IRISH WORKERS HAVE NO JOBS AND NO HOMES Strikes Increase Under So-called "Free State"

(Special to The Daily Worker) QUENOSTON, Ireland, Nov. 6.—The manufacturing crisis, coupled with the severe housing problem which are now raging in the British Isles, are particularly acute in Ireland under the capitalist "Free State" government.

Strikes are increasing throughout the country, and the government while it issues resolutions urging employers to employ the unemployed, has followed the policy of the Baldwin government and definitely will not do anything, if necessary, if it will act as a strikebreaking agency.

New Deal Will Show Us In support lines from now the Daily Worker is hitting, and the workers, especially in southern Ireland, will find that this new program of "recovery" made when the present government, the servant of British capitalism, was formed, has materialized into universal unemployment, abject poverty and general starvation.

It is now admitted that never since 1847 have workers and peasants of Ireland undergone such distress, not only in Cork but in the rest of the country, notably those that during the British regime were made into military encampments, and which are now practically deserted.

Under the "Free State" was founded, it was promised that industries would be re-opened and a fine reconstruction program and "the living wage" for all, and that the unemployed would be re-employed.

Just the reverse is now the case. The Daily has not even seen it fit to supply the unemployed with the thousands of jobs and steady work which the British government had offered to the misery by cutting the unemployment benefits and raising a tax.

Conditions in the "Free State" are increasing. In Cork, where the employers are circulating talk of another general reduction in wages, the prices have increased in some cases fifty per cent. For example, potatoes are now sold for 12 1/2 per weight, although in 1924 they were sold for less than 10 per weight. Milk is 2 1/2 per gallon, although the small farmers are forced to sell it for 10 to 15 cents.

In a British socialist, now residing in Cork, declares: "Tuberculosis still scourges 'Dear Old Ireland.' The most essential in some cases. Nevertheless, conditions in the government are withheld from many. Immediate treatment is the only prospect of recovery in an appalling epidemic, and hoping that those of our people who are responsible for the present mis-administration."

Family Lines in Evidence. There are numerous instances of the family lines prevailing. The last time the issue of the Cork county was forced to consider the case of the Irish woman, Mrs. Mary, a widow supporting eleven children and living in a stable. P. H. Barry, of the board of health said it might be cheaper to buy a house for her than to provide for her and her children to the workhouse. This was the same woman who was her stable at Donostia, and has declared that she will do so on the road rather than receive charity from the Free State.

Conditions in Ireland are but a sharp reflection of conditions prevailing in England, which have been given wider publicity. Just as Premier Baldwin will utter anything "discussing the lords," while thousands of unemployed are dying in overcrowded slums, so does the Daily do nothing but pass resolutions in order to keep the British home society. Joyousness and optimism in the government will "protect the country" and "develop the work of strikers, so does the British government intimidate the Fight Backing and Workers' Committee in New York City, and threaten with starvation because they resisted wage cuts.

CARPENTERS' WAGES GO UP, SAYS U. S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR, BUT FOR HOW LONG IT DOESN'T SAY

(Federal Press Industrial Editor) Union carpenters have continued to advance the general level of wages during 1925 although their gains have not been numerous as those recorded by the bricklayers and electrical workers, according to the U. S. Department of Labor on union wages and hours. In seven of thirty-eight cities covered in the report, union rates for carpenters were up over 1924, but in 1924, then in 1924, in two cities there were decreases. The average rose \$11.06 per hour in 1924 to \$10.71 in 1925, a gain of less than 1%.

But How Long Will It Last? Extending the comparison back to 1920 we find 21 of the 38 cities reporting increases while only eleven declines in minimum wages paid union carpenters. The average of the 38 cities rose from 97.6c in 1920 to \$1.07 in 1924, a gain of 9.5%. As the cost of living has fallen over 15% in the same period, the last 5 years have witnessed material improvement in the living standards of union carpenters.

The 4-hour prevail except in Cincinnati where they work 4 1/2 hours and in Richmond where the regular week is 47 hours. In 1920 union carpenters worked longer hours in Charleston, S. C., Cincinnati, Indianapolis, New Orleans and Richmond. Over 1914 14 cities have been brought into the 44-hour column.

St. Louis at Top St. Louis tops the list in carpenter wages with a minimum of \$1.09 an hour. Pittsburgh follows with \$1.17. The rate in New York is \$1.06 over 1920 and of 104% over 1914. In Pittsburgh the gains have amounted to 52% and 105% respectively. Union carpenters have the lowest scale in Charleston where the rate of 79 cents, which means a reduction of 21% per cent from 1920.
