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

We are sorry to have to admit that all this is true. It is a fact that most of the wage-workers of the country do not as yet belong to any union. The Socialist party, through its press, through its speakero, and by every means, urges all workingmen and all working women to join the unions; it does not assume to advise what union they should join, whether those organized on craft lines and affiliated with the American Federation of Labor or those organized on industrial lines and affiliated with the Industrial Workers of the World; that is a question for them to decide, according to the circumstances of their trade and their locality; but in any case we may expect that their experience in the labor movement will teach them to work for closer organization within each trade and among the several trades.
