WPA Is Asked For 2 Santas; Ridder Elected

Request of Department Store Is Opening Gun in Deflation Drive

Victor Ridder, W.P.A. Administrator for New York City, was apparently elated yesterday over the fact that a leading department store had requested that his newly formed Industrial Employment Bureau supply it with two well-fed Santas Claus impersonators for the Christmas holidays.

The request for the two Santas laid down the following specifications: They must be large, 180 to 200 pounds, and alike in appearance so that they can relieve one another. They must be loyal and especially entertaining to children and able to stand the pressure of the Christmas business.

Wage and hour rates for the positions were not included in the request. Funds Running Dry How long it will take Mr. Ridder to defate the W.P.A. rolls at this rate as he proposes to do through the Industrial Employment Bureau he does not say.

Asked about charges brought by the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Technicians and Chemists, that Jules Korchián, president of the organization, was discriminated against by W.P.A. officials because of organizational activity on the City Planning Project, Mr. Ridder insisted that he would not deal with the case personally but would leave the entire matter in the hands of the Employees Complaint Office.

Mr. Korchián charges that he was squeezed out of an assistant draftsman supervisor's job in order to take work on another project at lower wages. F. D. McHugh, assistant director of the Mayor's Committee on Planning, is quoted as saying that he would not have Korchián on his project.

Bakers Union Backs March Against Nazis

Endorsement for the Nov. 21 March Against the Nazis was given yesterday by Local 50, Bakery and Confectionery Workers International Union, which will march under its own banners and signs.

Many thousands of workers are expected to take part in the march which will start from Madison Square at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Torchlights will be used to light the line of march up Fifth Avenue to Columbus Circle.

"We will take part in any action in the interest of the workers and directed against the bosses," officials of the Local 50 said yesterday. This union is conducting strikes at the nine plants of the Cushman Bakery Company and one of the Silver Cup Bakery Company. The Cushman Company is being supplied with scabs by the Friends of New Germany, the American branch of the Nazis. The scabs were identified by strikers as members of the Nazi organization.

Final Tabulations Given Of Vote for Aldermen And Other Posts in City

Final tabulations of the aldermanic vote for the minority parties showed that the Communist Party increased its vote by 25,002 over the 1933 election figures, an increase of more than 96 per cent since that year. The vote for the Communist candidates to the Board of Aldermen totaled 50,994, as against 25,972 in 1933.

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Harlem Court Eviction Case Set for Today

Cyril Briggs, Member of Daily Worker Staff, Faces Disposses

On the request of counsel for the landlord, a new hearing will be held this morning in the Tenth Magistrate's Court, 1 West 125th Street, on the summary disposses and 30-day eviction proceedings initiated by Porter and Company, white Harlem real estate firm, against Cyril Briggs, Negro journalist and a member of the editorial staff of the Daily Worker.

The 30-day eviction notice was served on Briggs on Oct. 15, after he had organized the Negro tenants at 141 West 125th Street, where he lives, and the adjoining house at 139 West, to demand proper service and a reduction of rents in the two houses. Both houses are owned by the U. S. Trust Company, 45 Wall Street, and managed by Porter and Company.

The committee yesterday issued notices to all organizations and individuals to make reservations immediately and thus avert inconveniences to all concerned in this affair.

I. L. D. Group to Picket Cuban Consulate Today

The delivery of a formal protest against the terror in Cuba and a demand for the immediate release of Cesar Vilar, National Cuban Federation of Labor leader, by a delegation from the International Labor Defense, will be followed this morning by a mass picket line in front of the Cuban Consulate, 17 Battery Place.

"Rain or shine we shall picket the Consulate tomorrow," Mike Walsh, district secretary of the I. L. D., said yesterday. "In this way the workers of New York can show their solidarity with their Cuban brothers and help win the freedom of this valiant leader who has been in the forefront of the fight for a free Cuba."

Every branch of the I. L. D. is expected to send pickets to the District Office, 22 East Seventeenth Street, by 10 o'clock this morning to take part in the picketing.

The delegation which visited the consulate yesterday was cheered by a group of Cuban workers who were picketing when they arrived. These same workers are expected to take part in the mass picket line which will be thrown in front of the consulate today.

Project Workers Union Asks Parley on Demands

Charging that the W.P.A. complaint bureau has "either through lack of authority or through unwillingness" failed to act on grievances of organized labor, the Project Workers Union yesterday requested that Victor F. Ridder, W.P.A. administrator, personally hear a series of union demands on Saturday morning.

The request for a hearing was sent to the W. P. A. administrator by M. Gordon, chairman of a delegation of twenty-five from the Project Workers Union which was elected at a conference of the union last week.

Gordon's letter to the W. P. A. chief said: "At a conference of W. P. A. workers held last Saturday, under the auspices of the Project Workers Union, at which over 400,000 workers from 91 different projects were represented, a delegation of twenty-five was elected to discuss with you a number of immediate questions of policy."

"The experience of the W. P. A. workers individually, as well as of our Union, indicates clearly that there exists no authorization agency through which grievances and injustices can be rectified. The Complaint Bureau at Twenty-third Street, either through lack of authority or through unwillingness, has failed to act as such an agency.

"The delegation therefore requests an appointment with you for 10 a. m., on Saturday, Nov. 9, in order to discuss and adjust the serious grievances of the W. P. A. workers in New York City.

"We would appreciate an immediate reply. Respectfully yours, M. GORDON, Chairman of the delegation, 'Project Workers Union.'

Guild Case Goes Before Labor Board

Resolutions of support and contributions of money for pressing its efforts to compel the Associated Press to reemploy Morris Watson are being received by the American Newspaper Guild at its national headquarters in New York.

Morris Watson was discharged by the Associated Press a few hours after receipt of a request from the American Newspaper Guild for a collective bargaining conference, sent when the Associated Press reverted to the six-day week for editorial workers.

The case was presented yesterday to the National Labor Relations Board in Washington and, according to news dispatches, the Board has given the A. P. until the end of the week to reply.

The case is expected to become one of the major tests of the Wagner Act under which the Labor Relations Board was established.

Guilts in five cities, Rochester, N. Y., Washington, and San Francisco all have adopted resolutions of support for the fight, several of them strongly criticizing the act of the Associated Press in dismissing Watson. The Akron Guild sent \$50, part to be applied to the Watson case and part to the support of the Guild members locked out on the Amsterdam News in New York City.

The Washington Newspaper Guild announced its readiness to contribute financially when the need arises.

The first money from outside the Guild has just been received, a donation of \$25 from Arthur Mankel, president of the Commercial Telegraphers Union of North America.
