RUSSIA WILL RULE IN CITY OF TABRIZ

Then Bloody Czar's Troops Will "Punish" Persians Who Resisted. ST. VERDICT FOR HARRIS AND BLANCK WORST BLOW AT THE COURTS

FEARFUL EPIDEMIC SWEEPS BERLIN

Deaths in Pauper's Shelter Followed by 100 Attacks of Disease. BERLIN, Dec. 28.—An epidemic of some strange nature has already claimed fifty lives in the Municipal Night Shelter and other asylums here. One hundred other cases are reported today. There is fear that the victims are suffering from cholera or the plague.

CONFIRM RUSSIAN SAVAGERY

In contradiction of the Russian accounts of Persian treachery and aggression at Tabriz, Reht and Euzell, the Persian committee in London, composed of prominent Englishmen interested in Persian affairs, received the following telegram from the Provincial Assembly at Tabriz, sent through the Persian Society of Constantinople:

Oppose Russia's Punishment Plans.
