HOUSEWIVES' LEAGUE

By SOL BROMBERG.

Recently there has grown a spontaneous movement of the working class in New York, Philadelphia and other cities...

If the workman labors hard from eight to ten hours a day for wages he is at least saved from the riddle of providing the home with the prime necessities of life that his wages fall utterly to accomplish.

And while the man is given the lion's share of the meal the mother has to stand the pain and anxiety of dividing the little what is left among her children and herself.

So they have spontaneously arisen from their slumber and declared a boycott of the highly charged necessities of life. We will deal here with the so-called meat strike...

The aim of the newly-formed Consumers' League, as it has recently crystallized, is first, to lower the prices of commodities; second, to improve the quality of the product; third, to control the stores as far as cleanliness and hygiene is concerned; and fourth, union help in the stores.

The adoption of such a broad and high-minded program can be explained only by the class and social character of the movement.

Who will say then that our own mothers, wives and sisters, exploited as the performance of their highest duty, that of maintaining the fire-side, are unable to likewise hasten the downfall of the new tyrant—capitalism?

Before answering numerous objections that the housewives' movement is "anti-Socialist," "unscientific," etc., we will state some of the facts concerning this movement.

It is a matter of common knowledge that the prices of foodstuffs, meat, inclusive, have risen skyward during the last few years. Conservative estimation puts this rise at 60 to 80 per cent during the short period of ten to twelve years, meats that were priced at 8 to 14 cents a pound are now charged from 18 to 25 cents and higher.

The jumps of prices have always met with murmur and irritation of the housewives. The purchase has necessarily decreased as the earnings of the workmen have risen a much lesser proportion.

As the number of butcher shops is excessively great and their individual trade small, the fall in sales has reacted upon the storekeepers. Thus the butcher shops become the places of debating on high prices of commodities.

On the contrary, he usually joined the housewives in their protest, which is to a great extent due to the meat packers and wholesalers. So the sentiment grew constantly until it broke out into a boycott of meat.

So the idea of forming housewives' organizations has simultaneously arisen wherever the meat boycott has been declared.

In Harlem, as well as on the Lower East Side, Brownsville, East New York, Brooklyn, consumers' leagues have been formed with the determination to have big solid bodies to lead the revolt against high prices of necessities of life generally and meat in particular.

In Harlem, we have held a few indoor meetings at which 250 women members have already enrolled during the last two weeks.

new hope for the betterment of their lives. They are permeated with the feeling of power and strength that belonging to a great homogeneous body always gives.

The housewives' movement is a working class movement in the broadest sense, as it concerns all the working class families without regard to trade or occupation.

There is very little hope or danger of middle or upper class women joining this movement in considerable numbers, as the cost of prime necessities of life is a minor consideration with them.

Being a broad working class movement it is conducting its campaign openly, and therefore considerable protection from treachery and scheming, as information about it comes in very fast from neighbors and is quickly disseminated.

The butchers and their wives have repeatedly attempted to confuse or disorganize the movement, but have failed utterly to accomplish their end.

The appeals for "fairness" and "pity" for the "poor" butchers coming in from some charitable and middle class conscious Socialists are met with derision.

So they cannot understand why a butcher shouldn't look for a job, for any job, just like their husbands and sons and daughters.

It will be in place here to state that the food supply is subject in a much smaller degree to trustification and monopoly than any other industry.

Those who are always at the meetings and around have never heard complaints from the men because their wives leave the house to attend meetings.

All progressives will probably agree that the organization of housewives for such a broad and noble purpose as the Consumers' League has is desirable and beneficial.

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organization which means that the members of the league residing in each block elect a chairlady; she communicates with all the members in the block, arranges for picketing, collects dues, etc.

Now as to the objections to the consumers' movement. We will not consider long the rebuke that we destroy the welfare of some of the shopkeepers who will be squeezed out, being unable to sell the products at the prices we want them to sell on account of bad management or small sales.

CHARITY IN DEBT. An indebtedness of \$27,500, not through its fault, but rather through its merit, beclouds and hampers the active effort of the Society for Organizing Charity.

The amount of the debt is slightly larger than the entire amount received in a year past to carry on the work of the society plus the \$8,500 which was taken from the general fund to relieve the urgent necessities of applicants.

As an indication of what may happen when the Socialists become the dominant political party in Germany and a forerunner for Emperor William of what he may expect from the "reds," the Socialists in the Diet of Alsace-Lorraine have stricken from the civil list in the budget the \$5,000 annually paid by the province to the Kaiser.

I wouldn't try just now to explain the extent to which the consumers' leagues can cripple and tame the food combinations. This would be a hard task to accomplish even in regard to labor unions fighting the trusts at the point of production or the Socialist party combating the corporations at the point of lawmaking.

We also believe that eventually when this solidarity grows and the laboring class becomes conscious of its economic and social power and unity, it will simply refuse to be rubbed by the trusts introducing new elements in the play at economic forces.

There is presently much talk in Socialist circles about how to reach women with the Socialist message. There has been much talk about it and very little done.

What about the spirit of organization that our movement introduces among housewives, the probably biggest group of the working class? What about their educational influence upon their children?
