MIGRATION OF SOUTHERN NEGRO IN FULL SWING Large Numbers Enter Northern Industries

NEW YORK, May 7.—The annual spring migration of southern Negroes from the agricultural pursuits of the south to the northern industrial centers is the largest in history this year, records of employment offices and other organizations indicate.

Each year, thousands of Negro workers leave the southern farms and come to the larger cities to seek factory work. The Negroes are now entering Illinois, New York, Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, and other northern states in search of employment.

Unemployment is already widespread in the larger cities, and the Negroes are suffering keenly for lack of work. The wages paid the Negro workers are below those paid the white workers for the same class of work.

In New York, most of the Negroes from the south are entering the textile industries or are working as longshoremen, or in domestic service. There are 8,500 Negro longshoremen in this city, ten thousand work in the clothing trade of New York, 34,000 are in domestic service or as longshoremen.

The housing problem among the Negroes in the northern cities, where the Negro faces exorbitant rent, discrimination, and overcrowded conditions, has grown acute.

BLACKEST CRIME OF CAPITALISM IS BROKEN LIVES OF WOMEN AND GIRLS OF COAL MINING TOWNS

By SANDY, Worker Correspondent. When the history of the crimes of capitalism are written some of its blackest pages will be those describing the suffering and the hopeless lives of the women and girls in the coal mining camps.

The exploitation of the men and boy workers is had enough as they at least find some "recreation" in the pool room or down their agony in pool-rooms moonshanty, but the women and girls must wait their fate, whatever it may be, patiently.

Their lives are as drab as their homes, wooden shacks painted either red or dull gray with the window frames and doors painted white. Some day a revolutionist will write the story of these tombs, and what a story it will make.

A few of the larger camps may have a movie show or a dance hall, but the cheapness and the mental poison of the pictures are only exceeded by the crude vulgarity of the dance halls.

The early youth of the girls are spent in getting an "education" in a so-called school house. A girl teacher, often as young as some of the pupils, teaches all grades at the same time.

Girls' Ghastly Prospect. As the girls grow older the parents wait anxiously for someone to marry their daughter as it is a great hardship of the pictures are only exceeded by the meager wages of a coal miner.

It is not an uncommon sight to see old men having young girls—some children—on their wives. Often when a miner's wife is still very young she has many babies to care for, missing practically her whole youth.

Crimes at the Coal Camps. The boys can often find jobs in the mines with their fathers, but there are no jobs for the girls. She must either marry or leave home. Talk about operators are the greatest family breakers in existence.

LAUNDRY WANTS WORKERS TO PAY FOR INSURANCE

But That Is a Feeler for a Wage Cut

By MURPHY, Worker Correspondent. PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 7.—Groups of class-conscious workers have manifested themselves in the Keystone Branch of the United Laundry Co. of Pittsburgh, Pa., recently. Three weeks ago the boss placed on the workers the time clock, that the group insurance which the company carried on each worker will expire March 31.

This brought a general discussion among the workers as to how they were expected to show interest in the insurance and they found that the company was making a little money to keep these up, a new plan was now being developed to keep the workers from enjoying the benefit of that plan.

Workers Discuss Their Insurance. Last week another sign appeared stating that on Monday, April 13, Edward Burke, the company's life insurance would give a talk on the policy. A general discussion followed among the workers, who reached the conclusion that the one who wanted Burke to persuade them to take out their own policies, paid for by themselves. With this conclusion already reached, the speaker arrived.

He seemed to be afraid to talk extensively but got up courage enough to tell the workers that the insurance was not on the owners, that the insurance had to be cancelled and after praising the owners very highly he offered to transfer any policy which provided the workers would agree to pay for it.

"Pay It Yourself," Says Company. With class for questions, one of the workers asked what the rates would be, and Mr. Burke told him whenever he made up his mind to take out his own policy he would previously held, he would come over and talk to him privately. This brot on a heated discussion among the employees and many of them concluded that the boss was afraid the workers may offer resistance.

Due to the dangerous conditions under which the workers are employed they realize that they need to be insured but the company has been paying for it in the past and they could pay for it now. They all agreed that the next thing to expect is the inevitable wage cut.

Boss May Find Some Trouble. This insurance business was only to let us out if we take this without fighting, the owners will know that they will not have any resistance when they get ready to use the knife. "One man cannot do much fighting alone and when wage cuts come, it is time we forget our minor grievances and try to get the boss before he gets us and our wives and children all at once, one of the workers said.

Secret Session Shows Fear of Truth

(Special to The Daily Worker) SOFIA, Bulgaria, May 7.—The farcical trial by court martial of the persons supposed to be involved in the Soviet Red cathedral explosion now going on, is completely surrounded by white guard troops and a heavy veil of secrecy.

The session was secret at which the names of the supposed co-conspirators were divulged by the defendants who have apparently been promised escape from death for saying that the explosion was brought about by Communists instead of Jugo-Slavians.

It is learned however that some of the defendants under arrest have definitely alleged that money and arms came not from Moscow as alleged, but from Vienna and had been supplied by Jugo-Slavian and Macedonian nationalist revolutionaries.

To avoid publicity of this damning fact which appears in the world wide file of "Communist plots," the court martial sessions are secret.

The character of the "trial" may well be seen in the fact that the white guard troops surrounding the prisoners and in control of Sofia, have scull and cross-bones painted on their helmets and in the neckties of civilian lawyers for the prisoners are forbidden. Gen. Lasaroff, the commanding military of the white terror has assumed the title of "counsel for the defense."
