Mysterious Corporation to Battle with Ryan.

Articles of Incorporation Filed at Albany—Attorneys Refuse Names of Directors—Traction Trust Contempts—Application for Franchise to Be Made to Public Service Commission—To Operate Lower Cross-town Lane First.

Wrapping the names of its directors and officials in secrecy, an apparently well-financed corporation is about to fight Thomas F. D. Ryan and the Traction Trust for possession of the streets, offering as a wage to battle a three-cent fare.

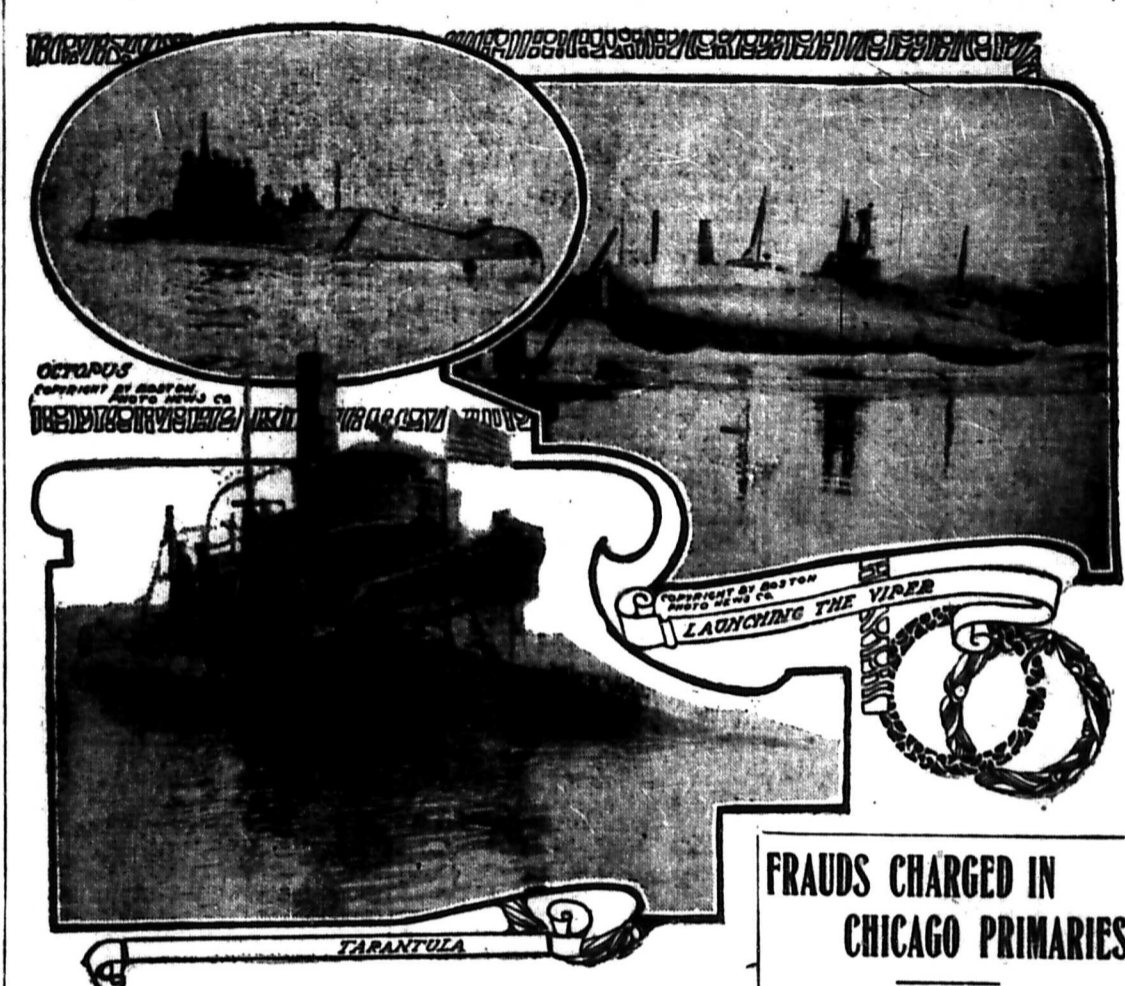
Nichols & Walsh, of 12 Broadway, attorneys for the corporation, refusing the names of the personnel, said significantly that an application would be made in the near future to the Public Service Commissioners for franchises to build roads over some of the streets mentioned.

A portion of the territory mentioned in the incorporation papers is included in the Wall and Cortlandt street ferry street railway franchises of Thomas Fortune Ryan and his associates, and is known as the famous paper railroad. A grand jury once tried to get an accounting of the alleged paper road. But the investigation was fruitless.

The platform adopted makes a more direct bid for the labor vote than has been done in years by a New York Republican convention. It endorses the national and state Republican administrations and the national ticket, opposes change in form of ballot, regulation of primaries, improvement and development of state canal, rivers and harbors, expansion of national resources, eight-hour day for state employes, regulation of factory inspection, protection of women and children in industrial occupations and extending employers' liability. The people are called to rebuke Democrats at the polls.

The ticket nominated is: For Governor, Charles E. Hughes, of New York; for Lieutenant-Governor, Horace White, of Onondaga; for Secretary of State, Samuel S. Koenig, of New York; for State Treasurer, Thomas B. Dunn, of Monroe; for Comptroller, Charles H. Gaus, of Albany; for Attorney-General, Edward R. O'Malley, of Erie; for State Engineer and Surveyor, Frank M. Williams, of Madison; for Associate Judge of the Court of Appeals, Albert Haight, of Erie.

GROWING RAPIDLY

Socialists Advance with Giant Strides.

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—The weekly bulletin, just issued by National Secretary Barnes of the Socialist party, contains the following interesting notes:
"The receipts of the national office for dues stamps for the month of August amounted to \$2,380.15. This breaks all previous records and shows that payments were made by 1,584 members in excess of the number recorded in any previous month. Chapters were granted since last reported to local in unorganized States as follows: Good Luck, Miss., 5 members; Kearney, Neb., 5 members; Caldwell, Neb., 5 members; Hawthorn, Miss., 7 members; Lawrence, Miss., 6 members; Melrose, N. M., 7 members; Moss Point, Miss., 5 members; Star, Neb., 6 members; Nome, Alaska, 24 members.
"National Committee motion No. 29, providing for the appointment of Comrade Alfred Wagenknecht as organizer for the Socialist party and immediate assignment, has been adopted by the following vote: Yes, 17; No, 7; not voting, 13. Wagenknecht has been assigned work in Missouri, under the direction of the State Secretary.

MINISTERS' MANIFESTO

Many Clergymen Declare for Socialism.

The following manifesto has been signed by the Ministers of 181 ministers who form the Ministers' Socialist Congress:
We, the undersigned Ministers of the Gospel, do hereby declare our faith in Socialism. We believe that Socialism is the economic expression of the religious principle of brotherhood upon earth. We believe that the economic teaching of the scriptures would find its fulfillment in the co-operative commonwealth of modern Socialism. We believe that the present social system based as it is upon the sin of covetousness, makes the ethical life as practiced by religion impracticable and should give place to a social system founded on the Golden Rule and the Royal Law of the Kingdom of God. Those who have their neighbors as themselves, which realize the government's duty to create an environment favorable to the practice of religious life.

TICKET CHOPPERS HAVE NO REDRESS

The ticket agents and choppers employed on the subway have taken odd and unusual means to improve their condition. They are afraid to hold meetings to protest against the horrible conditions under which they work, so they have written to the management asking that the hours of labor be shortened and that they be allowed one day a week off. The letter went on explaining that the hours are too long, that they have to eat their meals on the platform or in the ticket booths, and that they are allowed only one day off each month. One of them said Monday: "We can't hold a meeting to protest, for we would be discharged. We can only hope that the man higher up will look at the case fairly and right the wrong. People who find half an hour in the subway uncomfortable may imagine what living and eating in one month day's a week means."

BINGHAM EXPLAINING

Tries to Square Himself for Anti-Jewish Utterances.

HARTFORD, Sept. 16.—In an interview here Police Commissioner Bingham expressed surprise at the indignation aroused by his article in the North American Review stating that 30 per cent of the criminals arrested in New York were Jews. He said: "When I wrote that perhaps half of the criminals in New York City were Hebrews, I simply stated a fact. I stated other significant facts in that North American Review article, and my purpose must be plain to every intelligent man who has carefully read my words. What I wrote was in the nature of an appeal for help to the honest citizens of New York. It was an appeal to the educated Hebrews and Italians to aid in the battle against crime. I simply laid before them certain facts about the ignorant and vicious of their own race, so that they would place in my hands weapons with which to wage a better fight. But it seems that I have been badly misunderstood in certain quarters. I see by the papers that influential Hebrews have petitioned Mayor McCallan for my removal, and that alternative resolutions of condemnation are in course for me. All this is simply nothing. 'TROVATORE' HEARD AT THE AMERICAN

By HARRY CHAPIN FAHNER. Had the late Giuseppe Verdi ceased his labors as a composer at the time of the production of his opera 'Il Trovatore' (The Troubadour), which had its premiere at the Teatro Apollo, in Rome, January 19, 1853, he would rank to-day among the great masters of the Italian school. It was then forty years of age and had given to the world many splendid works, among them the opera 'Nabucco' (Nabuchadnezzar), 'I Lombardi alla Prima Crociata' (The Lombards in the First Crusade), 'Ermanno e Ricolfo' and 'Rigoletto'. The creation of these five dramas, which represented a period of eleven years of active composing, would have entitled him to share the honors of Beethoven, Donizetti, Rossini and other of the composers of the early Nineteenth century. For forty years more, however, the maestro labored and his last great opera, 'Falstaff', was completed to him in his sixtieth year (1893). 'Otello', an operatic setting of Shakespeare's 'Othello' and the Egyptian historical miniature 'Aida' were the results of Verdi's constant efforts in his later years. And his great work, the advance which these operas accomplished, not only for Verdi's own individual progress as a composer, but for the evolution of the music of Italy, that the score of 'Trovatore' now appears as a more nearly perfect work than any other. It is original in its form, and that it still remains a popular favorite is a fact to be recalled when one considers the crowds that attend its every performance to-day—more than half a century since its initial appearance.

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
