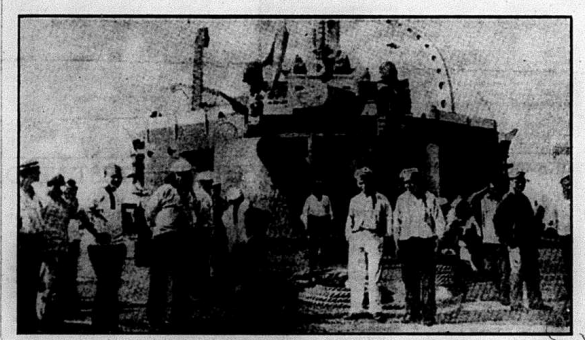

The following report of the Socialist vote wherever the workers have an opportunity to vote, expresses the growing power of the movement having for its mission the emancipation of labor from the world-wide rule of capitalism: Argentina (1900), 5,000; Austria (1901), 700,000; Belgium (1904), 302,771; Bulgaria (1900), 10,000; Canada (1903), 8,025; Denmark (1903), 55,479; France (1900), 880,000; Germany (1903), 1,000,000; Italy (1901), 30,000; Holland (1901), 30,000; Ireland (1902), 1,063; Italy (1904), 30,000; Japan (1903), 1,274; United States (1895), 50,000; Spain (1903), 29,000; Sweden (1902), 45,000; Switzerland (1902), 100,000; United States (1904), 409,250.

In Russia election is impossible under the present conditions. The party is active and its comrades there it is needless to speak. In Australia, the Labour Party, which obtained the reins of government for a short time, has declared for Co-operation Commonwealth. In China the nucleus of a party has come together. So the army grows and grows.

Capitalism Rules. The whole world is now under the control of the capitalist class. The markets are so overstocked that commercial crises are forever occurring. With the opening up of Asia, new markets are necessary for the existence of capitalism. The crash is imminent. The Social Revolution is looms threateningly. It is coming. Every day brings it nearer.

Workers of the world--the class on whose behalf we are fighting--do not let your work make you the Socialist Party, to work with us for the freeing of labor from the shackles of the capitalist. Join the Socialist Party, the United States wing of the grand international army, the army that is never defeated, that cannot be defeated, that is ever victorious.
