## NATION-WIDE SEAMEN STRIKE HITS JAPAN PORTS

## BOSSES REFUSE MINIMUM WAGE

Hundreds of Ships Tied Up by Walkout

TOKYO, June 5.—All but three steamship lines in Japan are completely tied up as the result of a hation-wide strike called by the Seamen's Union last night. Seventy ships are being held in Yokohoma alone.

The walkout occurred at midnight after the steamship companies had refused to accept the union's demand for a minimum wage. Virtually every ship is idle as the result of the strike. Scores of vessels of all nations are tied up in a number of Japanese ports unable to load or unload due to the extremely rapid spread of the walk-

In spite of unusually provocative tactics on the part of the police, the spirit of the men is unbroken according to reports received here from Kobe, Osaka and other shipping centers. Even such an extreme northern port as Hakadati has been affected by the strike and a number of smaller ones are expected to join the strike within the next twenty-four hours.

The three steamship lines which have not yet been affected by the strike are the Nippon-Yusen, the Osaka-Shoshen and the Kwasaki.


### Miss Earhart Is Nutty, Her Old Man Says







## HEARINGS SHOW TAMMANY POLICE IN GRAFT MIRE

Republican Customs Men Also Bribed

The Tammany graft trail yesterday led to the police department when forty patrolmen including nearly a dozen sergeants faced investigation on charges of bribe-taking in connection with the smuggling of liquor into New York City from trans-Atlantic

As a result of the same disclosures eighteen customs guards were promptly fired in the usual attempt employed by the government to convey the impression that only minor officers were responsible. A hurried call for two hundred additional federal operatives was sent out for the district.

Wholesale bribery of police officials and custom guard employes, the smuggling in of cascades of booze, and even of narcotics, a threatened shake-up of the police department greater than that of any in years, were the developments which were yesterday made public.

The customs officials are republican controlled. This fact now brings the republican party neck and neck with the corrupt Tammany democratic machine in the race for graft laurels.

While these revelations were taking place in the police department continued disclosures at the trial of Charles A. McGee and William J. Oswald, street cleaning officials, brought out that only one honest street cleaning officer has been on the city payroll during thirty years.

This admission was made by William J. Lougheed, self confessed, grafter who is acting as states witness at the Bronx County trial of McGee and Oswald. In all these years Lougheed declared he had known many honest drivers and sweepers but only one honest official. When the list of fictitious names on the payroll appeared to be getting stale, Lougheed testified, Oswald and Mc-Gee would order him to substitute new names. Lougheed would then order Charles Stoeber to obtain new names. Stoeber would pass along in the Italian section and copy off names from letter boxes and door bells.

## Price of a Worker's Life

The nature of capitalist society is shown in the case of the nineteen workers, once employed by the United States Radium Corporation, fourteen of whom have been killed to provide profit for that corporation and five of whom are slowly dying.

The fourteen who died-are dead. The Radium Corporation has cashed in on their lives, and the profits are long ago distributed in dividends. The Radium Corporation gains by the high quality of its radium.

But for the last five, long and troublesome lawsuits were in

Knowing that the five dying women workers whom it had poisoned would not live long, the Radio Corporation tried to delay the lawsuits as long as possible with the help of the courts. With death slowly creeping upon them, the poison crippling them limb by limb, the five remaining women workers "listened to reason" and settled by taking what cash they could get from the cor-

What is the price of a working woman's life? In this case the women workers receive \$10,000 each in payment for being killed by their employers, together with \$12 per week until they die. And, yes—the company pays the doctors' bills.

So much for the price of the life of a woman worker.

For dying, the working women get \$10,000 each from the corporation which trapped them to their death for profit, while the lawver gets \$15,000 for representing them.

The World points out that the wages of the women victims of the Radio Corporation amounted to only \$900 per year. This fixes the standard of living for the class to which the women belong, the World thinks. And therefore it concludes that the \$12 per week which the women are to receive while dying is "a living income for persons in their state." And then—as though to exrose its own hypocrisy—the World assures the bosses that "the corporation might have fared much worse before a jury."

Intelligent workers are reminded by incidents of this sort that capitalist society, based upon the exploitation of labor, is the most ruthlessly cold-blooded system that has ever been known in human society. 
