But combinations amongst the toiling classes and even strikes in certain extremities are, he contends, necessities, for without such checks big companies and the conductors of great industries would at times treat their employes very unjustly.

SAYS PUBLIC SCHOOLS ARE A FAILURE.

"It is not for us to say that the public school system of this country is to be abandoned, but we have a right to expect recognition from the state in return for our permitting ourselves to be doubly taxed for educational purposes," said M. P. Mooney of Cleveland. "If our parochial schools come up to the standard of the public schools the state should help us in supporting them. Shall we sit supinely by and allow ourselves to be forever doubly taxed? Secular education and religious training must go hand in hand. Leading educators thoroughly versed in the public school system, have come to the conclusion that purely secular education is a failure. Our parochial schools are doing a great work in behalf of our country and we must arouse the public to realize this fact."

The history of all hitherto existing society is the history of class struggles. Freeman and slave, patrician and plebeian, lord and serf, guildmaster and journeyman, in a word, oppressor and oppressed, stood in constant opposition to one another, carried on an unintermitted, now hidden, now open fight, that each time ended, either in revolutionary reconstitution of society at large, or in the common ruin of the contending classes.

The workingmen have no country. We cannot take from them what they have not got. Individual character, and consequently, all charm for the workman. He becomes an appendage of the machine, and it is only the most simple, most monotonous, and most easily acquired knack, that is required of him.

Hitherto every form of society has been based, as we have already seen, on the antagonism of oppressing and oppressed classes. But in order to oppress a class certain conditions must be assured to it under which it can at least, continue its slavish existence.

While the representations made there are apparently safe and sound, I maintain that they differ radically from the teachings of religion and the Catholic faith in the following important particulars: 1. That the church and occupation must be separated. 2. That the state shall be deprived of authority. 3. That children are the economic wards of the state and must be educated through it and not through the parents. 4. That marriage should depend on individual selection and last only as long as affection continues, making of it other than a divinely ordained realization for life. 5. That private ownership of property should be dispensed with."

That the Socialist common wealth, that is to say, the people themselves, will throw safeguards round the marriage relation to preserve its purity, is altogether probable; and so this brings us to the last claim (5) which we have already answered. The archbishop winds up by saying that a "Catholic cannot be a Socialist" from the articles which he has just specified." So that his specifications being wrong, his declaration lacks force.

Most of the Socialist speakers visiting Whitewater were entertained at the Weaver homestead and they awakened the liveliest admiration in the child's mind. "When I become a man, I too will make speeches for Socialism," he was wont to declare. Comrade Watson writes that some time ago Stanley's school teacher colored the class to draw flags with colored crayons, and Stanley drew a Socialist flag. His teacher reprimanded him, saying that such a flag was not the American flag, to which he replied that it was the Socialist flag. "Why the Socialist flag stands for war," the teacher exclaimed. "No, the American flag stands for war; the Socialist flag stands for peace," declared the boy. The upshot was that Stanley was made to stay after school for his action, a martyrdom which he endured, no doubt, with the fortitude of a hero.
