tendency to Socialism. Better get out of the way, Bill, 'cause we're comin' powerful fast. The middle of the road is not a safe place for a fat man when the working class gets to breaking the political speed laws.

Every time you speak of the importance of Socialism, and your devotion to the cause, remember that you have in your pocket tickets for the Riverview picnic. If you cannot sell them you can afford to give a few away to those who ought to hear Seidel.

Educate the rank and file of organized labor and the leaders will have to follow them into the Socialist camp or be left alone. Do not worry about leaders. Get the man in the shop to read Socialist literature.

Pessimism is not consistent with Socialist philosophy. If you have any doubts about the coming of Socialism, then you are not well grounded in its philosophy.

History of the Supreme Court of the United States

9, act of 1855, which prohibited judges interested in civil causes, or related to the parties at action, from giving judgment (3).
