WOOD INDORSES THE TILLSON BILL

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff, today gave his approval to the bill introduced by Representative Tillson of the Connecticut, minority member of the House Committee on Military Affairs, which provides for the establishment of a military reserve in the United States.

Representative Tillson, who is a lieutenant colonel in the Connecticut Militia, seeks to meet these two propositions. First, that the United States Army, with the National Guard as it now exists, is entirely inadequate for national defense in case of war, while the immediate usefulness of the small army would be largely destroyed by the necessity of filling up the ranks with untrained men; second, that the American people do not desire to maintain a regular standing army large enough to provide an adequate national defense.
