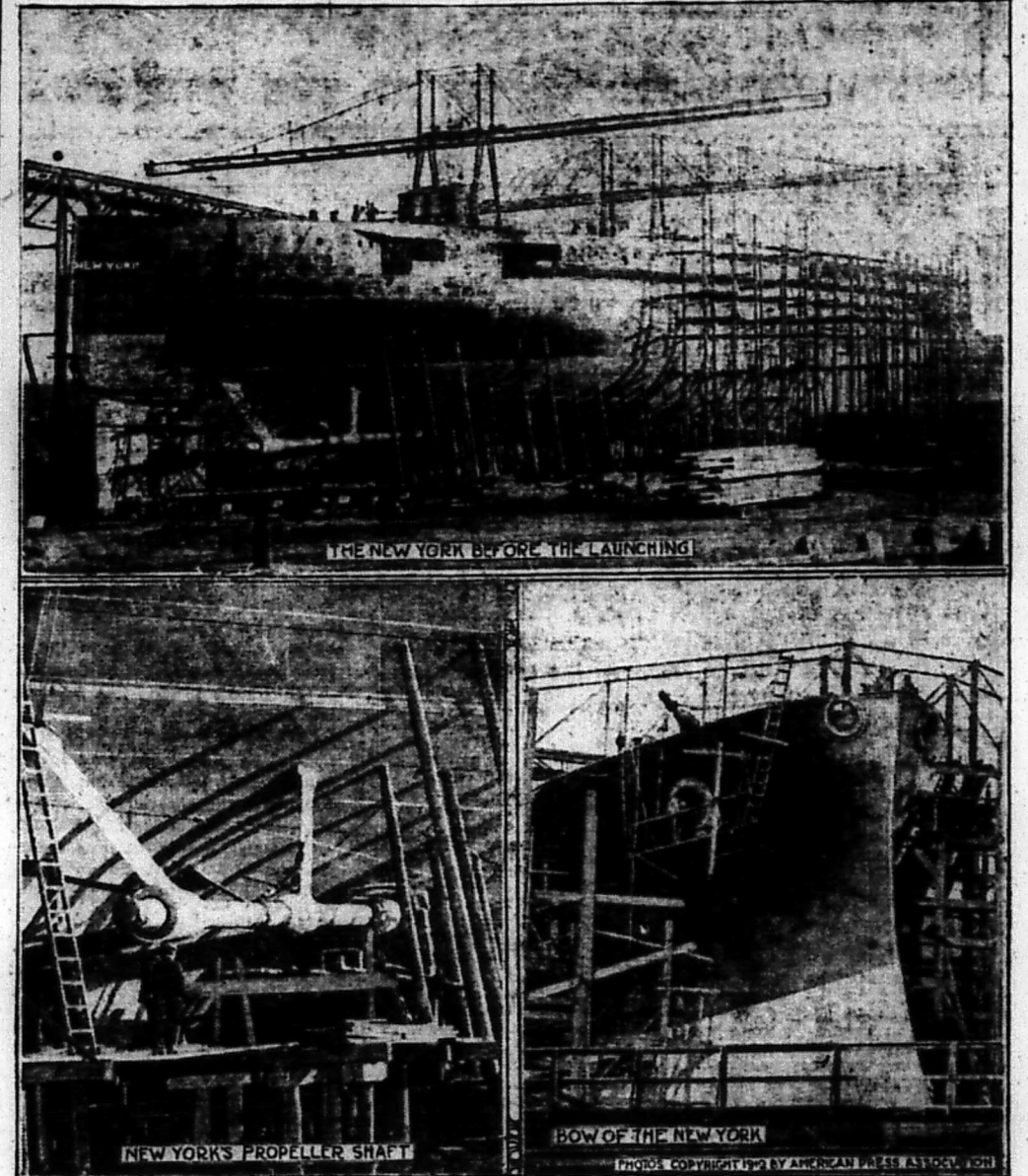

"PRACTICAL" SOCIALISTS

Have you noticed in the last few years how many politicians have become "practical" Socialists? Roosevelt is against the theories of Socialism, but he is willing to stand for all the immediate measures proposed by Socialists.

Shrieking Into Deaf Ears

When Mark Hanna many years ago undertook the work of campaign manager for McKinley, his requests for the necessary cash met with instant and liberal response. Hanna was considered about the shrewdest compound of business and politics that ever happened, and millions in campaign funds were entrusted to his keeping.

THE SADDEST CASE

A day or two ago a young woman of 25, drenched with rain and weak with hunger, staggered into a Bronx courtroom with two children, a girl of 6 and a boy of 5, clinging to her soaked and tattered skirts.

And the magistrate remarked that it was one of the saddest cases that had ever come before him. Magistrates are in the habit of making such remarks. He did not, however, say that it was unusual or surprising.

And it is not. There is probably not a magistrate in New York City, nor for that matter in any other large city, that has not had similar cases come before him again and again.

But it has no such effect on the opponents of Socialism. On the contrary, such feeble efforts as Socialists may make to keep the home intact are twisted and distorted to represent the very opposite intention.

When the Socialists of New York and other cities offered temporary homes to several hundred children of the Lawrence strikers for the purpose of permitting their parents to fight the battle against hunger with a little more freedom of action, a professor of "applied Christianity" rose to denounce the procedure as a piece of "insane foolishness" to which the attention of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children should be directed.

And an escaped Socialist, a Jew, posing as a convert to Roman Catholicism, peddles a book with the lying title of "Socialism—A Nation of Fatherless Children," and is acclaimed in some quarters as a champion of the home and family, while capitalism smashes homes and families to pieces by the thousand daily.

THE POLITICS OF THE STRAW VOTE

Straws, it is said, show best how the wind blows, but it does not necessarily follow that the "straw vote" is as reliable for determining the direction of the political wind.

Its greatest drawback seems to be that the political wind can be manufactured and ordered to blow from any particular quarter that the straw vote manipulator desires.

But be this as it may, it is worthy of passing notice that one Senator Dixon, a straw vote expert of the Bull Moose party, declares that the business-men of the country have no conception of the size of the vote that will be polled for Debs; that straw votes taken in hundreds of factories showed Debs far in the lead of Taft, and that in many districts Taft would be clearly behind Debs; that it would not surprise him if Debs should poll 2,500,000 votes.

But the impression Senator Dixon only too obviously wants to leave is not that the Socialist vote will be abnormally large but rather that the vote for Taft will be so small that he has "no chance of election," and that therefore votes for him are wasted, and those Republicans who want their votes to count should vote for Roosevelt instead, as Roosevelt has a "chance of election" and Taft has none.

And for this reason we don't lay the flattering unction of Senator Dixon to our Socialist souls—that is, not to any great extent. The "politics" of his straw vote is only too apparent.

If it has any significance to us, it lies in the fact that it is the first time, so far as we are aware, that Socialism has been represented as being powerful enough to destroy the "chances" of a candidate of one of the two great national parties, of a President of the United States seeking re-election. Even if it is not true, it is none the less significant.

But a few years ago the voters were complacently assured that a vote for the Socialist party was literally "thrown away," and the assurance was almost universally accepted as a matter of undeniable fact. Now, however, votes for a particular capitalistic candidate are represented as being thrown away because of the voting strength of Socialists.

We should certainly like to roll up enough votes to beat Taft. But we have no especial desire to beat him, merely to insure Roosevelt or Wilson or any other capitalist candidate beating him. All three look about alike to us.

It may be that the business men of the country have no idea of the size of the vote that will be cast for Debs; perhaps no more than Dixon has. We are not in the political field for the purpose of "surprising" business men in particular. We are there for the purpose of destroying capitalism instead.

And whether we get 1,000,000, 2,000,000 or 2,500,000 votes, that purpose remains unalterable and unaffected by what any capitalist politician may ascribe to us through the medium of his straw vote.

COLORLESS ELOQUENCE

While we are great admirers of oratorical declamation and quite ready to worship at the shrine of heaven-born eloquence, we think there is something lacking in the following editorial effort of the New York Globe in regard to the downfall of Jack Johnson, the giant negro pugilist:

To All Fat Priests

If you have never hunted hunger for a feed. If you've never felt the gray growl and bite. How can you preach a starve Saviour's creed. Or shelter famished souls from storm and night? If you never dined from some blackened can. On hidden coals beside a road. How can you know the homeless of Man. Whose footsteps bled, whose pillow was the sod? I saw the bread line in the street. Chill winds, through close drawn rags, bit less hard bare. Huddled amid their ceaseless shudder feet. Jesus of Nazareth shrank and averted there.
