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## TWO COLLISIONS OF VESSELS IN FOG

### Inner Rains Battleship and Two Steamers Bump in Sound.

NEWPORT, July 7.—In the dusk fog of early dawn in Narragansett Bay today the Fall River Line steamer Commonwealth ran head-on into the United States battleship New Hampshire with a crash that threw passengers from their bunks and sent the ship reeling.

The Commonwealth was just pulling out for Fall River under Capt. W. Appleby and the New Hampshire, in charge of Capt. James E. Oliver, was lying at anchor.

The steel and wooden hulls crumpled up like paper, despite the fact that the Commonwealth's captain reversed the middle wheels.

The Commonwealth backed away after the impact she carried an amount of the words 'New Hampshire' on her port bow, while the gray hull of the battleship bore numerous white paint marks from the liner.

The Commonwealth's bow was badly damaged. The steamship struck the battleship fair and square bow on the result was the tearing of a hole several feet in length in the wooden work on the starboard side.

The more serious damage, however, was in the steel hull. The bow fender had a perceptible turn in it and down close to the water line and extending some distance below the water the steel plates were crumpled up and pushed astern a few feet.

Passengers hurried for the lifeboats and life preservers as they appeared on the deck. The crew strapped preservers on the women, while officers went below to ascertain the extent of the damage.

## MANY ARE DROWNED AT SUMMER RESORTS

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 7.—Hot weather drives Wisconsin people to the lakes and rivers for swimming today and many drownings are reported.

At Oconomowoc, John McVicker of Pittsburg, employed at the Hotel La Lumiere, drowned and but for Erwin G. Hunter, 11 years old, son of the proprietor, McVicker's companion, William E. Keller, a musician, would also have lost his life.

At La Crosse, William A. Downs, aged 24, was drowned in the Mississippi, and Miss Gertrude Kaser, his companion, aged 19, who attempted to save him went down the third time and was rescued from the river unconscious. Downs was taken with cramps.

At Green Bay, Dr. D. E. Grogan, a physician, narrowly escaped death from artificial respiration as he died at Bruce Lynn Allen, aged 24, who had been camping with his parents at Lake Amaroo, was overcome by heat and fell out of the boat.

PREPARE TO FIGHT CARIBBEAN PLAGUE

U. S. Ports Will Be Safeguarded Against Invasion of Scourge, Pestilence Attacks Havana.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Further arrangements were made today by officers of the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service to guard the United States from the plague-infected ports of the Caribbean coast.

Dr. B. Von Eckardt, of the Marine Hospital Service, is now on his way to Cuba and is expected to arrive there tomorrow or Tuesday.

## PUBLICITY MAY STOP PERUVIAN ATROCITIES

### Believed Publication of Casement Report Will Help Ameliorate Conditions.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Beneficial results are expected by officials here from the publication today of the details of the Casement report on the atrocities against the Indians in the Peruvian rubber districts.

While officials of the State Department are inclined to be sympathetic with Peru, especially as that government claims to be endeavoring to remedy a situation admittedly inhumane, it is believed that publicity will prove a good thing.

For some time the State Department was opposed to Peru being branded with the Putumayo atrocities until that government had at least given an opportunity to make amends.

## BOSTON FACING A GENERAL STRIKE

Central Labor Union May Call Universal Strike to Sustain Casement—Say War Is Class Struggle.

BOSTON, July 7.—The strike of the local armmen which began about a month ago, when about 4,000 employees of the Traction Trust of this city abandoned their posts in rebellion against the company's ruling against the organization of the men, today assumed most threatening proportions.

At a meeting of the Central Labor Union of this city today it was voted that the executive board of that body consider the advisability of calling a general strike to sustain the right of the armmen to organize and maintain their union.
