TODAY, the dollar press halls with enthusiasm the mergor of coal companies controlling, 150 mines over 78,000 acree of land, in West Virginia, having an annual production capacity of 21,000,000 tone.

"Twenty years ago, perhaps even ten years ago," says the Chicago Journal, "the American people would have greated that announcement with the outory of monopoly."

The Journal favors the monoply, atho it claims to right for the people." It must needs calem that "the peoplu" are also in favor of it; that all they sak ia, "what difference will it make in the price and the dependability of fuel?"

The readers of the kept press are bligthely informed that monopolization will make a difference in their favor: that it will put the business on a rational basis, meaning that it will eliminate strikes, prevent car shortage, and bring about system in an admitted chaotic industry. The coal barons will no doubt be gisd to have the optimism of these sheets smother the opposition, if it can, of the "dear pearwood of the charge of the ch

The assurance with which the announcement is made that there will be no middle class opposition to the growing monoply in coal, is a confession that this class is getting meaker, rather than stronger. LaFolistick, in entering the presidential elections, gambled that the middle class protest was getting stronger.
