LONGBOAT MAY
RACE SHRUBB

Tom Longboat's signal victory over Dorando Tuesday night was widely discussed by sporting men. Various reasons were advanced for the defeat of the little Italian, one being that he was simply outclassed, another that he was not properly handled, while it was also said that he was beaten because of the superior generalship of the longstriding redskin.

Longboat finished so powerfully and with so much speed that athletic sharpshooters were dumfounded. This convinced them that Longboat could have run away from Dorando at any stage of the race and that his clever tactics in taking the lead at various times to worry the Italian resulted in Dorando's gradual loss of stamina.

Dorando's followers, if seemed, could not bear to see him trailing behind Longboat at the end of the race, so that it was a fact that when the Indian went to the front to get a swift pace Dorando, urged on by his friends, exerted himself to the limit to outpace the redskin.

Dorando says he was tripped. Dorando was quoted yesterday as saying that he did not fall from the race, but that he was tripped by Longboat. As Longboat was leading by two yards when Dorando stumbled and fell upon his face, such an assertion appeared to be groundless.
