STOPS SELLING TICKETS SOUTH OF CAIRO, ILL.

Bulletin Says I. C. Passenger Traffic Is Tied Up in South.

A bulletin received today at Burnside from Cairo, Ill., says the Illinois Central has stopped selling tickets to any cities south of Cairo and that no trains have passed through Cairo southbound since yesterday morning.

Passengers Fear Wreck Tickets are still being sold in southern cities for points north of Cairo, but trains are later than ever.

ASK A. F. OF L. TO HELP STRIKERS IN RAIL FIGHT

Shopmen Will Appeal to Convention at Atlanta for Aid.

The American Federation of Labor will be asked to help the striking shopmen on the Illinois Central and Harriman lines in any way possible.

This fight we are making is one of the most critical in the history of the labor movement and is fraught with the greatest importance for every union man in the United States.

A Test Fight It is a test fight. If we lose, the principle of system federation will be lost and the railway labor movement will be set back ten years.

If the Illinois Central and Harriman lines beat us, it is probable not only that no more system federations will be recognized but that system federations already recognized will be disrupted.

At present the outlook seems bright enough, but we aren't going to lose any opportunity to help the cause along and make certain our victory.

Organize Woman's Auxiliary The wives, daughters and sisters of the strikers have started a movement to organize a woman's auxiliary to the system federation to help in every possible way to win a victory over the railroads.

They intend to start a campaign of education and publicity throughout the entire city of Chicago, by visiting all the women's clubs, calling on the business men in their homes and offices, and thereby enlist their sympathies and the public generally toward the system federation and the men now on strike.

Appeal to Markham If they fail in this they will become militant and go en masse to the offices of President Markham and Mr. Parks and continue to do so until the federation shall be recognized and the strike called off.

They will carry transparencies, cartoons and literature to announce to the public what they represent and the principles the federation is now striking for.

They have realized that the public has been misled through statements of Park in his paid ads. and the truth on the side of the men has been kept from the public and the real issue held up by what we are led to believe is the muzzling of the "loop" press.

They are deprived of the news some of them are paying for and not getting.

I. C. Guards Convicts The Illinois Central is hiring convicts and criminals as special policemen in the yards at Burnside, so what must be the character of the average strike breaker?

Bill Watson, who, after a service of twenty years with the Illinois Central, was arrested eighteen months ago and sentenced to six months in the bridewell for stealing brass tools from the yards, was re-employed by the company to act as a special guard.

The ultimatum issued by the company declaring that any striker more than 45 years old who stayed out after November 2 would never, under any circumstances, be re-employed by the company, was a flat failure.

Only one striker at Burnside, J. H. Hill, went back, though several hundred were affected by the order.

The Illinois Central appealed to a manufacturing concern at Hegewisch to take a contract to repair cars for the company, but the Hegewisch company, probably not caring to risk a strike of its own employes, replied that it would be unable to take any more orders for three months, on account of having more orders now than it can fill.
