THE assassination of Alvaro Obregon, president-elect of / Mexico, proves that the bacon and eggs and liberal credits policy of Mr. Morrow of the House of Morgan, ambassador to the southern republic, has not materially softened the bitter social struggle that has raged in that country for several years, between the big landowners, the Catholic Church and American investors on one side and the rising bourgeoisie on the other, supported by the work

AS these lines are written, there is no evidence other than strongly circumstantial, that the assassing tion was directed by the same organizations that have waged war on the Mexican republican government since the elimination of Diaz. But circumstantial evidence is strong and the most convincing I have seen are a guarded news report from Rome which states that the vatican was considerably "impressed" by the assassination and another by a former president of the Mexican congress which almost blamed Obregon for his own death.

THOUGH Obregon with Calles was one of the two outstanding leaders in the struggle of the big agrarians, who included Catholic bishops, he was a wealthy landowner. Recent reports indicated that while he held the same position as hitherto on the clerical issue he intended to draft new labor laws which might mean anything. However, his talk about the interests of capital and labor would go to show that they boded no good for the Mexican working class.


