SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 15.—One hundred and fifty pickets at the Seattle docks, marching all day in the rain yesterday, forced the Italian ship Cellini to divert its course to Olympia.

Liberal Party Wins Election In Canada

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—The reactionary Conservative Government of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett has gone down to crushing defeat before an electoral landslide which swept into office the equally dangerous but more demagogic Liberal Party led by former Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King.

With all but fifteen districts reported at this time, the Liberals were assured of 174 seats, the Conservatives of forty, the Social Credit Party of eighteen, the Cooperative Commonwealth Federation (reformists) of seven, Reconstruction Party one, and all others four. The extent of the landslide may be gauged from the fact that the Conservatives held more than four times their present number in the last Parliament while the reformist Co-operative Commonwealth Federation was cut to less than half their former representation.

Nevertheless, five years of Conservative rule alienated most Canadian voters. Taking advantage of the widespread discontent, the Liberals made their come-back on the basis of demagogic promises designed to sidetrack the indignation of the masses.

N.Y. Seamen to Boycott Italian War Cargo Ships

Responding to the example set by the Seattle Central Labor Council, in refusing to handle cargo destined for Italy, the New York Branch of the International Seamen's Union adopted a resolution against war Monday night which concurs with the resolution passed in Seattle. The resolution passed in Seattle and concurred in by the New York seamen resolves in part, "that we refuse to sail on any ships chartered for Italy, Eritrea, or Italian Somaliland or any war zone, and that we instruct our delegates to the Washington State District Council of the Maritime Federation of the Pacific, and the Central Labor Council, to recommend to the above bodies:

"That they instruct their respective affiliates to refuse to handle or load any commodities destined for Italy, Eritrea, Italian Somaliland or any war zone . . ." It was reported that the resolution was passed after more than thirty minutes of discussion and despite the strong opposition of the officials. Members of the branch said yesterday that they expected the executive committee to attempt to "put the resolution on the shelf" and that it would require the violation of the membership itself to assure the carrying out of the decision.

Italian Use Peons Capture Of Dum Dum Two Mexican Border Cities

HARAR, Ethiopia, Oct. 15.—Dr. Robert W. Hockman of Wheaton, Ill., heading a Red Cross unit stationed at Jijiga, formally reported today that Italian airplanes are shooting down Ethiopian troops from airplanes using machine guns with dum dum bullets. Dr. Hockman said he is forwarding what purports to be photographic proof to the Emperor at Addis Ababa. The dum dum is a soft-nosed bullet which expands on contact, making an ugly wound. Their use is deemed internationally and they are outlawed by a declaration of the Second Hague Conference in 1899.

Ethiopians seeking to prevent the invaders from reaching water holes established themselves in trenches on hill crests commanding trails and women manned ancient rifles with men whenever Italian troops appeared below. Gen. Rodolfo Graziani's forces generally had penetrated 30 miles north of Ualul, the correspondents agreed, but were finding each new step northward increasingly difficult and costly. The Daily Mail said the irregular troops, based at Harar, Jijiga and Tomsa by the Red Sea, numbered more than 200,000 and were being strategically directed by foreign military experts.
