By direction of the National Executive Committee an additional order for 250,000 of the pamphlets containing the Weekly Bulletin, No. 10, will be placed making a total of 600,000. All orders hereafter are to be accompanied with cash. Prices are the same as heretofore announced.

The motion submitted by National Commissioner Spargo of New York, which was adopted at the meeting of October 21st, "That the official Monthly Bulletin be discontinued immediately and that the National Executive Committee be authorized to take constitutional grounds in accordance with Section 3, of Article VII.

ing legislatures and courts have looked upon the demands of labor as measures inimical to society; and only when labor, through its threatening attitude have our law makers and law interpreters been able to see differently.

Gains and Losses.

Still, society does make gains in the direction of industrial democracy. Zealand, and there are, in our own country, the slow growth of the referendum, the occasional passage of factory acts, and here in an occasional judge who interprets law as though the capitalist class were not the sole arbiters of legislation. True, and we of the Socialist party are not unmindful.

Society is not static; it seeks constantly to adjust itself to new economic conditions, however, it is held down and back from the exercise of its spontaneous impulse by a powerful class owning the means of production and resolved never to let go. There are gains, it is true; but the gains must be compared with the losses.

It is nothing for exaltation if the referendum is granted in Poland, while at the same time, in the metropolises of the nation, the streets and alleyways are given over for three generations to a group of tax-farmers. For every petty advance the opportunist can show, we Socialists can show a score of capitalist victories, farther reaching in effect and far more suggestive of the actual trend of events.

A radical advance in democratic sentiment among a part of the population may coincide with extreme reaction by another part of the population. So, too, certain institutional changes of a progressive nature may coincide with the most daring and wholesale aggressions of a predatory class.

At this very time, in the face of a rising wave of revolt, the capitalist class makes everywhere new seizures of power. "After us, the deluge," they say, and they are right. In our time, it is so; reflection, and it laughs at the puny efforts of the opportunists to limit its conquests. Only the specter of Socialist awakens it to a sense of danger.

As to New Zealand.

Nor should the opportunist take more than a meager comfort from a true that in that antipodal nation of a kind of opportunism, growing out of a working-class struggle toward a just organization of society. New Zealand is not by any means a Paradise; wages are low, and the

prospect of the unemployed is often, in general, as acute there as in some less progressive states. But with all shortcomings, it is the land of all lands where the interests of the laboring man are best conserved. New Zealand, however, is a new country, with undeveloped resources, large areas of unoccupied land, and capitalism is there, but in its infancy. That opportunity has been able to do what it has done there is due to the fact that it is a new country. In the older states, where capitalism has developed to an advanced stage, the interests of the laboring man are not so well conserved. In the United States—economic processes are regular, the alignment of classes is distinct, and the interests and purposes that array them against each other are antagonistic. Under such conditions opportunism loses its contest at the first effort. It has had its trial, has been weighed in the balance and found wanting.

made to them serving in this capacity, they should be based on fitness and ability to represent the party and not class affiliation. To do otherwise would be to ask them to pay equal dues without equal benefits and privileges.

But while this is true, there still exists a tendency to nominate members of our locals to nominate members of other than workingmen because of their class affiliations in order to "get votes" because of the "influence" they may have through personal association with their class. When this is done it is a departure from our basic policy and a concession to the vote-catching practices of the capitalist parties from which we should immerse. 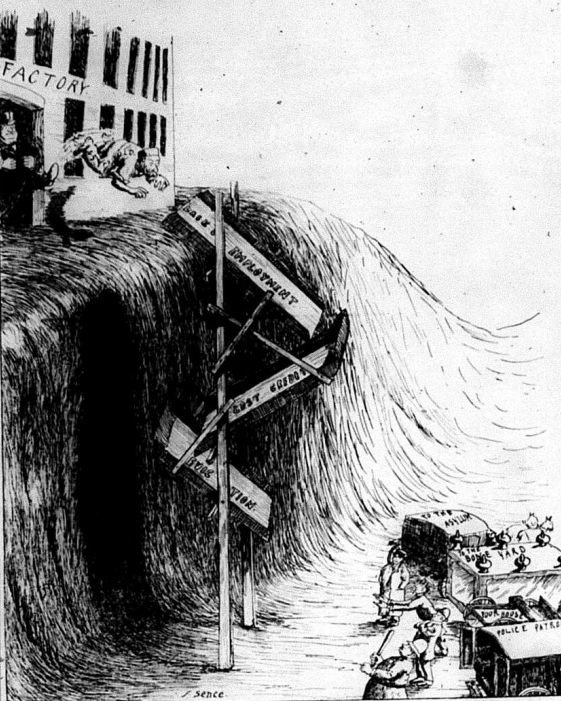
It is thus, from whatever field it comes, the movement is founded upon the economic interests of the working class. By a social gravitation it draws to itself individuals of other classes—teachers, writers, ministers, artists, lawyers even, and not seldom a middle class John Alden to boot, as allies, but as integral factors. For they are drawn to it only as they realize the justice of the workers' demands.

Should Only Workers Be Nominated?

We have received the following inquiry from a comrade in California: "Kindly give your opinion of the following resolution passed at a recent meeting of local Socialists: 'Resolved, That it be the sense of this meeting that none but working men be placed in nomination on the Socialist ticket for the coming municipal campaign.'"

The Socialist Party is a party of the working class representing the interests of that class. Its platform proclaims the existence of an antagonism between it and all other classes, and it is the duty of other classes, that are willing to accept a proletarian position. Those coming to us from the capitalist class or any section of it, forsake their position in the capitalist class as representation and assist in securing it for the working class.

This is true of them as a class however, and not as individuals so far as nominations by our party is concerned. When we accept their application for membership stating they sever their relations with "all other political parties," we accept them in good faith and accord them the same privileges that any other member, whether proletarian or capitalist, is entitled to. They are therefore as much entitled to a place on our ticket as any other member and if any objections are



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JACK LONDON IN TOLEDO

Despite a heavy downpour of rain Comrade London was greeted by a large audience at the Valentine theatre on Sunday last and was given an enthusiastic reception. His address was clear, clean and class conscious from beginning to end and stirred up the dry bones of the capitalist class. The indictment of the capitalist was unanswerable and was heartily applauded by the Socialists present.

The Californian author, play writer, and correspondent, tramp and what not was given a great welcome as he stepped upon the platform, accompanied by Mrs. Kate Brown, Sherwood and William Miller. He got through his lecture easily, that the sympathy of the speaker was overwhelmingly with the workers.

"The revolution," used by London as his theme, is the Socialist movement of the world, which he said, had for its object the overthrow of the present order of things in industry and the institution of a universal Socialist state resting upon the basis of the workers' party.

"The revolution is coming and nothing can stop it when it comes it will sweep present society out of existence. President Roosevelt is coming and recede he doesn't want to see it."

Comrade Debs addressed an audience of 2000 and more at Dayton, Sunday, the subject of his address being "The Issue of the Twentieth Century." Despite the inclement weather the National theatre was packed and Debs held the audience spell-bound for two hours and a half.
