The Voting on State Election.

Acceptances and declinations closed on Nov. 27. The names of those that accept will be printed on the ballots that are sent out to the locals that have paid dues up to and including September. The ballots will be sent out about the first of December and returns from locals much reach the state office not later than Dec. 28.

Comrade W. W. McAllister of Springfield is anxious to go to work among the farmers in the Fourteenth district. He is willing to go out for his expenses and collections. Expenses are fare from previous stop and board and lodging. This makes a small cost after he once gets in a county, and locals should use him during the winter to organize their respective counties. Comrade McAllister makes a specialty of schoolhouse meetings, and has done considerable work in that line in Stone and other counties. Locals and Socialists in the Fourteenth district are requested to write the state secretary at once, stating how many days they can use McAllister in their neighborhood.

Next spring a local option fight will bob up in Scott County. It was a shrewd move on the part of the saloonkeepers to associate themselves in the newspaper business with some of our most influential ministers of God. Surely these "sky pilots" will not oppose the human interests of their business associates.

The official vote gives us 15,389 votes for Debs, as against 12,909 in 1904. The vote for state officers is about 4,000 more than in 1904. Just as in 1904, Behrens, candidate for Governor, was cut in favor of Folk, so in 1908 Garver was cut in favor of Hadley. Making allowances for the anti-Parker vote in 1904, we have increased our straight vote in the state about 4,000. Quite a number of the counties have made splendid increases. The "Socialist Labor Ticket" was credited with 867 votes. About 800 of these really belong to us, as no agitation was made for that ticket. The Republicans put the fake ticket on, but it did not hurt our vote as much as was expected. Swanger, who was largely responsible, was himself defeated.

Our present vote is undoubtedly solidly Socialist. Unlike the 1904 vote, which was in part a protest against Parker, this year the old parties vied with each other in securing the radical and labor vote. The Socialist vote this year is nearly a simon-pure article, and makes a splendid basis for future work.

Novinger comrades elected a constable. Local Rural is doing fine. "Send us some more die stamps for the inclosed"—so writes Secretary Markey. Local Kirksville has elected C. J. Smith as secretary in place of T. C. Haller. Another local that reports an increasing membership is Joplin. Total vote in Reynolds County is 32. In 1904 we had none. This is the result of agitation by comrades of Local Oates. The candidates for state offices that lost out by a few votes no doubt looked at the Socialist with dripping chops. A few votes here and there came in very handy this time. Garver will not be able to do any lecturing until after New Year's. Locals that had inquired for dates please take notice.
