MEMORANDUM OF GENERAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE WORKERS PARTY OF AMERICA

WHEREAS of late unions are adopting resolutions against the exclusion of Saklatvala from the United States; The New York Central Labor Council has adopted a protest. The joint board of the organized clothing workers in Chicago has denounced his exclusion.
These organizations realize that the exclusion of Saklatvala is a blow at the labor movement of the United States. Saklatvala was excluded because he spoke for labor, because at the congress of the international union, he would have raised \$100,000 in the interest of labor.
The great British Trade Union Congress denounced that very British imperialism for fighting which Saklatvala was barred from the United States because the agent of Morgan in the White House and state department, wished to stifle his voice in the interest of imperialist loyalty of the capitalists.

Lad's Court Sentences Communist

WARSAW, (By Mail)—Bundestand Leadership, former Communist member of the Polish party, was sentenced to three years imprisonment for having concealed a trial at a court house. 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More Gunboat Diplomacy in China

The American gunboat Palau has rushed 1400 miles up the Yangtze river following the alleged firing of a shot by Chinese soldiers at an American-owned steamer—the Chi Chen.

What bloody possibilities there are in incidents such as this! The "manners of American diplomacy," as an American writer has called the naval detachments recently, are responsible to no one but the war department and in the past they have presented the American masses with more than one elaborate batch of "backward peoples"—neither lashed up or justified in the face of popular clamor.

The Chinese people are, with much pain and struggle, throwing off the yoke of their own reactionary ruling class and that of the foreign exploiters. Slowly they are uniting their country, dividing again and again by the military chieftains and ported out among the great powers. A national labor movement, the inflexible sign of the advancement of the masses, is rapidly arising. In many ways, more difficult for those who live in highly industrialized countries to understand, the Chinese workers and peasants, with some student organizations playing a leading role, are lifting themselves out of the morass of ignorance and poverty that western capitalism is largely responsible for perpetrating.

American shipping has never been regarded as an angle of pressure and light and it is certain that the American steamer which got into difficulty 1400 miles up the river from Shanghai was engaged in no altruistic mission.

In plain words, it had no business there, yet no sooner are its owners notified of its being looked upon as an enemy by the Chinese than a gunboat is dispatched to terrify the natives.

Of late there has been a lull in the news carried by the capitalist press on the Chinese situation. The popular opinion seems to be that the crisis has passed and that pending the conference of the Chinese government, they are uniting their country, dividing custom duties and extra-territoriality the aggressions of the imperialists will cease.

The dispatch of a U. S. gunboat to the interior of China shows that this is a wrong idea. American troops and warships are still in China. They are there to terrorize the Chinese masses and to support any reactionary uprising that can be utilized to thwart the Chinese liberation movement.

What news of the Chinese developments that is carried by the capitalist press now emphasizes the danger of the "Bolshevik menace." If the American military chose to slaughter Chinese workers, peasants and students, it will undoubtedly occur in the holy name of freeing them—and American businessmen in China—from the "menace of Bolshevism."

The Shanghai strike has shown that Japanese, British and American imperialist interests could not work together harmoniously although they had many things in common. The other powers will not allow America a free hand if her activity threatens their privileges. There is the threat of imperialism war of a world-wide character in such adventures as that of the gunboat Palau.

The French Deb

The middle class spokesmen can viny their heads off about the huge sums owed to "their country" by European nations, France in particular, but the kind of settlement that is indicated by the negotiations now in progress between Calthus and Mellon is fairly convincing evidence that American finance-capital is not going to forego the French ruling class into bankruptcy. That ruling class is still, with its hostility towards British imperialism, too valuable an asset for Wall Street to dispose of for a matter of a few billion dollars.

American imperialism prefers to keep France under its thumb and it allows her therefore to pay at the rate of \$40,000,000 per year on a total debt of over \$40,000,000,000. This is at the rate of one percent per year—certainly very generous terms for any debtor will admit.

But those generous terms can be revised at any time and the loan that the House of Morgan will continue to be the real ruler of France. The French national economy will be forced to adjust itself to the needs of Wall Street.

The debts are just the opposite of those of the French working class and peasantry and as in Germany a Dawes plan under some other name will throw the whole burden upon their shoulders.

Overhauling of the financial press of the diplomats and financiers put out for public consumption is the one basic fact that France is an appendage of American imperialism and favors in the matter of money payments that will be repaid a hundredfold by still more brutal oppression and exploitation of the French masses.
