ACROSS THE HERRING POND.

The Social-Democrats of England are agitating for an Autumn session of Parliament to deal with the unemployed problem.
Comrade Harry Quelch, editor of London Justice, is the parliamentary candidate for Southampton, and a vigorous campaign is being made.
Comrade Van Kol made a Dutch speech on imperialism in the Dutch parliament recently. The Dutch government came in for a severe showing up.
Comrade English Walling of the United States is contributing an interesting series of articles to the Labour Leader on "The Election in the United States." The articles will be helpful to Britons in forming a proper conception of politics in the United States.
A great Labor and Socialist demonstration was had in Glasgow two weeks ago. Among those on the platform and who addressed the meeting were Keir Hardie, the Countess of Warwick, and others. The largest hall obtainable was used and many were turned away.
The controversy between Comrade Keir Hardie of the Independent Labor Party of England and the members of the Social-Democratic Federation over fundamental points of Socialist doctrine has not been lessened by an article by Hardie in the current Nineteenth Century review. His claim that the revisionist tendency is growing is scouted by the Federation men, who cite the Dresden congress as the grave yard of modification. But on that point at least Hardie is more nearly right than his critics. In countries where there is a political democracy, Social-Democrats have been forced, where elected to legislative office, to meet actual conditions as they exist.

MINNESOTA.

The effect of the Debs meetings still grows. The whole state seems to have received an impulse from them. Since then nearly every paper in Minneapolis and St. Paul has had editorials and columns on Socialism. One says it is based on ignorance. Another that it is impossible. One preacher in St. Paul has preached a sermon against it. Another has "got religion" and joined the movement. Everywhere people understand now that there's something doing.
In Otter Tail County our vote is growing so rapidly that in sheer desperation the capitalist politicians undertook to deprive us even of the name Public Ownership party. But the comrades went to court and the county auditor was forced to put us on the ballot.
Surely the politicians are on the anxious seat when they are afraid to allow any name at all.
The movement in the twin cities is growing wonderfully. The ward meetings are all large and enthusiastic as never before. And the street meetings reach near to a thousand people at times. Every Socialist is happy. For we are winning now.

Debs in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The Debs meeting at Minneapolis Oct. 11 was in every respect the greatest meeting of the campaign. No political party has equalled it. Fully 5,000 people attended. The great exposition building was crowded to its utmost capacity. The enthusiasm was simply tremendous. The switchmen's union escorted Comrade Debs to the hall. A brass band of twenty pieces lead the march. Over \$100 worth of literature was sold and 500 Debs buttons disappeared in less than ten minutes. It is safe to say that thousands of people heard a lecture on Socialism for the first time and thousands of voters were turned to the Public Ownership party, as the Socialists are known in Minnesota. Since the two great meetings by Debs in Minneapolis and St. Paul our state headquarters at Minneapolis requests from labor unions, clubs and other organizations for speakers, literature and Debs buttons. The daily press, which has been treating our movement with silent contempt, was astounded by the tremendous Socialist meetings and gave extended reports.

Communication from the Hod Carriers' Union referred to the corresponding secretary to be answered as instructed.

The resolution of the joint council of the Boot and Shoe Workers was referred to the F. T. C. to read. The Board also recommended that Rec. Sec. Heath be custodian of the Social-Democratic Herald stock.

Business Agent Weber reported that there was no material change in the general labor situation; that the Illinois Steel Co. had refused to renew their agreement with their employees in their rail and sheet mills.

Delegates J. Mycock of the United Textile Workers of Fall River, addressed the council on the conditions of the Textile Workers at Fall River, and appealed to the delegates to have their unions contribute to the support of the men, women and children out on strike against starvation wages.

Attorney W. F. Thiel gave a 15-minute talk on the 8-hour decision of Judge Halsey.

Henry Raasch was elected on the Executive Board in place of Wm. Hansen of the Metal Polishers' Union, whose union has withdrawn him.

Delegates E. Doyle and A. Hingford were elected on the Grievance Committee, but as Delegate Doyle refused to serve, the matter was laid over to the next regular session.

Ever since the Social-Democrats elected last spring there has been a persistent but underground effort on the part of the capitalists to get them out of the council by making it impossible for them to continue as bread earners under the capitalist system.

The latest victim of capitalist hatred of the working class and its citizenship rights is Ald. Welch of the Tenth ward. He was next to the oldest employe of the Meyer-Rotier Printing Company.

The resolution of the Boot and Shoe Workers in regard to Judge Halsey's decision was read and referred to E. B.

The resolution of Typographical Union No. 23 advocating that the state establish its own printing office and endorsing Bro. Wm. A. Arnold as the candidate for governor, approved and placed on file.

Delegates Berger, delegate to the A. F. of L. convention for the I. T. U., was requested to introduce a resolution for financial assistance to appeal the 8-hour case to the Supreme Court of the state.

standing that gradually the workers that do not support politically the interests of the capitalists are to be thoroughly weeded out. Last week the gang bosses and foremen at the big West Milwaukee car shops went round to each employe and wrote down his answer to their questions as to how he would vote, the inquiry being especially as to the La Follette ticket, the La Follette faction having been making war on the railroads. The shops are full of Social-Democrats, who resented such interference with their right of political conscience, and the Machinists' lodges have sent word about the affair to their international headquarters. One thing is already pretty plainly indicated: That the working class will sooner or later have a severe struggle on its hands to maintain its right of suffrage. The capitalists see, what certain workingmen still fail to see, that the ballot is the only effective weapon that Labor has, and it is in that direction that capitalism will have to strike if it hopes to disarm its opponent in the class struggle.

We have had occasion before to refer to a Twelfth ward plug-ugly named Roman Ziarnek, who keeps a saloon on Grove street, and who is now ward foreman and general ward bruiser for the Rose machine. It was Ziarnek's specialty to terrorize citizens at the polling booths without regard to the law or fear of the police. More is coming to light about the fellow. Just at present he is the Democratic candidate for state senator, but if all we hear about him is even half true he would appear to be also a candidate for the state prison at Waupun. One of Ziarnek's followers bears the name of Gora, and Ziarnek is reported to have arranged to make him the ward foreman in the event of his own election to the state senate. But men to be appointed ward foremen have to pass a city service examination, and Gora being an illiterate man would be supposed to be thus out of the question. But Ziarnek, being on the inside of the Rose machine, is a resourceful fellow, even some people might call him crooked. So the story goes that he secured a list of the questions that would be asked in the examination of Seey. Vlach of the city service board, and Gora secured the necessary help to enable him to prepare to answer them properly. But in his ignorance of the crime of the thing he told his friends about it and showed them the list of questions, and the thing leaked out. At any rate Gora passed the examination, and will watch the returns week after next to see if Ziarnek is to pass the ward foremanship over to him!

In these days of blacklists and Parry-sitism the wage workers have a terrorism held over their heads by the work masters that makes life pretty much a burden to them. Activity in the union is reported by capitalist spies. And working class politics, too, is often the reason for their losing their jobs. The big masters are not above taking this mean advantage of their economic situation, and have a secret under-
